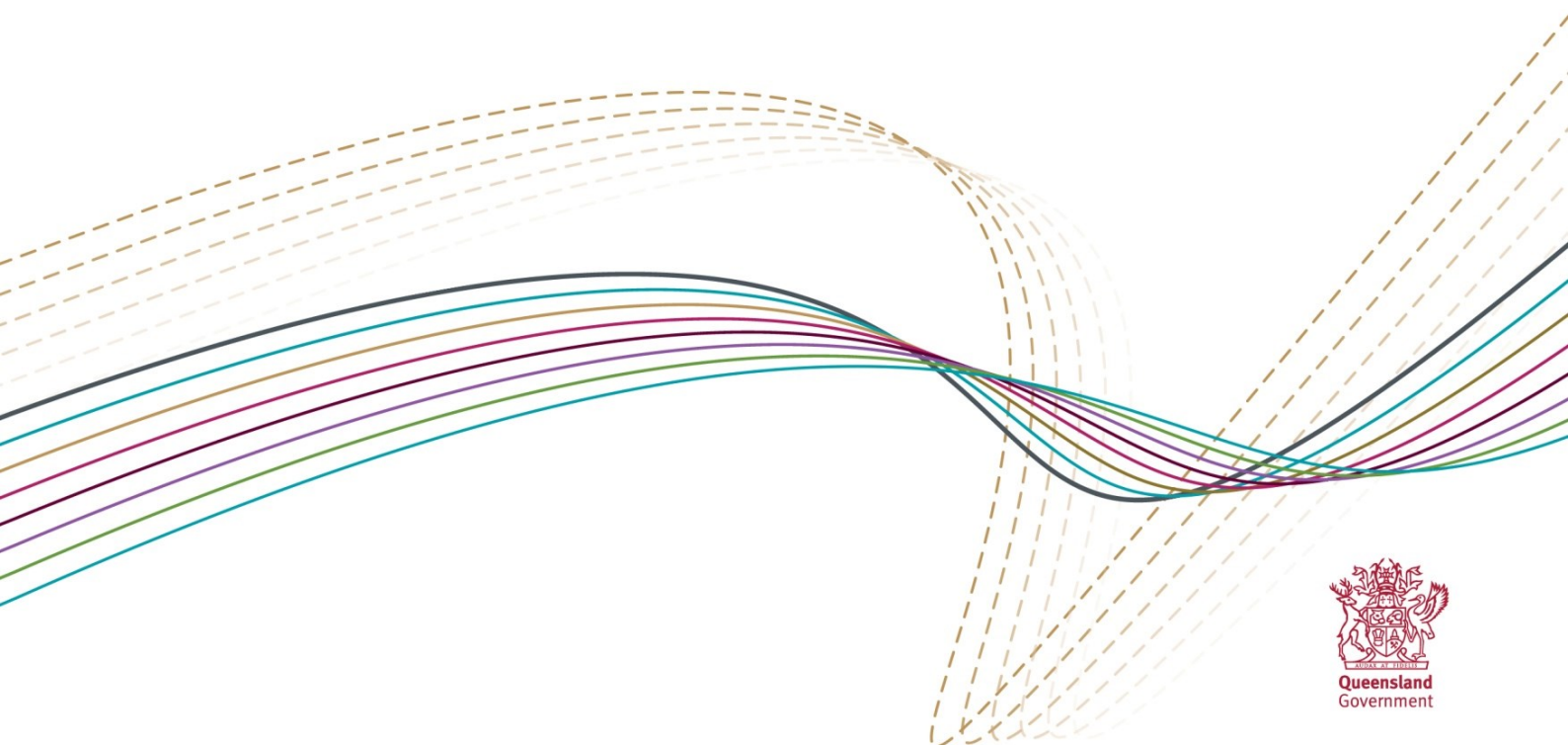

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# 1.0 Introduction

The *Crime report, Queensland, 2022–23* provides an overview of the volume and nature of crime in Queensland, as reported to (by victims, witnesses or other persons) or detected by the Queensland Police Service (QPS) (recorded offences). The report is a companion to the *Justice report, Queensland, 2022–23* (also produced by the Queensland Government Statistician's Office), which provides an overview of the volume of criminal justice matters in Queensland, and includes statistics relating to criminal courts, youth justice, and adult corrective services.

For the purposes of this report, the reference period is the 2022–23 financial year and time series for up to 10 years.

This 2022–23 edition is the sixth annual report by the Queensland Government Statistician's Office (QGSO) on recorded crime in the state, and includes revisions to data published for earlier years where appropriate. Detailed statistics relating to recorded victims of offences against the person and alleged offenders in all offence categories are featured in this report, as well as statistics for recorded and cleared offences.

Tables containing person-based variables and demographic information have been subjected to confidentialisation to ensure the anonymity of individuals is protected where numbers are small (fewer than 4) and there is a reasonable likelihood that a person may be identified from the data published.

Statistics in this report are presented as both counts and rates. Using counts to gauge the level of crime is problematic, as areas with larger populations will presumably have higher numbers of offences than areas with smaller populations. Calculation of rates per 100,000 estimated resident population allows direct comparisons of recorded crime to be made across different geographical areas and across time, since the size of the population is taken into account in the calculation.

Data which form the basis of this report are derived from official crime reports recorded in Queensland Police Records and Information Management Exchange (QPRIME). Only offences with a status of solved, withdrawn, lapsed or unsolved are counted in this report. Cancelled and unfounded (not substantiated) crime reports have been excluded.

This report presents crime for the state and the 19 statistical areas level 4 (SA4), as defined by the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) in the Australian Statistical Geography Standard (ASGS). Also presented in the Appendix are crime statistics by QPS administrative regions.

The information presented in this report may vary from data published elsewhere by QGSO and others, due to differences in the dates administrative data were extracted and frequency of revision, or in counting rules or statistical standards applied. Readers are therefore urged to exercise caution when making comparison between publications.

The report should also be read in conjunction with the Explanatory notes and glossary, where counting methodologies and other supporting information are provided to aid in the interpretation of statistics presented.

As 2022–23 is the first full reference year following the disruptions from the COVID-19 pandemic, readers are advised, when considering the statistics in this report, that comparisons with figures in periods during the pandemic (2019–20 through 2021–22) must be made with caution.

## 2.0 Statistical impacts of legislative and policy changes

### 2.1 Youth offending

Queensland Police commenced a number of initiatives over the course of 2022–23 to support community safety, focusing on preventing, disrupting and investigating youth crime through community engagement and extreme high visibility patrols in intelligence-driven hotspot locations.<sup>1</sup>

To further disrupt youth offending, specialist youth crime rapid response squads were established and deployed to various locations across Queensland to target high risk youth offenders throughout the state, aiming to support local police with detectives and Youth Justice workers to strengthen police capabilities.

Queensland Police also introduced a youth mentoring program that utilises a range of tools to support young people aged 14–17 years to make better life choices. Current program locations include Logan, Gold Coast, Ipswich, South Brisbane, Moreton Bay, Sunshine Coast, Cairns, Townsville, Mackay and Rockhampton, and their respective surrounding areas.

Given the heightened police presence, higher than usual recorded numbers of youth offenders and offences typically committed by those age groups may not necessarily be indicative of an increased number of youths committing crime but rather a result of increased detection. Also, given that some of these initiatives commenced in the second half of 2022–23, their impact may not yet be apparent in the 2022–23 reporting period.

## 2.2. Change to police recording of DFV offences in Queensland

From 1 July 2021, a change in recording practices was implemented by the Queensland Police Service, requiring police officers to record within QPRIME all criminal offences associated with domestic and family violence (DFV) incidents that come to their attention. Consequently, 2021–22 presents as a break in the time series for DFV-related variables that are based on recorded offences data.

Analyses have been conducted on selected recorded offences data and, while the analysis below indicates a substantial increase in recorded DFV-related offences in the reporting periods since the practice change was implemented, it is difficult to quantify how much of the observed increase in these and other DFV-related offences can be attributed to this change alone.

Other factors are also likely to have contributed to the observed increase, such as: increased public awareness of DFV, including through reports such as *Hear her voice*; improved mechanisms for reporting DFV; media coverage; cultural changes; population growth; natural variation; and the delivery of the Queensland Government's *Domestic and family violence prevention strategy, 2016–2026*.

Domestic and family violence is complex and DFV-related offences can take many forms and cover a broad range of offences. Recorded offences presented in this report, including those related to DFV, represent only those which have come to the attention of police.

**Please note:** The increases evident in recorded offences and victims statistics are not apparent to the same extent in offender statistics. Where a victim declines to support prosecution, the offence(s) recorded are withdrawn and police take no action against the alleged offender. In such cases, therefore, the offender is not counted.

## 2.3. Legislative changes

### 2.3.1. Weapon detection

In 2021, legislation was introduced for police to trial the use of hand-held metal detectors ('wandering') without a warrant to detect unlawfully possessed knives in two safe night precincts (SNPs) on the Gold Coast. The trial led to an increased detection and seizure of weapons during May 2021 and November 2022, including machetes, screwdrivers, flick knives, knuckledusters, tasers and a replica gun.

The passing of the *Police Powers and Responsibilities (Jack's Law) Amendment Act 2022* extended and expanded the trial to all 15 safe night precincts and all public transport vehicles and hubs across Queensland. Wandering operations commenced in late 2022–23 in selected locations including Fortitude Valley and Townsville, aiming to reduce knife crime and create safer public spaces.<sup>2</sup>

Given the timing of the commencement of these operations, a subsequent rise in recorded weapon-related offences is not yet apparent for the 2022–23 reporting period.

### 2.3.2. Drug diversion

In 2023, the *Police Powers and Responsibilities and Other Legislation Amendment Act (No. 2) 2023* expanded police drug diversion powers under the *Drugs Misuse Act 1986* to include minor possession of all illicit drugs, and implemented a tiered police approach to the possession of minor illicit drugs. Police officers are now able to issue a warning (for a first offence), refer to a mandatory drug diversion assessment program (for second and third offences) and issue a notice to appear in court (for fourth offence).

Given that this change took place at the end of 2022–23, no impact is yet apparent for the 2022–23 reporting period.

**Terms used frequently in this report** (see Glossary for more.)

**Offence:** Any act or omission by a person(s) for which a penalty could be imposed by the Australian legal system. Presented in this report in three categories:

**Offences against the person:** include homicide offences, assault, sexual offences, robbery and other offences against the person.

**Offences against property:** include unlawful entry, arson, other property damage, unlawful use of a motor vehicle, other theft, fraud, handling stolen goods.

**Other offences:** include drug offences, breach DV protection order, trespassing and vagrancy, Weapons Act offences, good order offences, traffic and related offences, prostitution offences, liquor & gaming offences, stock-related offences, miscellaneous.

**Offender:** in this report, a person aged 10 years or over who, through the clearance of an offence through police action against a them, is alleged to be responsible for committing that offence. An individual may be recorded as an offender multiple times, if they were proceeded against by police for multiple offence types within the same incident or multiple times within the reference period. Unless otherwise specified, offender data presented in this report do not represent a count of individual (unique) offenders.

**Adult offender:** is an alleged offender aged 18 years or older at the date police action commenced against them.

**Child offender:** for the purpose of this report, is an alleged offender aged 10 to 17 years at the date police action commenced against them.

**Unique offender:** provides an estimate of the number of *individual persons* actioned by police for offending, and is therefore lower than the total number of offenders. An individual is counted once only in the reference period, regardless of how many times they have been proceeded against by police in that period.

**Victim:** Victim statistics in this report relate only to recorded victims of offences against the person, reported to or detected by police within the reporting period. For most offences against the person, the victim is an individual person. Statistics on non-person victims have not been included in this report.

These data show one victim for each counted offence. However, a person may be counted multiple times if they were the victim of multiple offences belonging to different offence types within a single incident or recorded multiple times during the reference period. They would be counted once for each most serious offence per offence type. Unless otherwise specified, victim data presented in this report do not represent a count of individual (unique) victims.

**Unique victim:** provides an estimate of the number of *individual persons* who have been recorded by police during the reference period (financial year) as a victim of an offence against the person and is therefore lower than the total recorded victims. An individual is counted once only in the reference period, regardless of how many times they have been recorded as a victim of an offence.

Person-based rates in this report have been age-standardised to account for differences in the age profiles of the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander and non-Indigenous populations.

Only offences with a status of *solved, unsolved, withdrawn or lapsed* are counted in this report.

*Cancelled and unfounded* (not substantiated) offences have been excluded.

