Main findings (trend)

Employment in Queensland rose by 10,600 persons (0.4%) in April 2024 to be 111,600 persons (4.0%) higher over the year. The rise in April reflected increases in both full-time employment (up 8,400) and part-time employment (up 2,200).


The employment-to-population ratio was 64.3% in April 2024, unchanged from March and above its pre-COVID ratio of 61.8%. Hours worked rose 0.6% in April and were 14.6% above its level in March 2020 (**Chart 1**).

The unemployment rate was 4.1% in April, unchanged from March 2024 and still well below the pre-COVID rate of 5.6% in March 2020 (**Chart 2**). Queensland's participation rate was 67.1% in April 2024, up from 67.0% in March 2024 and above its pre-COVID rate of 65.5%.

Nationally, trend employment rose by 30,900 persons in April (0.2%, **Table 1**) to be 1,369,600 (10.6%) above its pre-COVID level of March 2020. In seasonally adjusted terms, employment nationally rose by 38,500 persons which was well above market expectations for a 23,700 increase.

The ABS noted, 'the 30,000 people increase in unemployment reflected more people without jobs available and looking for work, and also more people than usual indicating that they had a job that they were waiting to start in.'

The national unemployment rate was unchanged at 4.0% in April 2024 (**Table 1**). Hours worked was up 0.4% in the month remaining 10.9% above its pre-COVID level in March 2020.