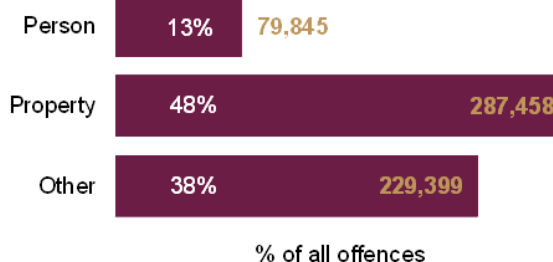

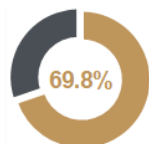

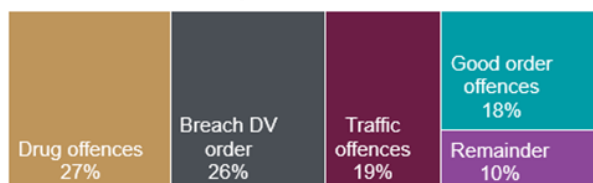

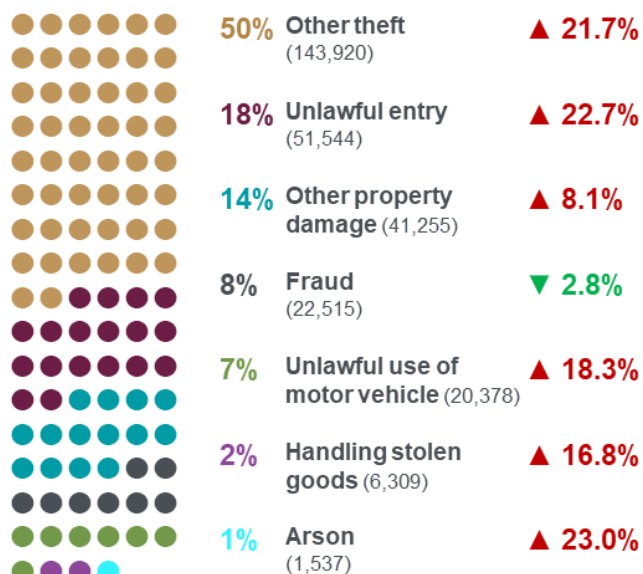

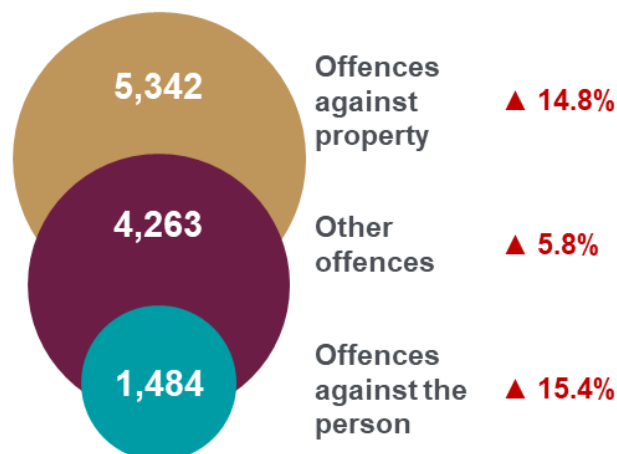

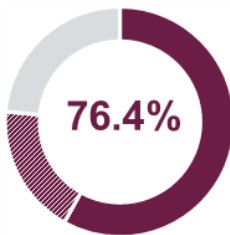

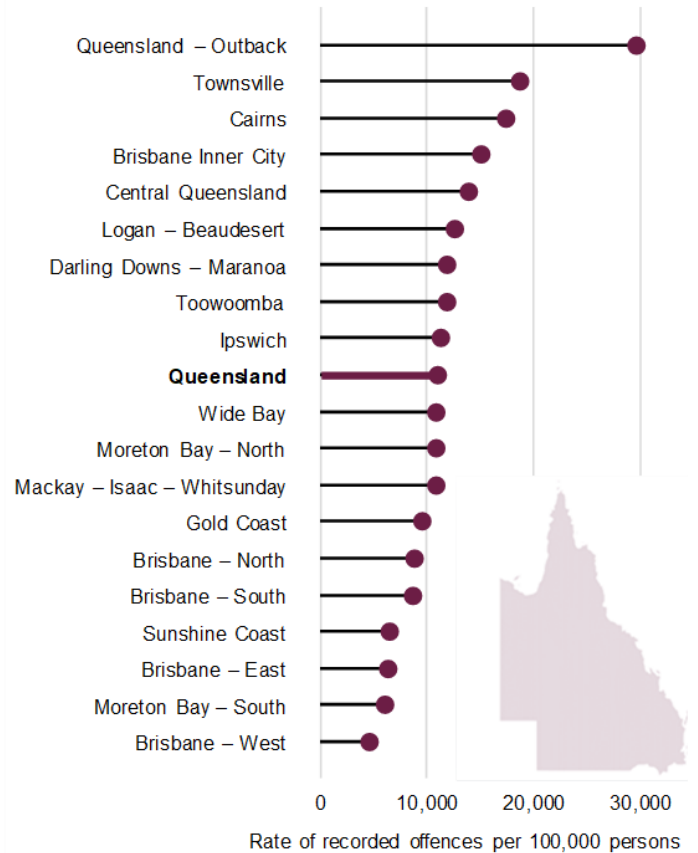

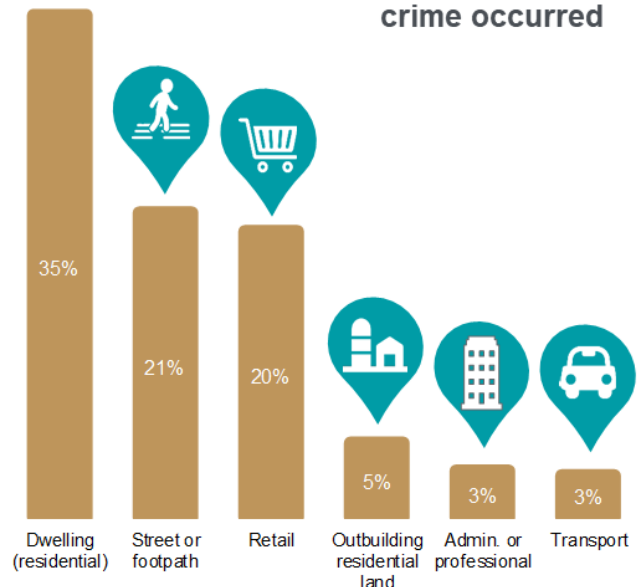
### Crime rate by region

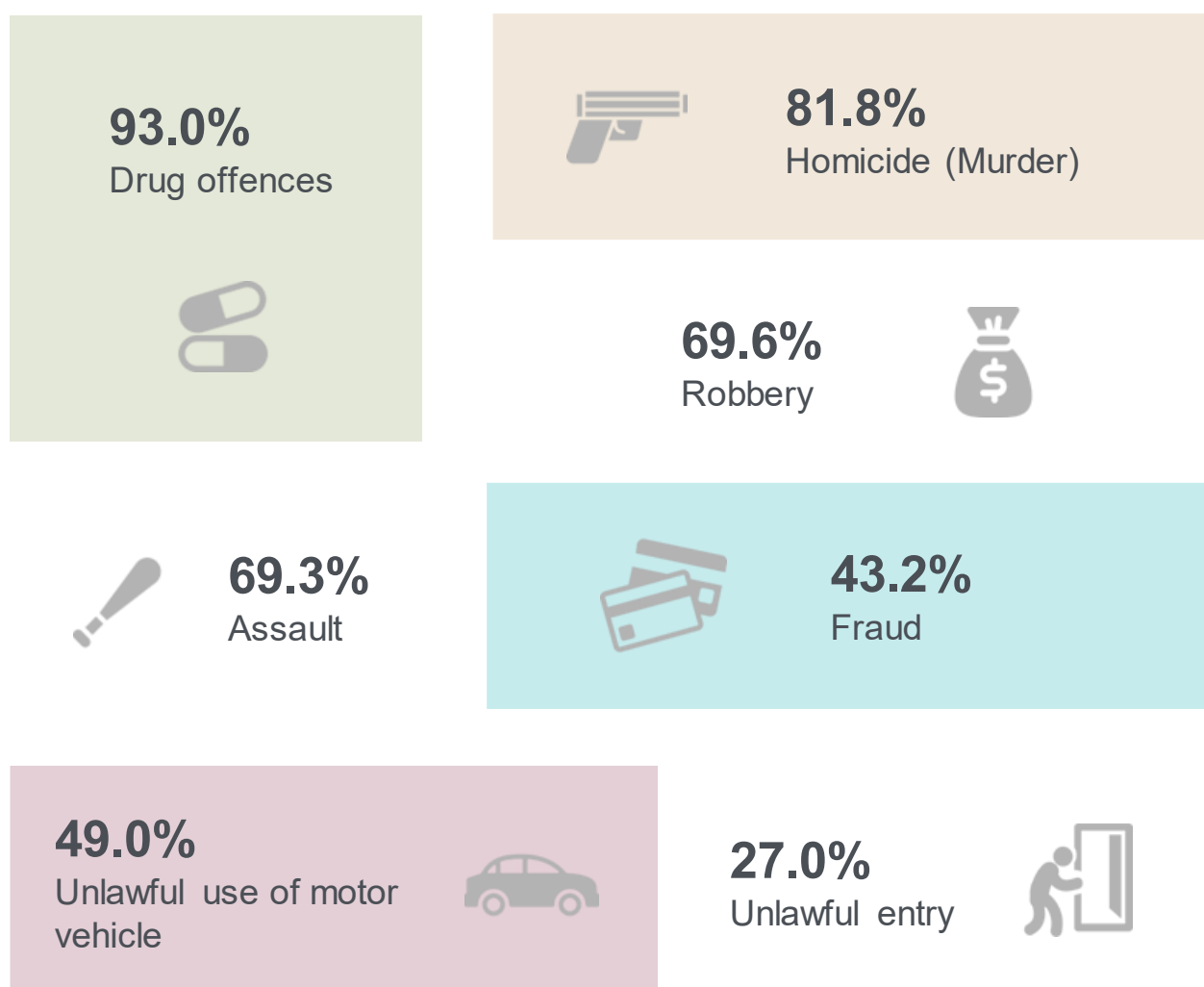
## 4.0 Recorded and cleared offences

In this section, statistics are presented for 2022–23 and the previous year, for recorded and cleared offences categorised as: offences against the person, against property, and other offences.

Recorded offences are those which have been reported to or detected by police within the reference period and recorded in QPRIME, and may include historical offences and those where no offender, or victim in some cases, has yet been identified. Offences are presented in terms of both numbers and rates, as well as a percentage change indicator. Rates are calculated as reported offences per 100,000 persons, using the appropriate estimated resident population (ERP).

Cleared offences are presented as a count of offences *recorded and cleared in period* and *cleared in period, recorded previously*. The *percentage cleared* figures in Figure 1 refer only to those offences both recorded and cleared in the same financial year. (See Glossary for definition of *cleared offences*.)

## 4.1. Recorded offences

From July 2021, a change in police practice was implemented regarding the recording of all criminal offences associated with domestic and family violence-related investigations (see section 2.2 for details), resulting in increases in some recorded offences from 2021–22 onward. Such increases should be interpreted with caution when analysing time series data.

Queensland police recorded 596,702 offences in 2022–23, an increase of 13.5% (+71,050 offences) on the previous financial year (Table 2). The recorded offence rate, at 11,088.8 offences per 100,000 persons, increased 11.2% compared with 2021–22 (Figure 2).

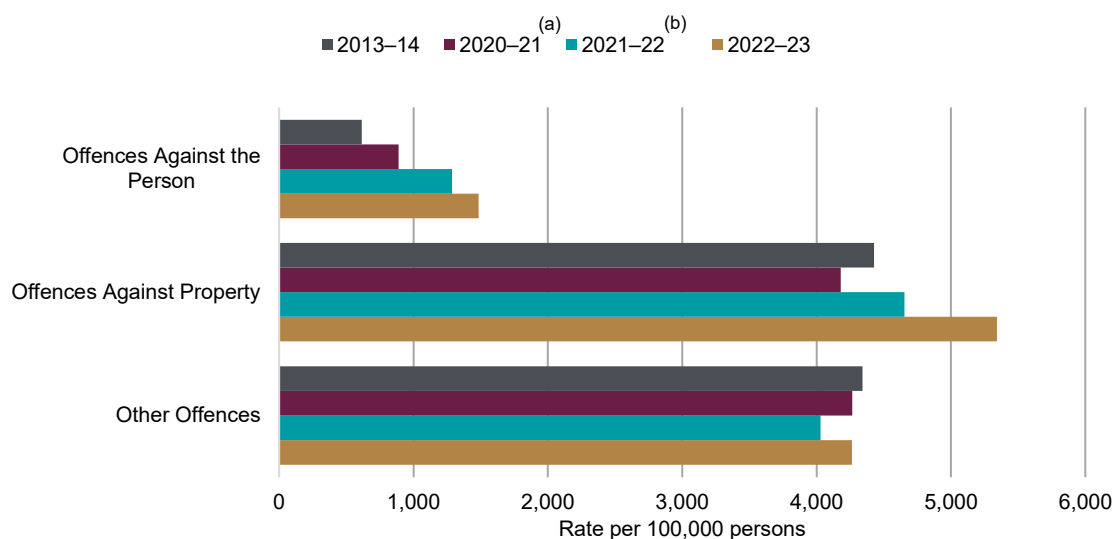
While property offences showed the greatest increase in terms of volume (+42,056 offences), the increase in percentage terms was almost identical for personal (+17.7%) and property (+17.1%) offences.

### 4.1.1. Offences against the person

A total of 79,845 offences against the person was recorded in 2022–23 (13.4% of total recorded offences)(Table 3). The count of offences against the person rose noticeably slower in 2022–23 (+12,030 offences or +17.7%) than in the previous reporting period (+21,569 or +46.6%), when the change in police practice was implemented in relation to recording of DFV-related offences.

The majority of the increase in personal offences (92.0%) in 2022–23 was driven by *assault* (+7,369 offences) and *other offences against the person* (+3,696 offences). *Life endangering acts* accounted for 69.9% of the increase in *other offences against the person*, driven by growth in recorded *cyber threats / harassment* offences (+1,258 or +155.7% compared with 2021–22). A large year-on-year growth was also recorded in *stalking* (+950 offences or 85.4%). Furthermore, despite the large year-on-year increase in the number of assaults, the proportion of serious assaults (including *grievous assault*) was similar to the previous financial year (56.9% of total assaults in 2022–23, compared with 57.2% in 2021–22).

#### 4.1.2. Offences against property

Almost half of all recorded offences in 2022–23 were offences against property (287,458 or 48.1% of total offences recorded). More than half (59.2%) of the overall increase in recorded offences compared with the previous year was driven by a 17.1% increase in property offences (+42,056 offences). Two offence groups together contributed 83.8% of this increase: *other theft (excl. unlawful entry)* (61.1% or +25,706 offences) and *unlawful entry* (22.7% or +9,551 offences). A change in offending pattern is evident in *unlawful use of a motor vehicle* offences, which were more often associated in a criminal incident with an *unlawful entry* offence.

### 4.1.3. Other offences

Other offences comprised well over a third of all offences recorded in 2022–23 (229,399 or 38.4% of total recorded offences). *Breach of domestic violence protection order* recorded an increase of 12,734 offences (+27.2%) in 2022–23 over 2021–22, almost twice the increase seen in that year (+6,702 offences). *Drug offences* remained the second-most prevalent recorded offence type behind *other theft (excl. unlawful entry)* in 2022–23, while continuing its downward trend, albeit declining only marginally (–272 or –0.4%) since 2021–22. This was in contrast to the very large declines seen in the two previous financial years (–14,663 and –15,420 respectively), following a 10-year peak of 92,465 recorded *drug offences* in 2019–20. There were 3,702 more *traffic and related offences* in 2022–23, dominated by increases in *disqualified driving* (+2,447 or +23.2%) and *drink/drug driving* (+1,381 or +5.1%).

## 4.2. Cleared offences

From July 2021, a change in police practice was implemented regarding the recording of all criminal offences associated with domestic and family violence-related investigations (see section 2.2 for details). Therefore, the increases observed in recorded offences from 2021–22 onward should be interpreted with caution when analysing time series data.

## 5.0 Crime by region (SA4) – counts and rates

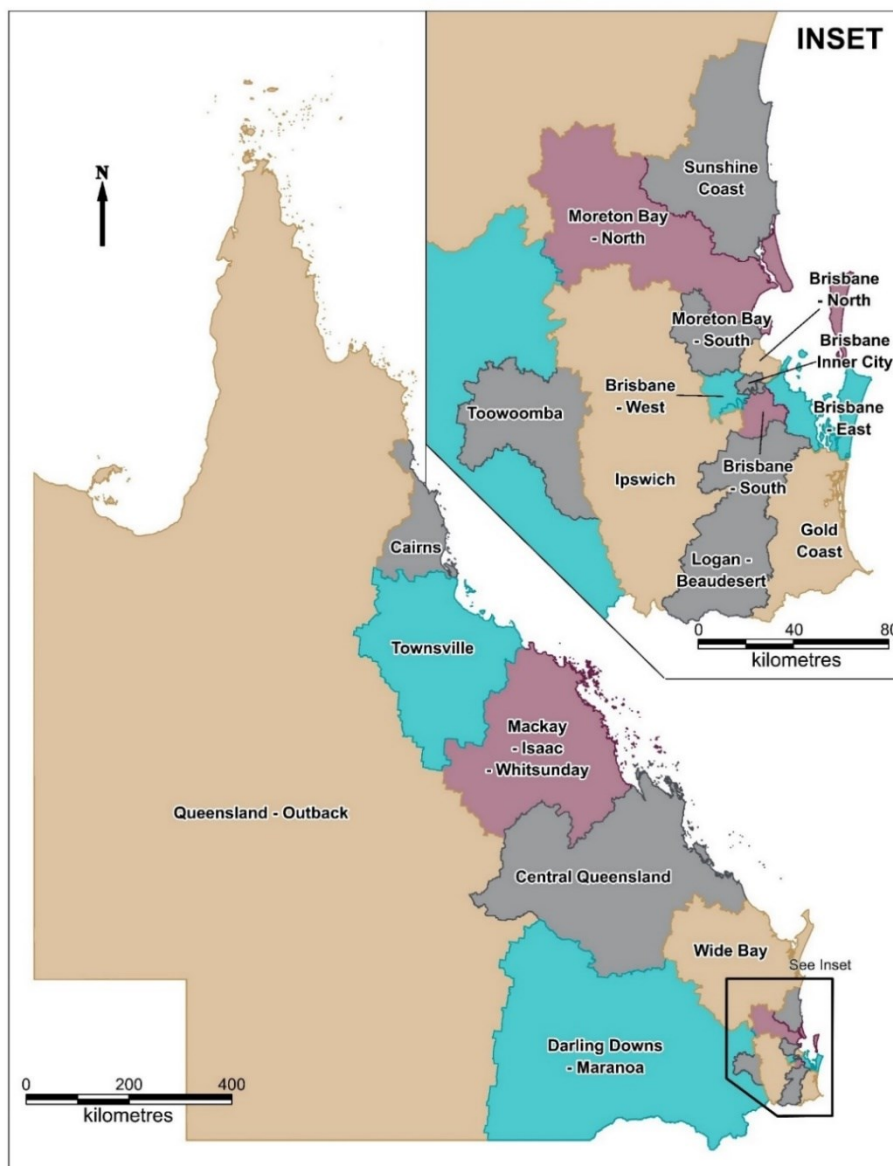
The tables in this section display the number of recorded offences and the offence rate per 100,000 estimated resident population (ERP), for 2013–14, 2021–22 and 2022–23, for Queensland and the state's 19 statistical areas level 4 (SA4s) (Figure 3).

Population growth can lead to a rise in numbers of offences, and therefore simple counts cannot and should not be used to gauge the true level of crime in a region. However, it is important to note that transient population groups such as tourists are not factored into the ERP. This would have particular impact on high tourism areas where crime rates may be overestimated.

**Please note:** The tables in this section include some offences where the SA4 in which the offence occurred cannot be identified. This may occur for one of two reasons:

- (1) The offence was detected as part of a covert operation, and the location of the offence has not been recorded, to maintain security.
  - (2) The accuracy of the address had not been verified at the time the data were extracted for inclusion in this publication.
- In such cases, the offences have been included in the Queensland total only. Therefore, SA4 statistics may not always sum to Queensland totals.

## 5.2. Offences against the person

From July 2021, a change in police practice was implemented regarding the recording of all criminal offences associated with domestic and family violence-related investigations (see section 2.2 for details), resulting in increases in some recorded offences from 2021–22 onward. Such increases should be interpreted with caution when analysing time series data.

Following an increase in Queensland's overall rate of personal offences in 2021–22 (+46.6%) compared with the previous year, there was an increase of 15.4% in 2022–23. From 2013–14 to 2022–23, the overall personal offence rate in Queensland has more than doubled (from 614.2 to 1,483.8 offences per 100,000 persons), with exceptional increases in the three most recent financial years resulting from the change in recording practices by police since 1 July 2021.

In every SA4 region in Queensland, the overall rate of offences against the person increased in 2022–23 compared with 2013–14, with Townsville and Queensland–Outback showing the greatest increases (225.1% and 221.5% respectively). Smaller increases also occurred in every SA4 region compared with 2021–22, with just one exception. Sunshine Coast experienced a decline of 7.4% in 2022–23 compared with the previous year.

In 2022–23, compared with both one year and nine years prior, every SA4 region in Queensland experienced increases in the rates of *serious assault* (resulting in injury) (Table 15) and *life endangering acts* (Table 28).

### 5.3. Offences against property

After decreasing considerably during 2020–21, following declaration of the COVID pandemic, Queensland's overall property offence rate increased for a second consecutive year (+11.4% in 2021–22 and +14.8% in 2022–23)(Table 29). From 2013–14 to 2022–23, the overall property offence rate in Queensland has risen by 20.7%, from 4,426.6 to 5,342.0 offences per 100,000 persons.

In 2022–23, every SA4 region in Queensland experienced an increase in the rate of property offences compared with 2021–22. When compared with 2013–14, only two SA4 regions, Ipswich and Sunshine Coast, showed a decline in the overall property offence rate, at –5.6% and –2.4% respectively.

*Other theft (excluding unlawful entry)* remained the most common property offence, and every SA4 region experienced increases in 2022–23 compared with both 2013–14 and 2021–22. The only exception was Queensland – Outback, which saw a decline of 7.8% compared with the previous year (Table 37).

## 5.4. Other offences

Following two consecutive rate decreases (–8.0% in 2020–21 and –5.5% in 2021–22), the overall rate of recorded ‘other’ offences in Queensland increased by 5.8% in 2022–23 (to 4,263.0 offences per 100,000 persons from 4,029.4 in the previous year). However, the level of change varied greatly across the 19 SA4 regions, with around half experiencing a decrease (between –1.1% and –20.4%) in recorded other offences over nine years and half experiencing an increase (between +1.1% and +26.3%).

Every SA4 region saw a dramatic increase in the rate of *breach of domestic violence protection order* in 2022–23 compared with 2013–14 and, to a lesser extent, 2021–22.

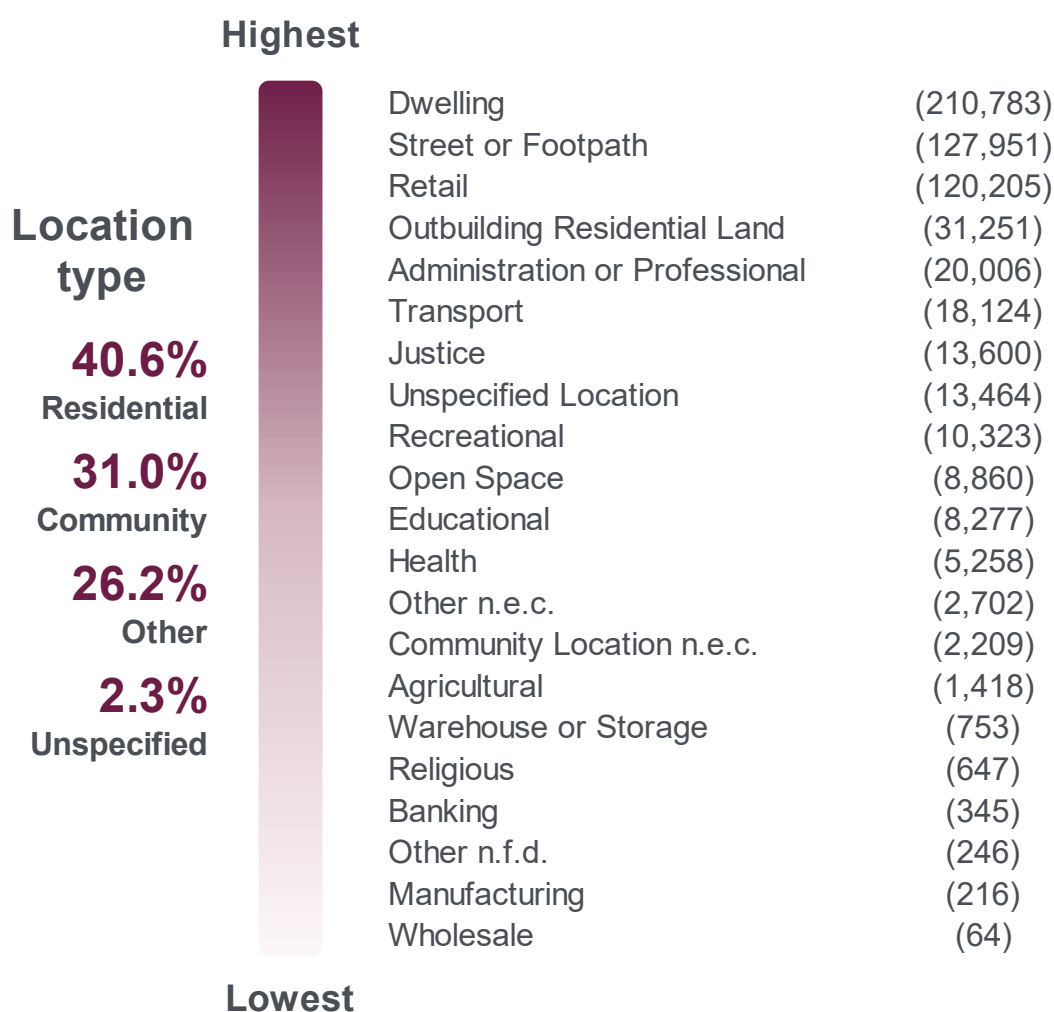

## 6.0 Crime locations

This section provides a breakdown of recorded crime in 2022–23 by the type of location in which the offence occurred. The location classifications are based on those used by the ABS in *Recorded crime – Victims, Australia*.

A crime location is defined as the initial site where a criminal incident occurred, classified by the primary function of that site where the site has more than one function. This definition may encompass any surrounding land, yard or car parking area, together with any other structures existing at the location. (See Explanatory notes and glossary for further information.)

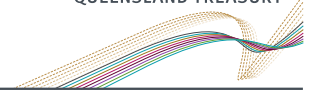

## 7.0 Offenders

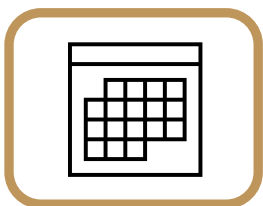
(Total) **offender statistics** in this report represent a count of one offender for each reported offence type cleared or solved through police action against a person within a single offending incident. An individual is counted multiple times if they were proceeded against for multiple offence types within the same incident, or multiple times within the reference period. **Unique offender** statistics are presented in this report to show the number of individuals proceeded against by police in a reference period.

The reference date used to generate statistics for the year under review is the date police action commenced against an offender. As such, offenders (unique or not) proceeded against in the reference year, for matters reported in the same or in previous years, will be included in this report.

### In 2022–23:



#### **All offenders (aged 10 years or older at time of police action)**

- The total number of offenders (not individuals) increased (+8.5%) and was close to pre-pandemic levels (317,358 in 2018–19).
- The number who identified as *Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander* increased for the second consecutive year (+9.7%).
- The increase in *female* offenders (not individuals) (+10.2%) was proportionally larger than for *male* offenders (+7.9%) when compared with 2021–22.

#### **Child offenders (aged 10–17 years at time of police action)**

- Total number of child offenders proceeded against by police increased by 8.6% and the number of *unique child offenders* by 5.2% (+557 individuals) compared with 2021–22.
- Young *female unique offenders* increased by 10.3%.
- Child offenders were twice as likely as adult offenders to be proceeded against by police for *property offences*.

#### **Compared with 2013–14**

- Offenders (not individuals) proceeded against by police for *breach of DVO* represented the largest volume increase (+17,248), and more than doubled over the 10-year period (+119.3%). Some individuals are counted multiple times in a reference year. (See section 2.2 re. *impact of the change to police recording practice in domestic and family violence investigations*.)
- Small increases were seen in the proportions of *female offenders* (not individuals), both women (from 22.2% to 24.8%) and girls (from 15.6% to 18.4%).
- *Unique offenders* decreased overall in both number (–11.4%) and rate (–24.0%).
- A greater number of unique offenders identified as *Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander* (+7.2%).

**Please note:** There has been a change in police practice since July 2021, with police now required to report all criminal offences associated with a domestic and family violence (DFV) investigation. A large proportion of these are withdrawn due to victims electing not to proceed. This has led to a greater increase in DFV-related recorded victims, and recorded and cleared offences, and a smaller increase in offenders.

The overall unique offender rate increased slightly in 2022–23 after a seven-year decline.

## 7.1. Unique offenders

**Unique offender statistics** are presented in this report to illustrate the number of individuals who have been proceeded against by police in a reference period (financial year).

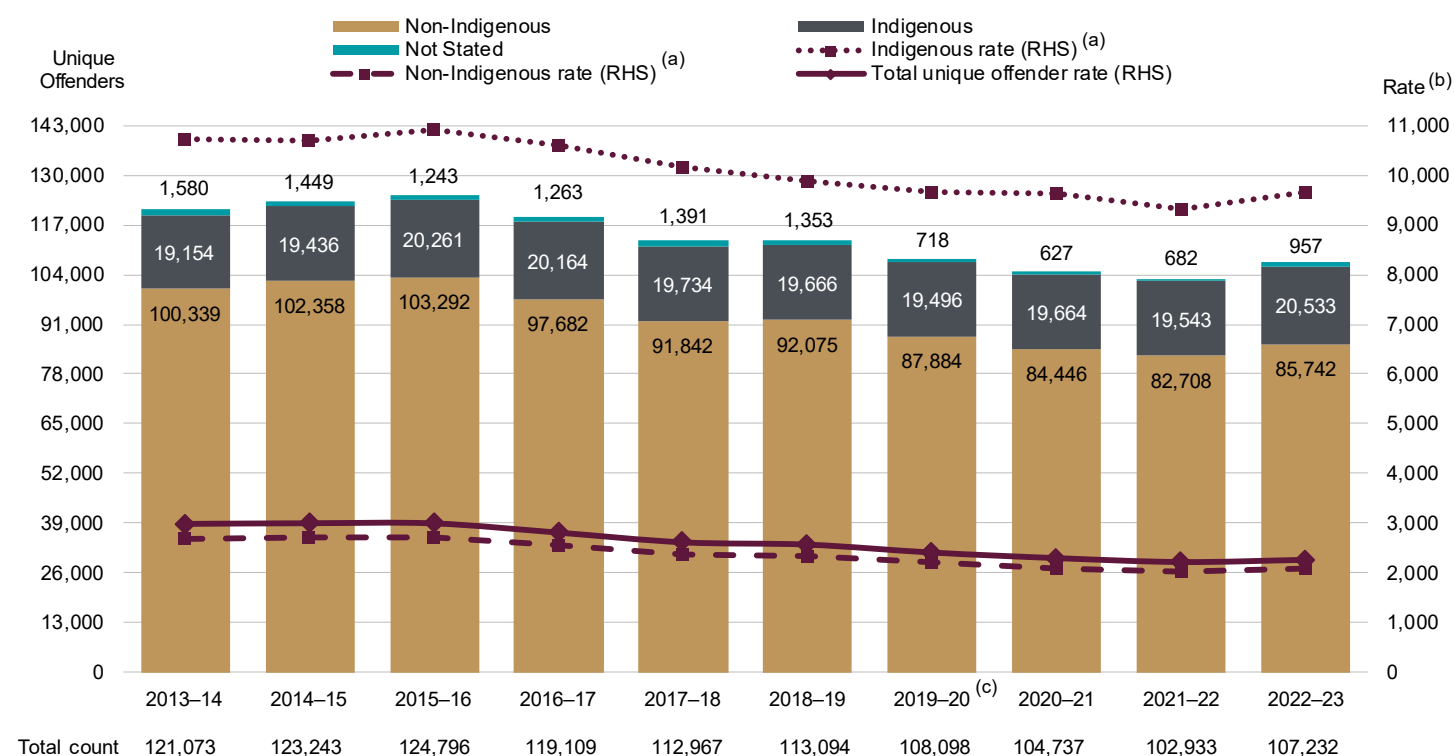
After reaching a ten-year low in 2021–22, unique (individual) offender numbers increased overall in 2022–23, for the first time since 2018–19.

There were 107,232 unique offenders in total, a 4.2% increase on the 102,933 unique offenders in the previous year (Figure 5). Compared with 2021–22, the number of non-Indigenous unique offenders increased by 3.7% (+3,034), while Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander unique offenders increased by 5.1% (+990).

Despite unique offender numbers increasing, they were still 14.1% lower than at their peak in 2015–16 (124,796) and 10.0% lower than at the start of the time series in 2013–14 (121,073).

The unique offender rate also increased slightly (+2.0%) for the first time since peaking in 2014–15, to 2,268.8 offenders per 100,000 persons aged 10 years or older. The rate in 2022–23 was substantially lower than at the start of the time series and at the series high (–24.0% and –24.4% respectively).

### 7.1.1. Age and offending

After a seven-year steady decline (since a peak in 2014–15), both the counts and rates of unique child and adult offenders increased slightly in 2022–23.

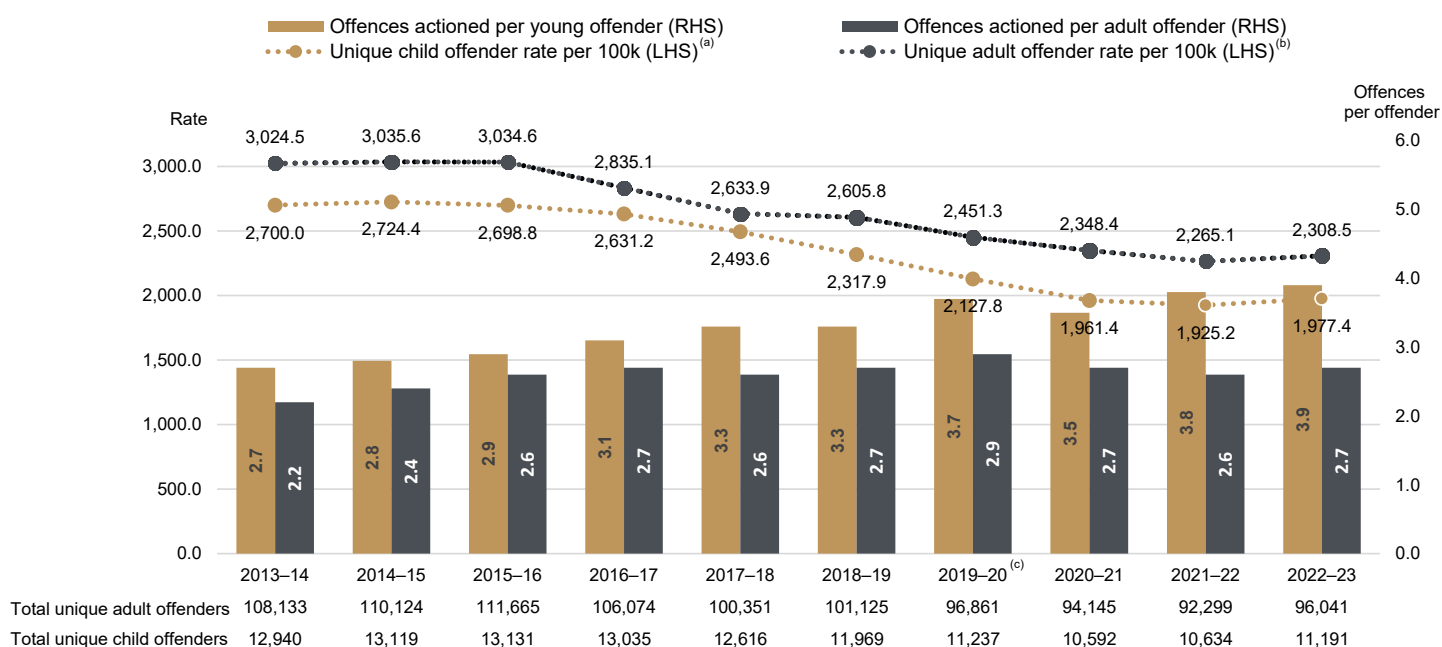
In number terms, there were 11,191 unique child offenders, representing a 5.2% increase (+557 unique offenders) on 2021–22, while unique adult offenders increased by 4.1% (+3,742 unique offenders to 96,041) over the year.

Both adult and child unique offender rates were lower in 2022–23 than in 2013–14 (–23.7% and –26.8% respectively). The unique child offender rate increased (+2.7%) for the first time since 2014–15, to 1,977.4 per 100,000 persons aged 10–17 years, after reaching a low of 1,925.2 in 2021–22 (Figure 6). Similarly, the unique adult offender rate increased (+1.9%) for the first time since 2014–15, to 2,308.5 per 100,000 persons aged 18 years and older.

Furthermore, there has been a notable increase in the average number of offences per unique offender actioned by police compared with ten years prior, more so for child offenders (+44.4%, from 2.7 to 3.9) but also for adults (+22.7%, 2.2 to 2.7).

In this report, for the whole time series, **child offenders** are those aged 10–17 years and **adult offenders** are those aged 18 years and over when police action commenced against them.

(b) Unique adult offenders per 100,000 persons aged 18 years and over.

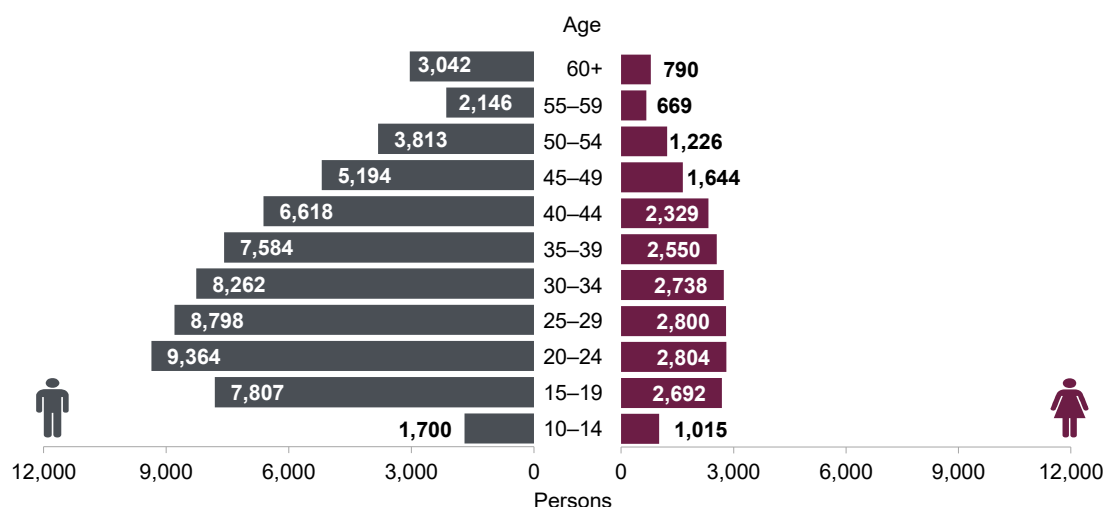

### 7.1.2. Age, sex and Indigenous status

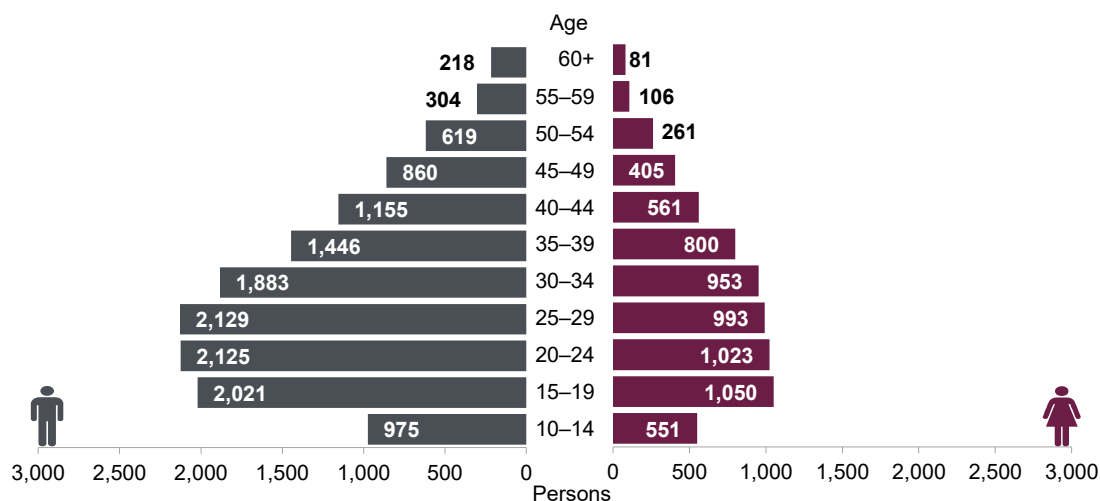
**Figure 7 Non-Indigenous<sup>(a)</sup> unique offenders by age and sex<sup>(b)</sup>, 2022–23**

The distribution of unique offenders by age and sex by Indigenous status in 2022–23 is shown in Figure 7 and Figure 8. There were more male than female unique offenders for all age groups, irrespective of Indigenous status. However, the median age of unique Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander offenders is lower (28 years) than for the non-Indigenous cohort (32 years).

Three in four non-Indigenous unique offenders in 2022–23 were aged between 15 and 44 years (74.9% for males and 75.3% for females). As in previous years, the most prevalent age group was 20–24 years for both males (9,364) and, by a very narrow margin, females (2,804, followed closely by 25–29 years with 2,800 offenders) (Figure 7). This is despite numbers in this age group declining every year since 2013–14 for males (16,670 offenders) (not shown). Numbers decreased progressively for both males and females in older age groups until the aggregated 60+ years offender cohorts. Compared with 2021–22, the number of non-Indigenous female unique offenders increased in all age groups, except those aged 20–24 years.

Among Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander unique offenders, 25–29 years was the most prevalent age group for males and 15–19 years for females in 2022–23 (Figure 8). In contrast to non-Indigenous offenders, numbers for both sexes were lower for all age groups after their respective peaks, including in the 60+ years offender cohorts. Male unique offender numbers decreased for the four youngest age groups compared with the previous year, while females in the 10–14 years age group increased by 16.5% (+78) over the same period.

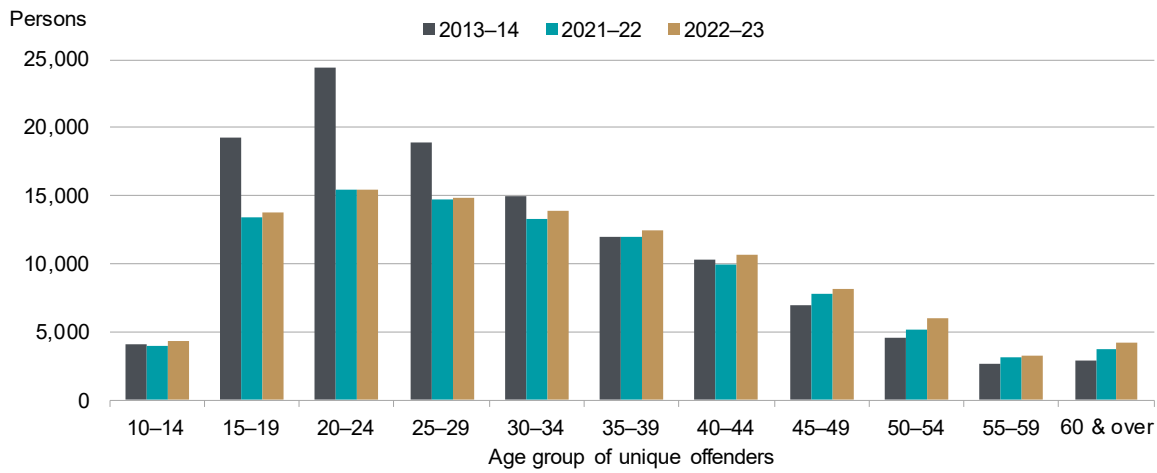

### 7.1.3. Age distribution

While the total number of unique offenders increased by 4.2% (+4,299) in 2022–23 compared with the previous year, different levels of growth were apparent across all age groups. The largest volume increase was for offenders aged 40–44 years (+796) and the largest proportional increase (+14.3%) for those aged 50–54 years.

Unique offenders in the most recent financial year were older than ten years prior, with offender numbers in each age group 35–39 and older having increased compared with 2013–14, while numbers in almost all younger age groups decreased. The only exception was those aged 10–14 years, where there were 264 (+6.5%) more unique offenders than in 2013–14 (Figure 9).

Following a decline in the two previous years, police proceeded against a total of 312,170 offenders (not individuals) in 2022–23, an increase of 8.5% overall (Figure 10). This was the second-largest year-on-year increase in the 10-year time series, with 24,389 more offenders than in the previous year.

Offender tables have been subjected to confidentialisation where cell values range from 1 to 3. All such cells ( $\leq 3$ ) are assigned a nominal value of 2.

Cells with a value of zero remain unaltered. Totals for certain variables, therefore, may vary slightly across tables within the report. (See Explanatory notes and glossary for detail.)

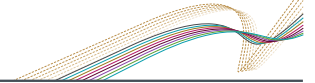

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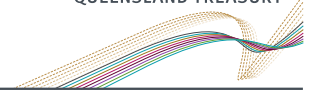

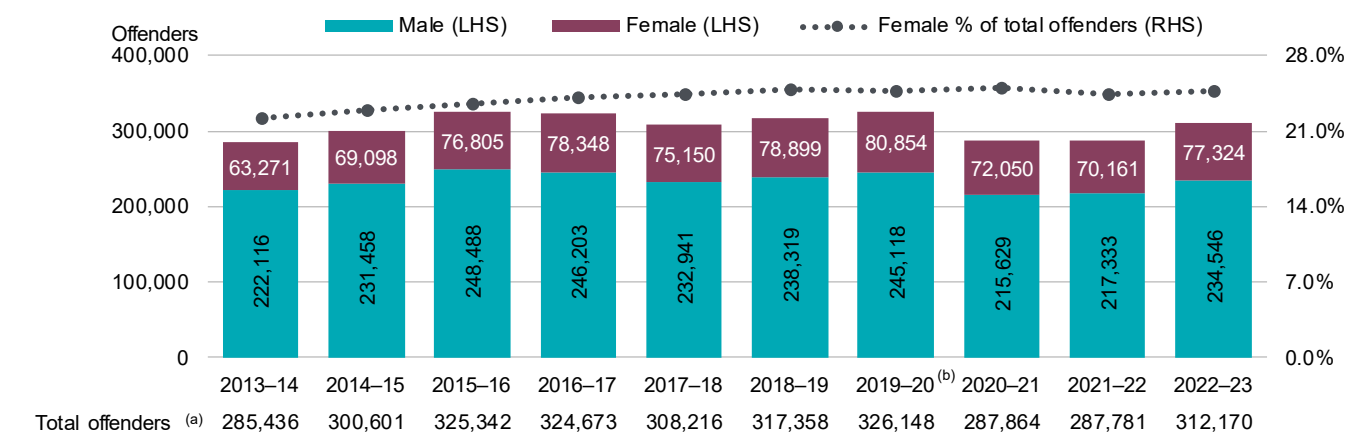

### 7.2.1. Sex of offender

The majority of police proceedings in 2022–23 were against *male* offenders (75.1%), a decrease of 2.7 percentage points when compared with 2013–14 (77.8%), and a slight decrease from 2021–22 (–0.4 percentage points). Conversely, the *female* proportion of total police actions against offenders has trended upwards over the time series, from 22.2% in 2013–14 to 24.8% in 2022–23, peaking at 25.1% of the total in 2020–21. Of particular note, while the numbers of male and female offenders have both increased compared with 2013–14, the increase for female offenders (+14,053 or +22.2%) has been larger than for male offenders (+12,430 or +5.6%) over the period.

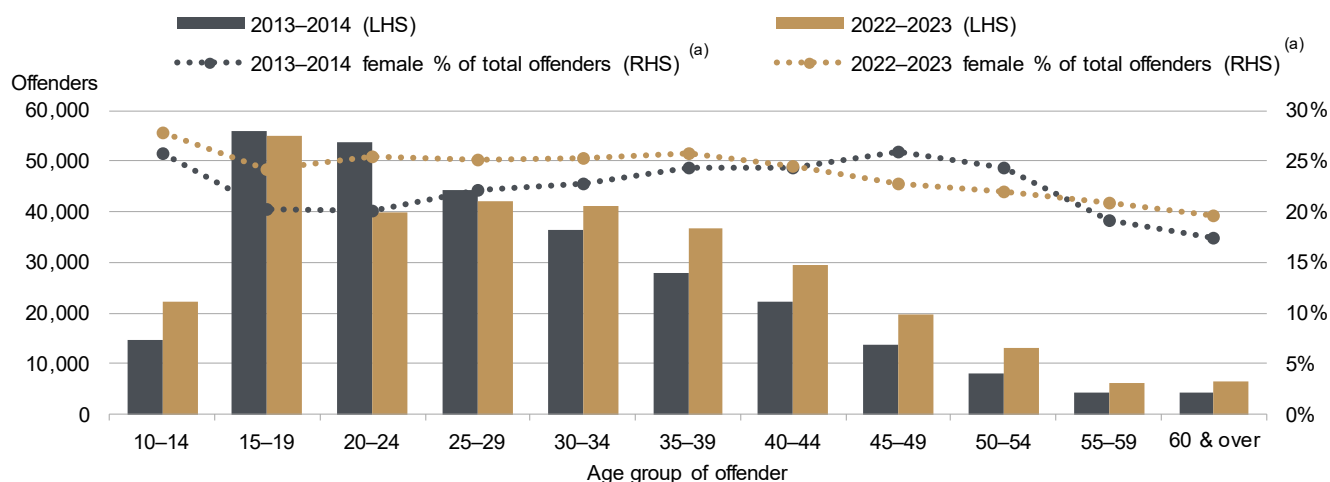

### 7.2.2. Age distribution

The offender cohort is generally older in 2022–23 than it was in 2013–14, with median age 29 years and 26 years respectively. Compared with 2013–14, the only under–30 years offender age group with an increase was the youngest, those aged 10–14 years (+ 53.6% or +7,799 offenders (not individuals)). Among the age groups with declining offender numbers, 20–24-year-olds saw the largest volume and proportional decrease (–14,152 offenders or –26.3%). Compared with 2013–14, offenders aged 35–39 years displayed the largest volume increase (+8,637) while those aged 50–54 years had the largest proportional increase (+60.8%).

For female offenders (not individuals) proceeded against by police, the age pattern for proportion of total offenders has changed over time, with more female offenders in every age group in 2022–23 than in 2013–14, except those aged 45–49 (–3.3 percentage points) and 50–54 years (–2.4 percentage points). The age group with the largest proportional increase in female offenders was 20–24 years (+5.3 percentage points) (Figure 11).

LHS = left hand side

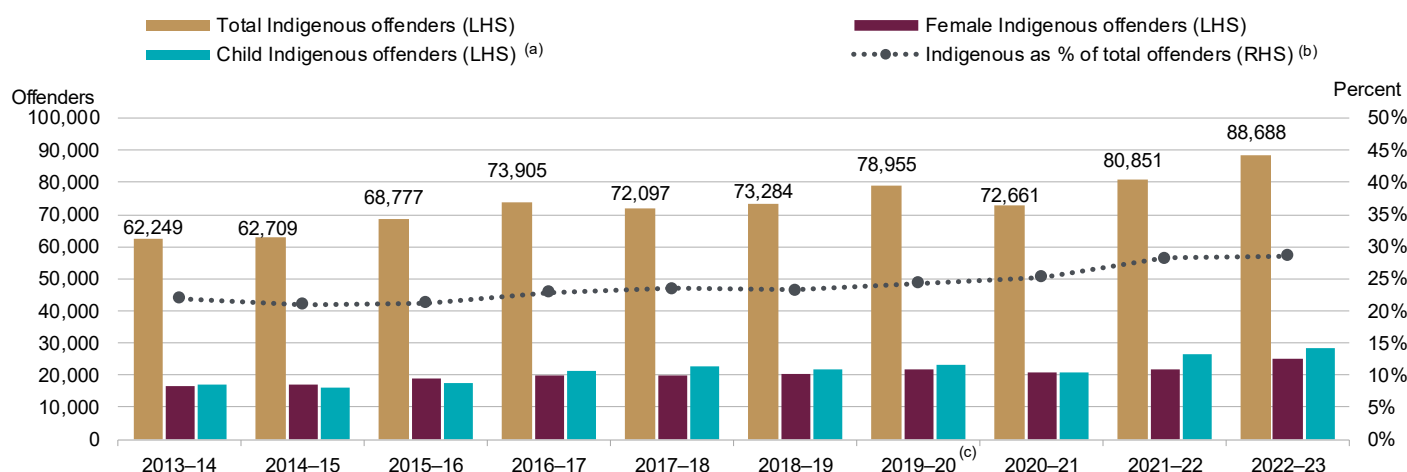
RHS = right hand side

### 7.3. Indigenous status

In 2022–23, a total of 88,688 Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander offenders (not individuals) were proceeded against by police, 7,837 more (or +9.7%) than in 2021–22 (Figure 12). Of all offenders whose Indigenous status was stated, the proportion identifying as Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander was almost identical to that of the previous year (28.5% compared with 28.2%). The number of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander female offenders rose to 25,022 in 2022–23, a 15.3% year-on-year increase, while total young Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander offenders were at a series high for the second consecutive year, with 28,527 proceedings against children aged 10–17 years.

RHS = right hand side

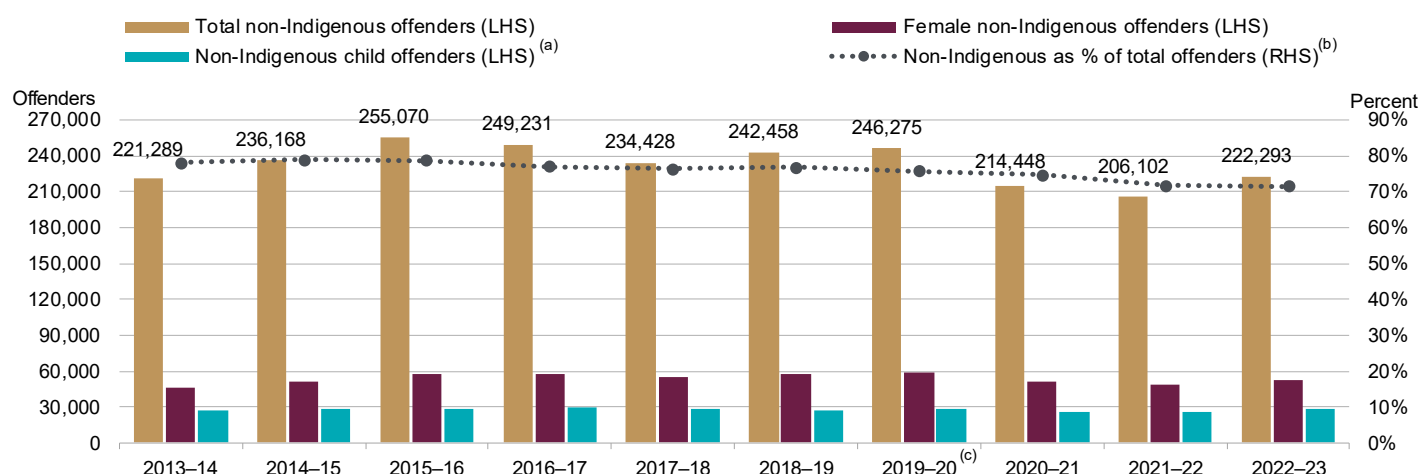

A total of 222,293 non-Indigenous offenders (not individuals) were actioned by police in 2022–23, 16,191 more than in 2021–22 (+7.9%) (Figure 13). After decreasing slightly in the previous two years, the number of non-Indigenous female offenders increased in 2022–23 by 3,745 (+7.8%). The number of non-Indigenous child offenders returned to pre-pandemic level, increasing by 2,530 offenders (+9.7%). As a proportion of the total, non-Indigenous offenders reached a series low in 2022–23 for the second consecutive year, comprising 71.5% of all offenders.

(b) Represents non-Indigenous offenders as a proportion of all offenders whose Indigenous status was stated.

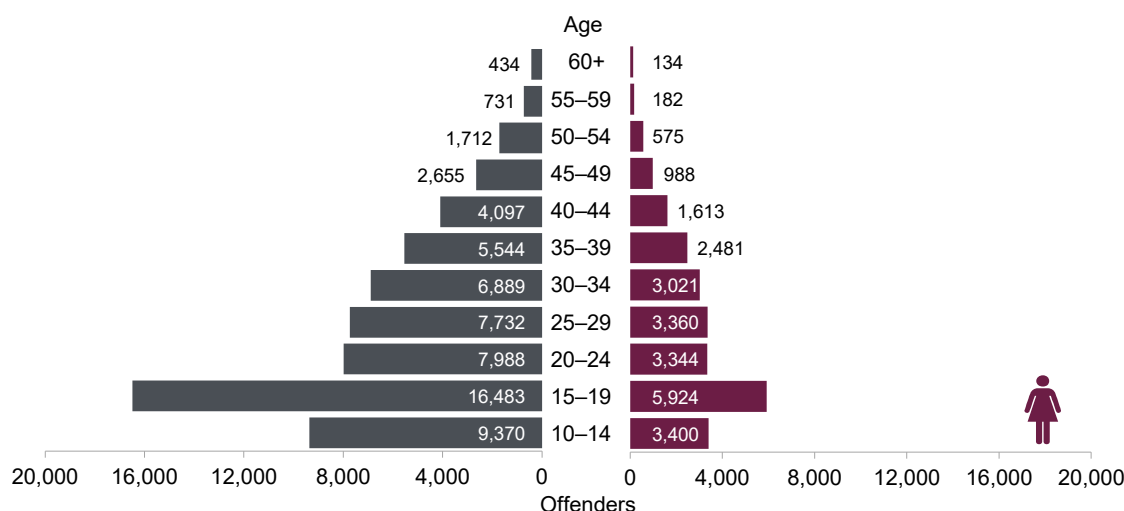

### 7.3.1. Distribution by age, sex and Indigenous status

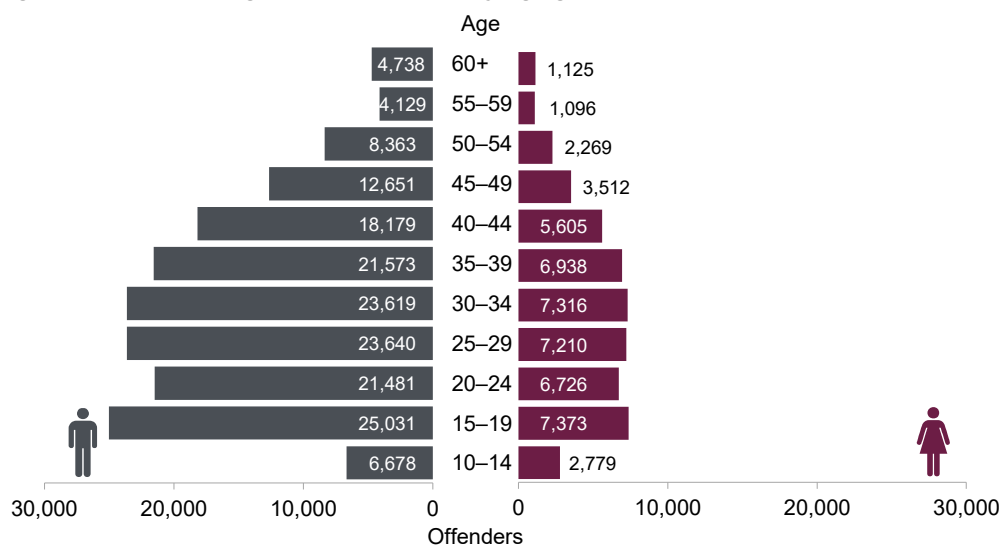
**Figure 14** Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander<sup>(a)</sup> offenders by age group and sex<sup>(b)</sup>, 2022–23

There are distinctive patterns of distribution of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander and non-Indigenous offenders across age and sex, highlighted in Figure 14 and Figure 15. Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander offenders were generally younger than non-Indigenous offenders. The most prevalent offender group was those aged 15–19 years, irrespective of Indigenous status or sex. In terms of sex, despite females being under-represented in all offender age groups, the number of females is closer to that of males among Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander offenders (one female to 2.5 males) than it is among non-Indigenous offenders (one female to 3.3 males).

For Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander offenders, there were only minor differences between male and female offenders in the age distribution patterns (Figure 14). In contrast with the non-Indigenous offender cohort, over half of all offenders (not individuals) were aged between 10 and 24 years when a police action was taken against them (50.6% for females and 53.2% for males) and over one in ten offenders was younger than 15 years (13.6% of females and 14.7% of males). The overall gender ratio for offenders identifying as Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander was similar across most age groups with more than two but fewer than three male offenders for every female offender. Less than one in ten were aged 45 years or older, 8.7% of males and 7.5% of females.

The non-Indigenous offender age group distribution was very similar for both males and females (Figure 15). Almost a third of offenders (not individuals) were aged 10–24 years at time of police action (32.5% for females and 31.3% for males) and around one in five offenders was younger than 20 years old (19.5% for females and 18.6% for males). Across most age groups among non-Indigenous offenders, there were 3–4 male offenders to every female offender (ratios range from 3.1 to 3.8) except for the youngest and oldest age groups. The gap was smaller for those aged 10–14 years, with over twice as many male as female offenders (ratio of 2.4), while for those aged 60 years and older the ratio increased to 4.2.

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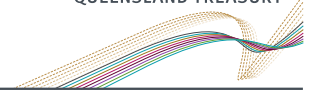

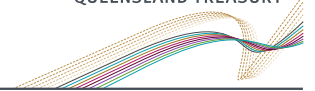

## 7.4. Offence category and type

In this section, offenders are classified into the three broad categories of the offences for which they were actioned by police: other offences (comprising 57.9% of offenders (not individuals) proceeded against by police in 2022–23); offences against property (32.4%) and offences against the person (9.6%). All three categories are then further disaggregated as shown in Table 58.

Although comprising fewer offenders than in 2013–14, *drug offences* was the most prevalent offence type for which offenders were proceeded against (17.1%) in 2022–23, followed by *traffic and related offences* (13.8%) and *other theft (excl. unlawful entry)* (13.3%). *Breach of domestic violence protection order* accounted for the fifth-largest group of offenders in 2022–23 (10.2%) after *good order offences* (11.2%).

The largest year-on-year offender volume increase was for *other theft (excl. unlawful entry)*, with 6,091 more offenders actioned than in 2021–22, followed by *breach of domestic violence protection order* with 5,083 more offenders than in the previous year. *Traffic and related offences* had the third-largest increase in offender numbers, which was the second-largest increase in ten years (+3,890) for this offence type. Offender numbers also increased for *unlawful entry* (+2,703), *unlawful use of a motor vehicle* (+1,929) and *assault* offences (+1,703) in 2022–23, although somewhat less than in 2021–22.

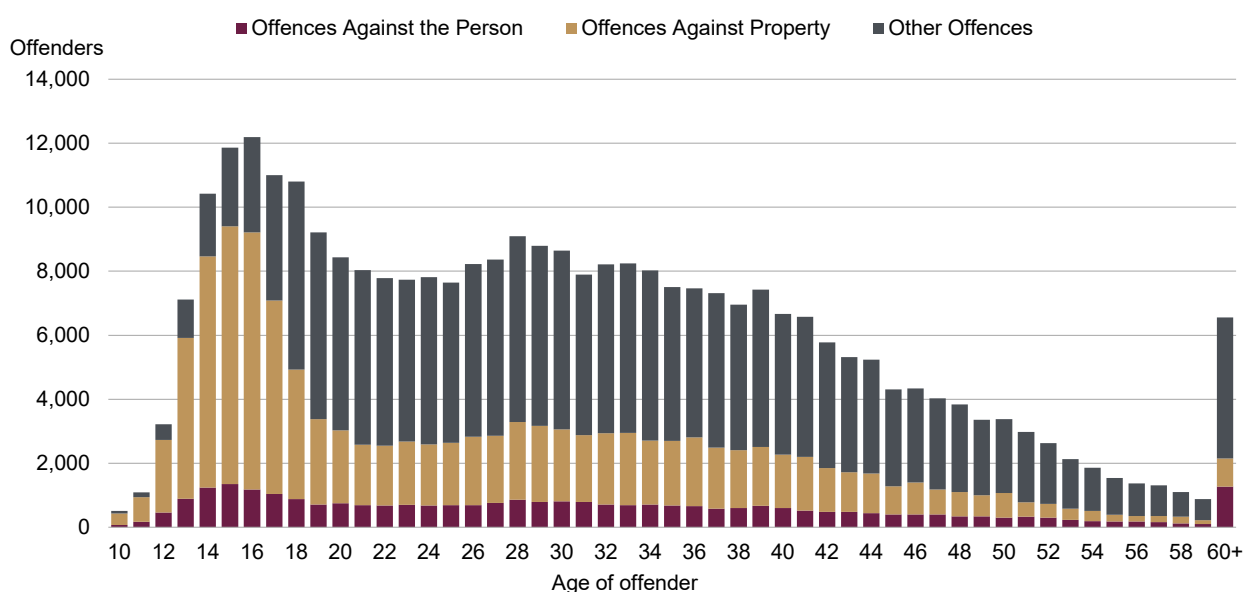

### 7.4.1. Offenders by age and offence type

When considering offence category, offender numbers in each category fluctuate by age at time of police proceeding. Figure 16 reveals differences in the number of offenders for each offence category by offender age at time of police action. For example, the number of offenders aged 10–17 years proceeded against for property offences is larger than for those aged 18 and over. In fact, half of all offenders (not individuals) actioned by police for property offences were aged 23 years or younger at the time of police proceeding, compared with 29 years for offences against the person and 32 years for other offences.

Overall, the largest group of offenders in each of the three offence categories was those aged 18 years and under at time of police proceeding in 2022–23. The two most prevalent ages of property offenders were 15 and 16 years (8,049 and 8,031 offenders respectively), while 15 years represented the most frequent offender age for personal offences (1,353) and 18 years for other offences (5,883).

Note: 60+ represents offenders (not individuals) aged 60 years and all ages above, while all other data points represent a single year of age.

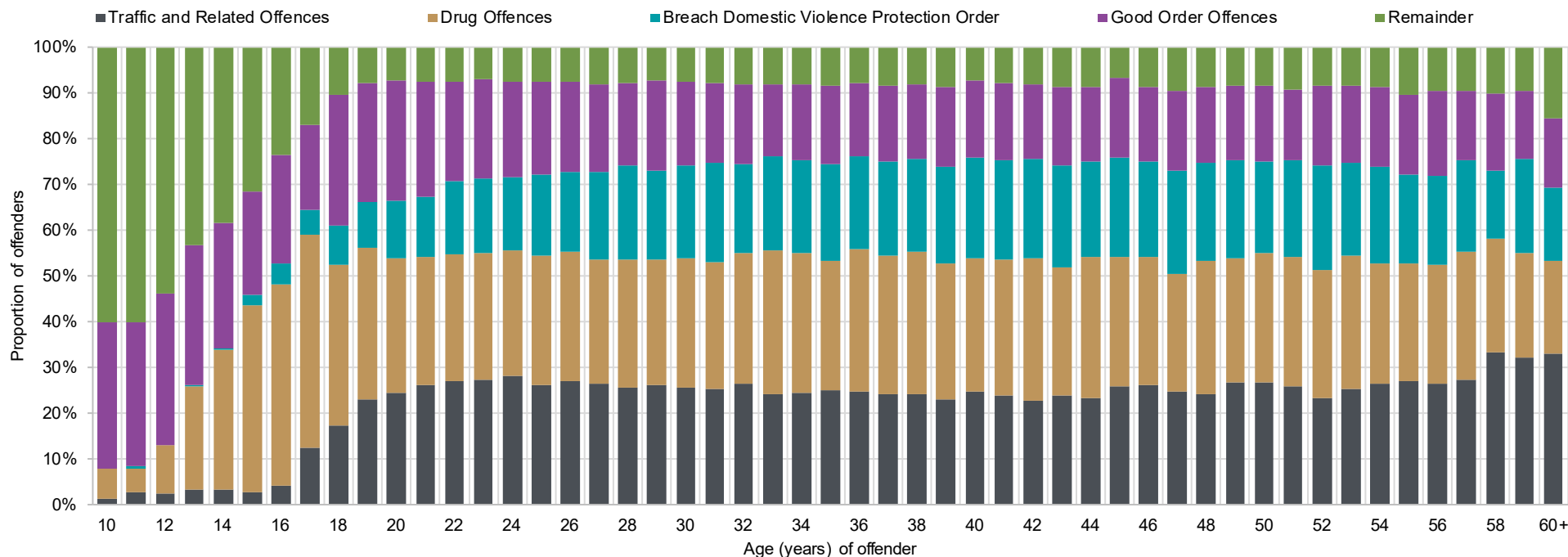
Property offences, especially *unlawful entry*, *unlawful use of motor vehicle* and *other theft (excl. unlawful entry)* are most prevalent among very young offenders.

One in five offenders aged 27 years and older was proceeded against for *breach of domestic violence order*.

Within the 'other' offences category, the proportions of offenders for different offence types varied greatly according to offender age (Figure 17). The proportion of offenders actioned by police increased with age for *drug offences*, *traffic and related offences* and *breach domestic violence protection order*, while decreasing for *good order offences* and 'remainder'.

- Almost half of all 17-year-old non-unique offenders were proceeded against for *drug offences* (46.4%), the largest proportion for this offence type.
- Among offenders aged 19 to 57 years, around a quarter were actioned for *traffic and related offences* (22.7% to 28.1%) and the proportion increased to a third for offenders aged over 57 years.
- One in five offenders aged 27 years and older was proceeded against for *breach domestic violence protection order*.
- A large amount of the 'remainder' offences among offenders aged 10–14 years were trespassing and vagrancy offences (70.2% to 51.4% of total other offences).

Note: 60+ represents offenders (not individuals) aged 60 years and all ages above, while all other data points represent a single year of age.

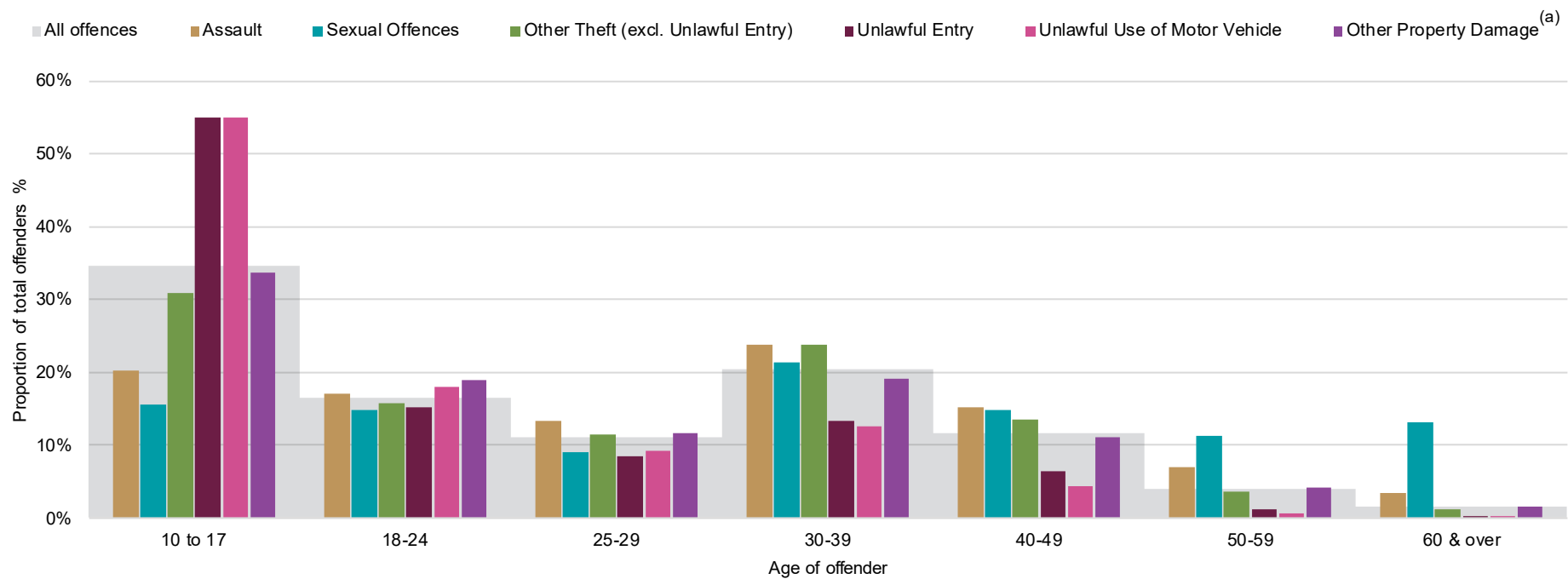

The age profiles for selected person and property offences are displayed in Figure 18, showing offences that were ranked one to five overall in 2022–23. The proportion of offenders proceeded against for *unlawful entry* and *unlawful use of a motor vehicle* offences was highest in the 10–17 years age group (55.0% for each offence type). Almost one in four offenders aged 30–39 was proceeded against for *assault or other theft (excl. unlawful entry)* offences (23.8% and 23.7% respectively).

It should be noted, that the reference date for offender statistics is the date police commenced action against the offender, and some offences recorded in 2022–23 will have occurred in years prior.

## 7.5. Adult offenders (non-unique)

### 7.5.1. Sex and Indigenous status

In 2022–23, adult offenders accounted for 81.6% of all offenders (254,760) proceeded against by police. The number of adult offenders (not individuals) overall increased by 8.4% (+19,825) compared with the previous year.

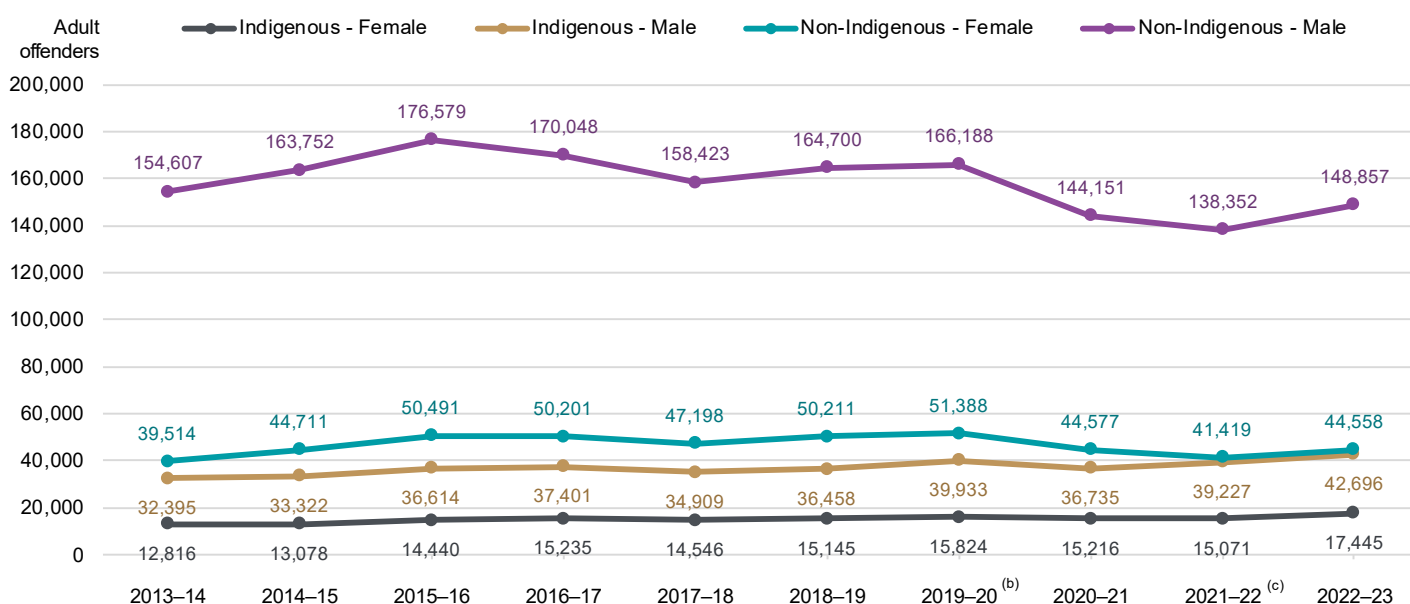
Among offenders whose Indigenous status and sex were stated, the cohort of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander adult offenders increased 10.8% (+5,843) to 60,141 (females +15.8% to 17,445 and males +8.8% to 42,696) and non-Indigenous adult offenders, males and females alike, rose by 7.6% to 148,857 and 44,558 offenders respectively.

Overall, for every female adult offender there were 3.1 adult male offenders in 2022–23. These differences by sex are larger for non-Indigenous than for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander adult offenders (3.3 vs 2.4).

In 2022–23, there were almost as many Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander male offenders as non-Indigenous female offenders (42,696 compared with 44,558), the smallest volume difference between the two cohorts in the 10-year time series.

In this report, adult offenders are those aged 18 years and older at time police action commenced against them, for 2022–23 and across the whole time series.

### 7.5.2. Offence type

Other offences accounted for almost two-thirds (167,627 or 65.8%) of adult offenders proceeded against by police in 2022–23, followed by property offences (63,505 or 24.9%) and personal offences (23,628 or 9.3%).

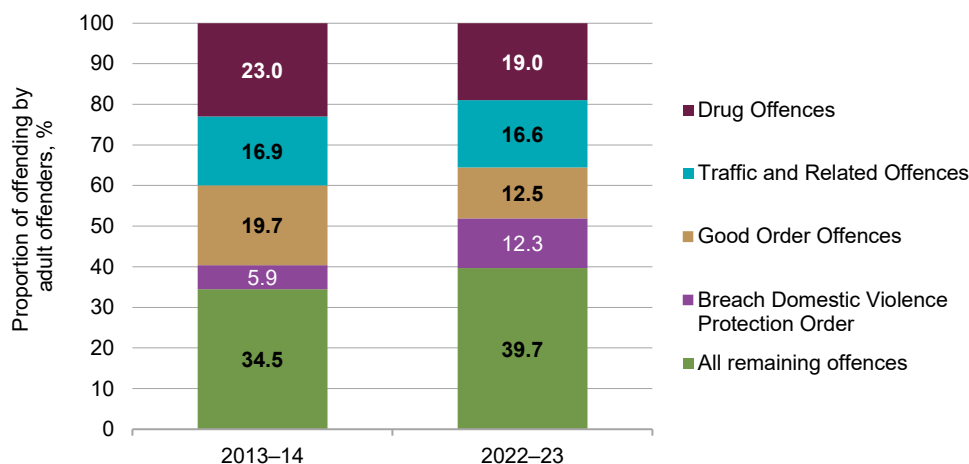
Figure 20 shows the four most prevalent offences by adult offenders in 2022–23, compared with the same offences in 2013–14. The top 4 offences accounted for over half (60.3%) of all adult offending in 2022–23, while in 2013–14 those same offences accounted for almost two-thirds (65.5%). Although there have been slight changes to most offence rankings over time, *drug offences* has been the most prevalent offence type among adult offenders throughout, accounting for 19.0% of adult offenders in 2022–23, four percentage points less than in 2013–14. *Traffic and related offences* and *good order offences* ranked second and third in 2022–23 and have done so for each of the past ten years, though their rankings reversed in 2017–18. While the proportion of *traffic and related offences* remained relatively steady over the ten-year period (ranging from 14.3% to 16.9%), the proportion of *good order offences* has decreased notably (from 19.7% to 12.5% over the same period), resulting in a series low in 2022–23 for offender numbers for this offence type (31,787).

From 2020–21 onwards, *breach domestic violence protection order* replaced *other theft (excl. unlawful entry)* as the fourth-most prevalent offence type amongst adult offenders actioned by police, largely attributable to the change in

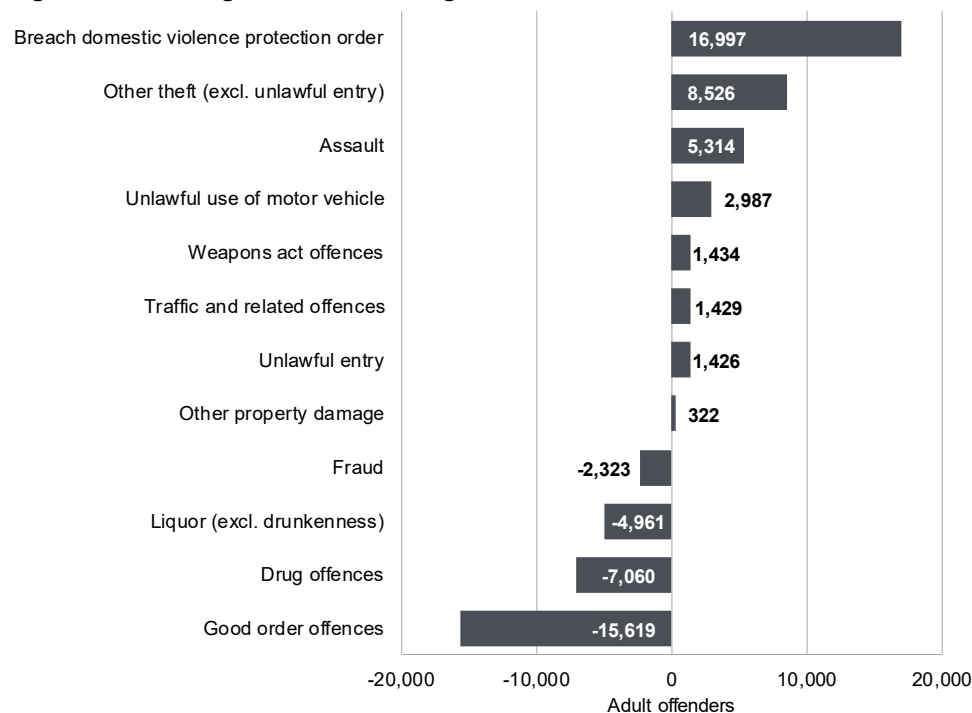


practice requiring police to record all offences in investigations relating to domestic and family violence. This in turn led to the number of adult offenders (not individuals) proceeded against for *breach domestic violence protection order* in 2022–23 being more than double the number in 2013–14 (31,300 compared with 14,303), while those proceeded against for *good order offences* decreased by a third (31,787 compared with 47,406) (Figure 21). Despite remaining proportionally the most prevalent, the number actioned by police for *drug offences* decreased over the same period (–7,060 or –12.7%).

**Figure 21** Change in adult offending, selected offences<sup>(a)</sup>, 2013–14 to 2022–23

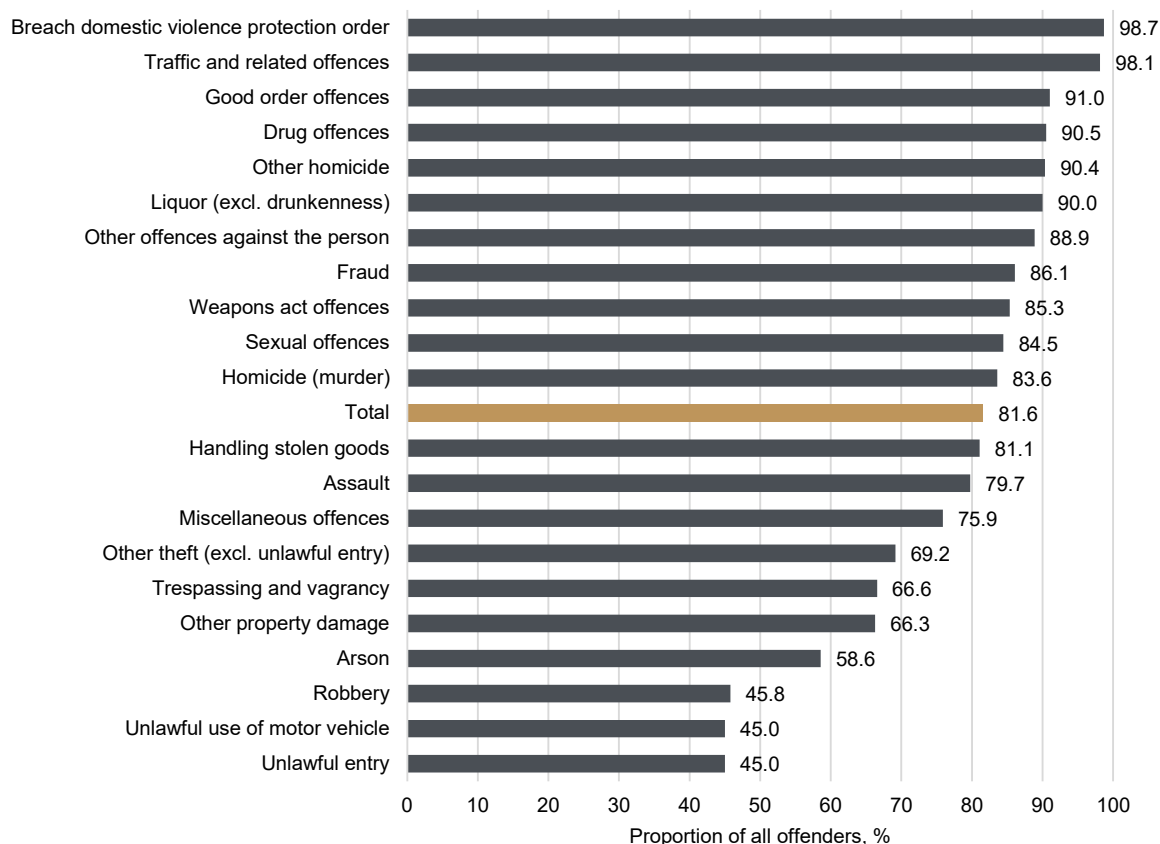

Although adults accounted for 87.9% of Queensland's population aged 10 years and older, adult offenders comprised a smaller proportion (81.6%) of all offenders in 2022–23, the same as in the previous year (Figure 22).<sup>3</sup> Nevertheless, the proportion of the whole is highly associated with offence type, i.e. some offences are more likely to be committed by an adult than a child. For 11 of the 21 offence types analysed, adults comprised more than 81.6% of total offenders (not individuals), topped by *breach domestic violence protection order* offences with 98.7% of offenders aged 18 years or older. At the lower end of the spectrum, less than half of all offenders actioned for *robbery*, *unlawful use of motor vehicle* and *unlawful entry* offences (45.8%, 45.0% and 45.0% respectively) were adults.

## 7.6. Child offenders (non-unique)

### 7.6.1. Sex and Indigenous status

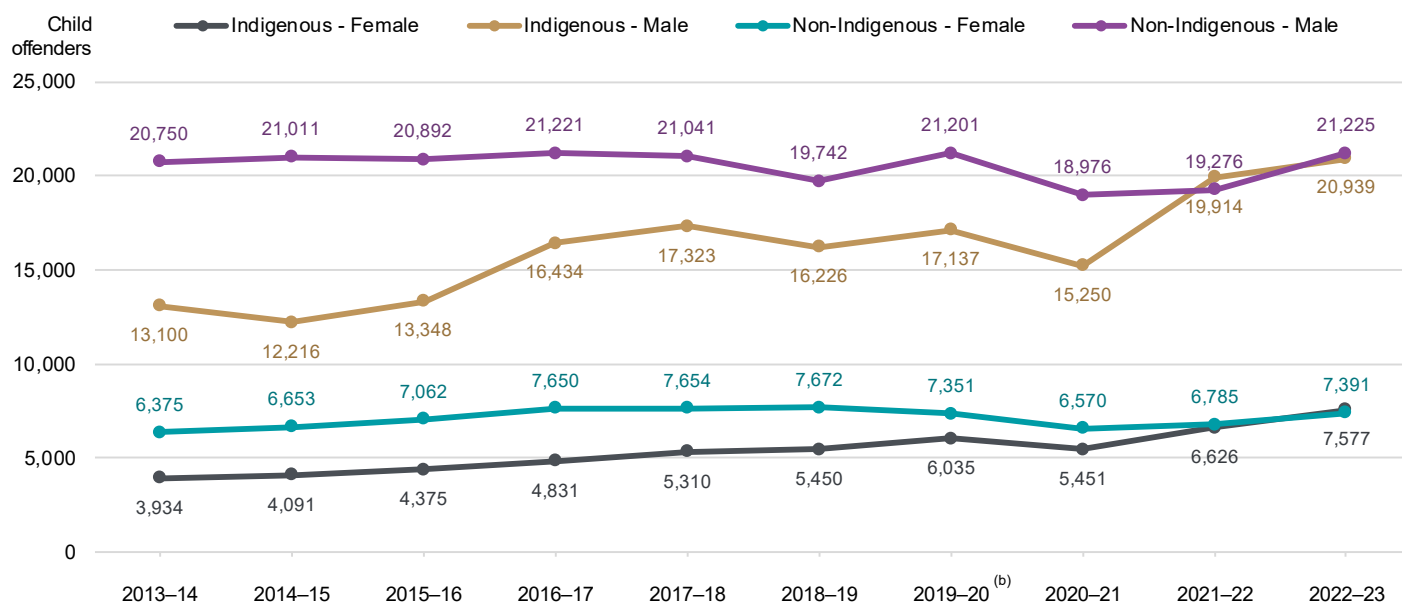
In 2022–23, the number of non-unique offenders aged 10–17 years proceeded against by police increased to 57,410, representing an increase of 8.6% (+4,564) from 2021–22.<sup>4</sup>

Among those with recorded Indigenous status, there were almost as many Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander as non-Indigenous child offenders (28,527 and 28,665 respectively)(Figure 23). Although slowly decreasing, the overall male to female young offender ratio has been close to three male offenders for every one female offender in each year of the time series (ranging from 3.3 in 2013–14 to 2.8 in 2022–23, with the lowest being 2.7 in 2018–19). This overall gender distribution pattern was also similar in each of the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander and non-Indigenous sub-cohorts.

In 2022–23, the increase in number of young female Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander offenders almost equalled that of their male counterparts (+951 females compared with +1,025 males), while among non-Indigenous child offenders, male offender numbers grew more than three times that of females (+1,949 and +606 offenders respectively). In the most recent two years, there was almost no difference between Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander and non-Indigenous child offenders (not individuals) by gender.

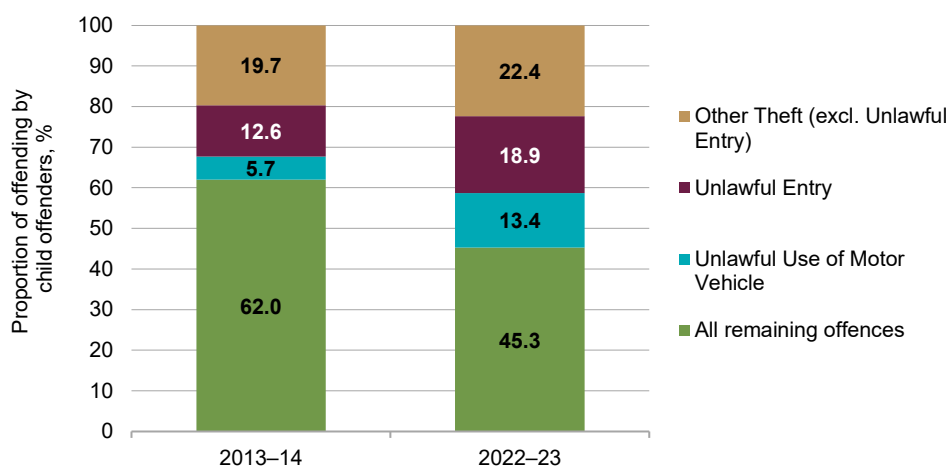

### 7.6.2. Offence type

Property offences accounted for around two-thirds (37,791 or 65.8%) of child offenders (not individuals) proceeded against by police in 2022–23, followed by other offences (13,231 or 23.0%) and offences against the person (6,388 or 11.1%).

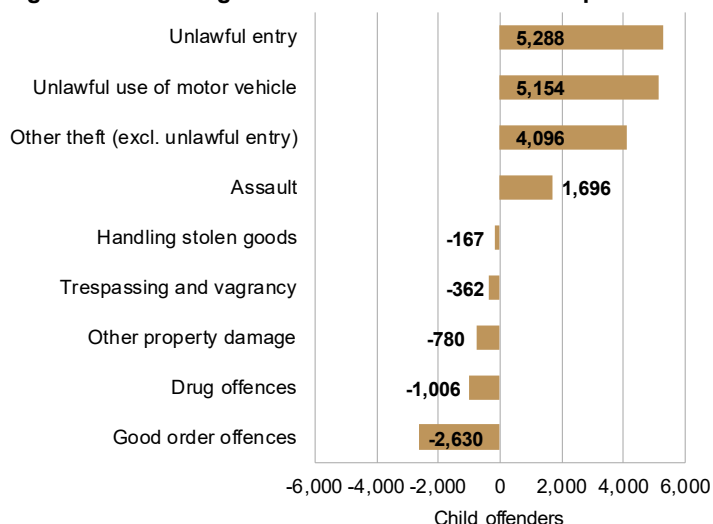
The top 3 offences in Figure 24 accounted for over half (54.7%) of all child offending in 2022–23, while in 2013–14 they accounted for only 38.0%. Although there have been slight changes to most offence rankings over time, *other theft (excl. unlawful entry)* has been the most prevalent offence among child offenders throughout, accounting for around one in five child offenders actioned (from 19.7% to 22.4%). While in 2013–14, *drug* and *good order offences* had a higher prevalence among young offenders, ranking second and third respectively, those two offence types were ranked fourth and seventh in 2022–23. The two most prevalent offences after *other theft* in 2022–23 were *unlawful entry* and *unlawful use of motor vehicle*, together accounting for almost a third (32.3%) of all proceedings against child offenders, marking the largest proportional increase for any offence type compared with 2013–14.

The number of child offenders (not individuals) actioned by police for *unlawful entry* in 2022–23 almost doubled compared with 2013–14 (10,875 compared with 5,587), and those actioned for *unlawful use of motor vehicle* have trebled (7,688 compared with 2,534) (Figure 25). Conversely, offenders proceeded against for *good order offences* almost halved (3,132 compared with 5,762) and those actioned for *drug offences* decreased by 16.6% (5,069 compared with 6,075 offenders in 2013–14).

**Figure 25** Change in number of child offenders proceeded against by police, selected offences<sup>(a)</sup>, 2013–14 to 2022–23

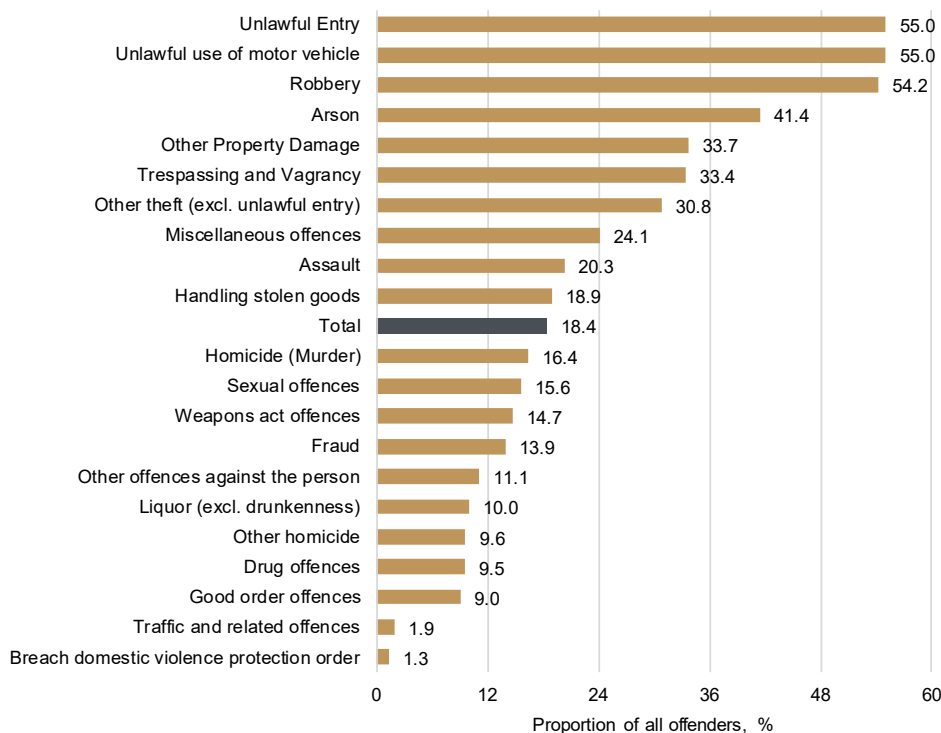

Although children aged 10–17 years comprised just 11.9% of Queensland’s estimated resident population aged 10 years and over in 2022–23, they comprised 18.4% of all offenders, the same as in the previous year.<sup>5</sup> Nevertheless, young offenders as a proportion of the whole are highly associated with offence type, i.e. some offences are more likely to be committed by a child than an adult. For 10 out of 21 offence types, child offenders comprised more than 18.4% of all offenders, and for three of those they comprised more than half: *unlawful entry* (55.0%), *unlawful use of motor vehicle* (55.0%) and *robbery* (54.2%) (Figure 26).

## 8.0 Victims of offences against the person

In this report, **recorded victim** statistics relate to offences against the person only, and they relate only to offences reported to or detected by police. Victim statistics are compiled on the basis of one victim per offence type within a single incident recorded by police. **Unique victim** statistics provide a picture of the number of individual persons who have been recorded by police during the reference period (financial year) as a victim of an offence against the person.

Statistics are compiled on the basis of the date an offence was reported to / detected by police, regardless of when the offence occurred. In some instances, particularly with homicide and sexual offences, there may be a large time difference between when the offence occurred and the report/detection date. Victim age is calculated as at the date the offence has become known to police.

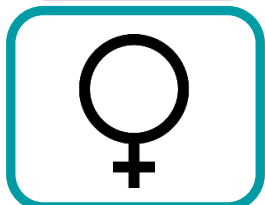
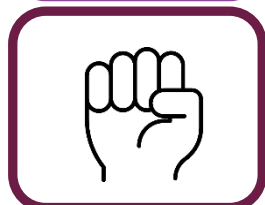

### All offences against the person

- Unique victims of offences against the person reached a 10-year high in 2022–23.
- Compared with 2021–22, victimisation rates for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander as well as non-Indigenous persons increased 9.1% and 16.0%, respectively.
- The personal victimisation rate of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander persons was five times that of non-Indigenous persons.
- Almost 2 in 5 unique victims were females younger than 40 years (39.7%).

### Assault accounted for almost 3 in 4 recorded victims

- Most recorded victims were victims of *common assault* (43.1%) or *serious assault* (i.e. causing injury) (42.7%).
- Almost half (46.8%) of the recorded victims of *assault* were aged 20 to 39 years.
- Among Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander victims of assault, 71.5% were female.

### Females accounted for 3 in 5 recorded victims

- Victims of *sexual offences* and *stalking* were mostly female (85.0% and 82.7%).
- Three in four women were victimised by someone they know (75.4%).
- Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander females were 6.2 times more likely to be recorded as victims than non-Indigenous females.

## 8.1. Unique victims

*Unique victim* statistics provide a picture of the number of individual persons who have been recorded by police during the reference period (financial year) as a victim of an offence against the person.

A total of 61,458 unique (individual) victims of offences against the person were recorded in 2022–23, a 17.7% year-on-year increase (+9,225) (Figure 27). Since the beginning of the time series in 2013–14, unique victim numbers increased by 38,278 (or +165.1%), with the two years following implementation of the change to police recording practices (2021–22 and 2022–23) contributing 63.9% (24,467) of the overall increase.

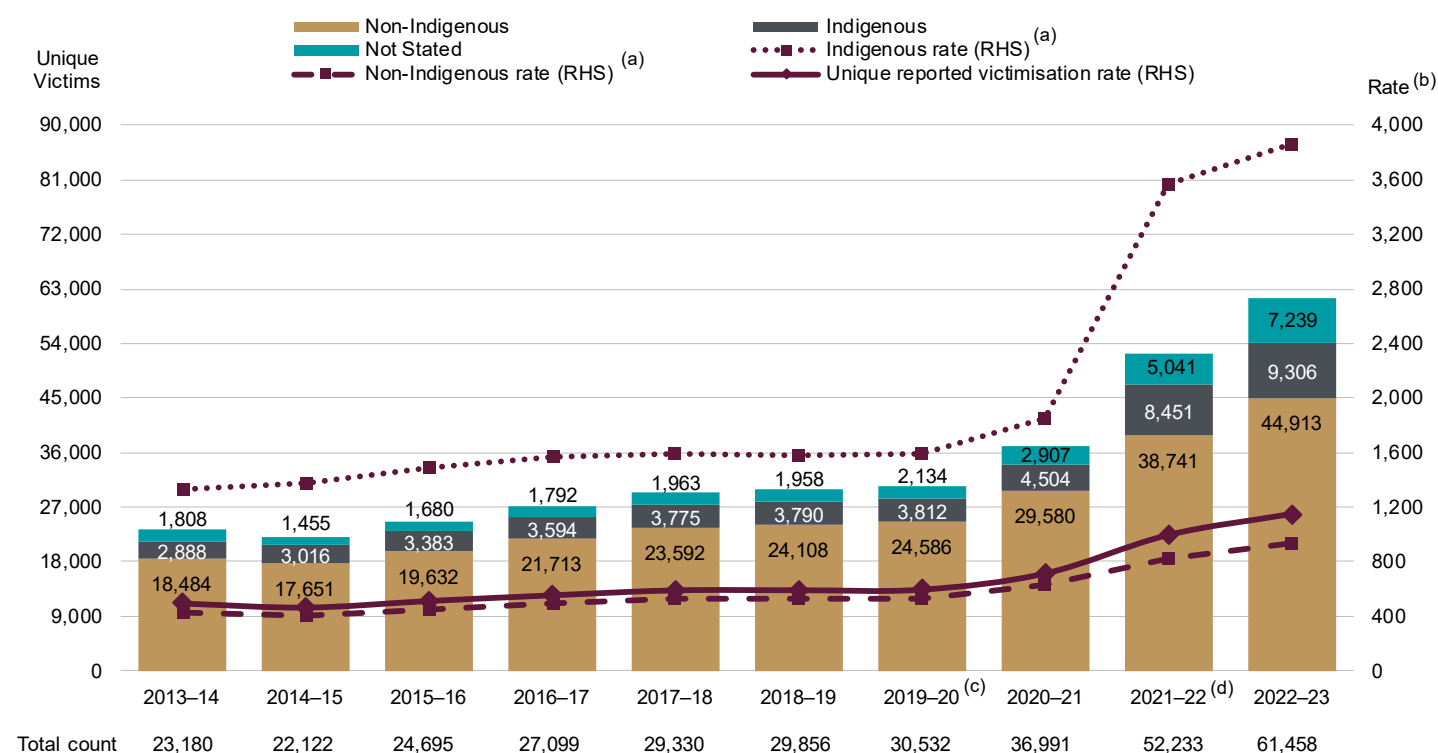
Similarly, the unique victimisation rate has almost doubled, from 595.5 in 2019–20 to 1,143.9 victims per 100,000 persons in 2022–23 (+92.1%).

### 8.1.1. Indigenous status

After an unprecedented increase in unique Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander victims in 2021–22 (+3,947 or +87.6%), a further 855 (+10.1%) unique victims were recorded in 2022–23. Non-Indigenous unique victim numbers also grew in 2022–23, by 6,172 (or +15.9%), although less than the increase seen in 2021–22 (+9,161 or +31.0%).

The victimisation rate for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples rose to 3,865.1 victims per 100,000 persons compared with a much smaller peak for non-Indigenous victims of 931.1 victims per 100,000 persons. Nevertheless, compared with the previous year, the victimisation rate increased for non-Indigenous more than for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples (14.0% compared with 8.3%).

### 8.1.2. Age and sex

The age and sex profiles of unique victims have shifted since the beginning of the time series, as presented in Figure 28 and Figure 29:

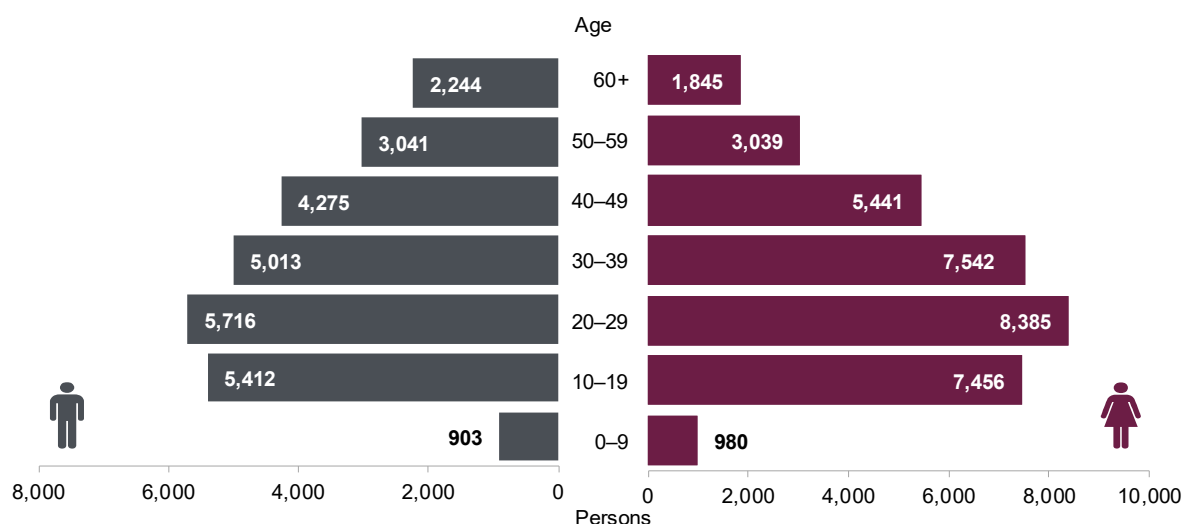
- The total number of unique victims has increased considerably for every age group and sex, however this growth has been larger for older unique victims. For example, the largest proportional increase was in victims aged 60 years and older (+341.1%), while unique victims aged 0–9 years increased the least (+337 or 21.8%).
- The male and female victim proportions have inverted. In 2022–23, female victims represented 56.6% of all victims, compared with 46.9% in 2013–14.

In 2013–14, almost a third (32.0%) of unique female victims were aged 10–19 years, making it the largest age cohort of all victims (3,471). In 2022–23, the single largest age cohort was 20–29-year-olds (8,385), accounting for one in four female victims.

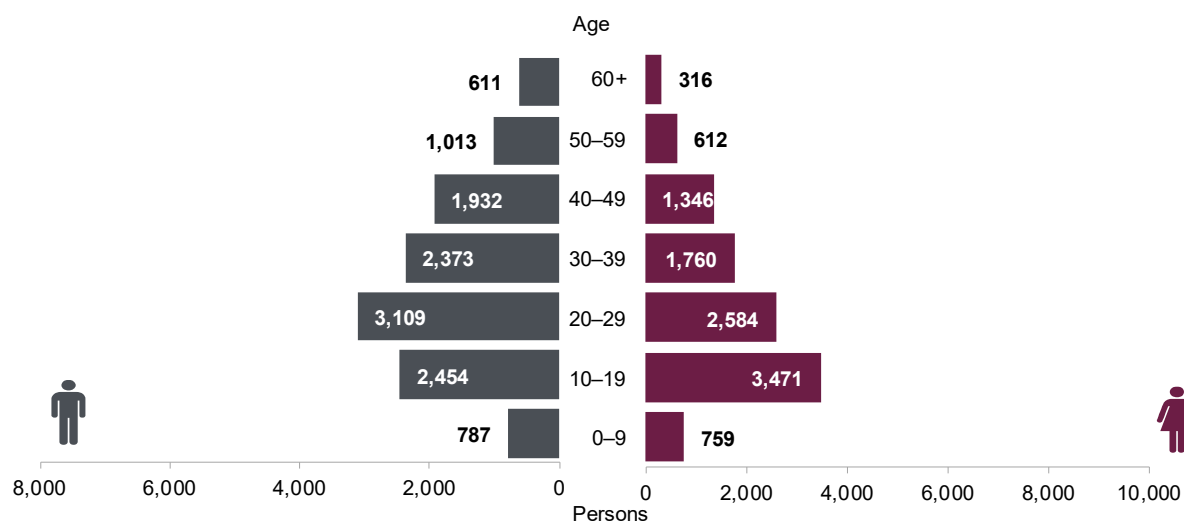
Both in 2022–23 and in 2013–14, the single largest age group of unique male victims was those aged 20–29 years (5,716 and 3,109 victims respectively), accounting for about one in four victims in both years. The only difference in the age profiles of male victims between 2022–23 and 2013–14, was that victims aged 60 years and older outnumbered those aged 0–9 years in 2022–23.

## 8.2. Total recorded victims

Queensland Police recorded 77,018 victims of personal offences in 2022–23, a 19.0% (+12,295) increase on the previous financial year (Figure 30).

Over the 10-year time series, the recorded victim count has almost trebled (+ 50,548 or +294.3%), and two-thirds (66.7%) of that increase (+33,695) has occurred in the two years since the change in police recording practice was implemented in July 2021. Over the same two years, the recorded personal victimisation rate has increased by 71.8%, from 834.6 victims per 100,000 persons in 2020–21 to 1,433.5 in 2022–23.

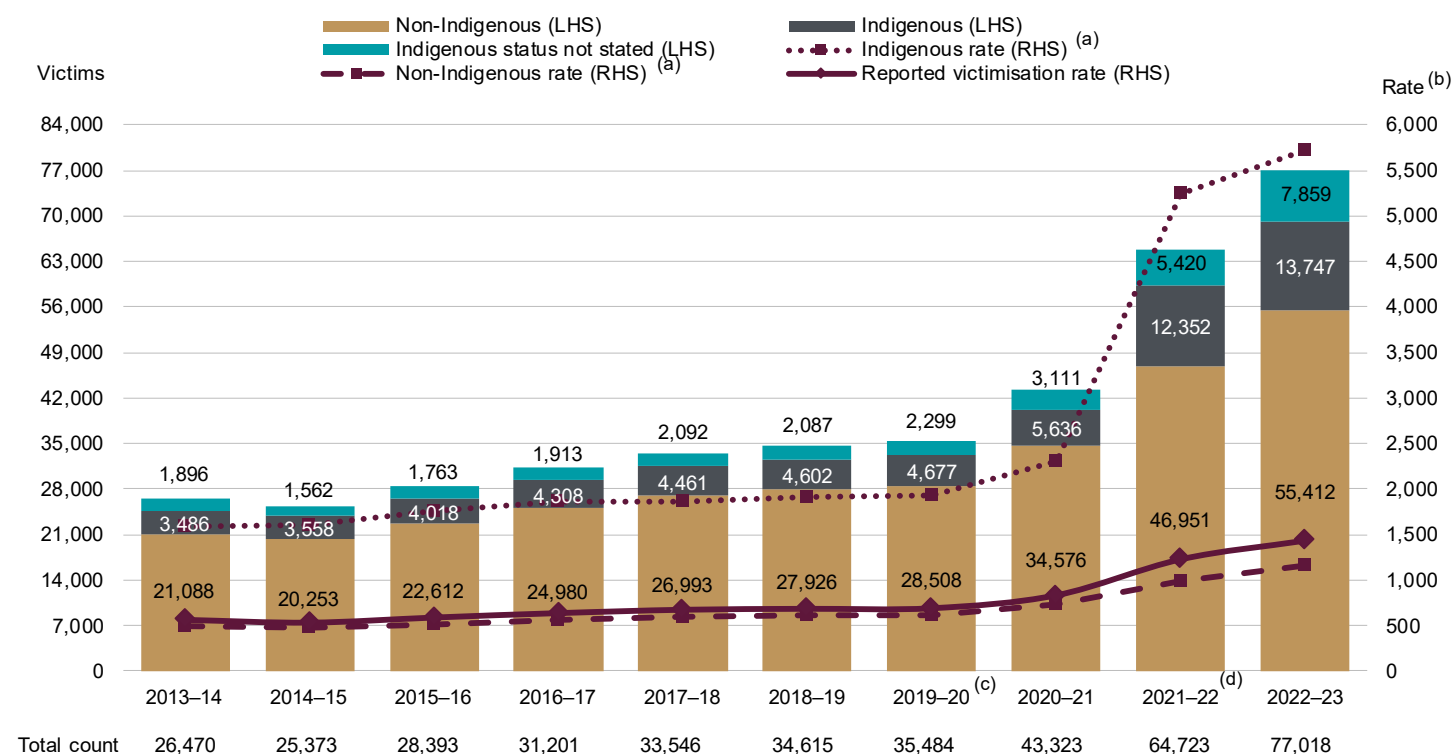
From July 2021, a change in police practice was implemented regarding the recording of all criminal offences associated with domestic and family violence-related investigations (see section 2.2 for details), resulting in increases in some recorded offences and recorded victims from 2021–22 onward. Such increases should be interpreted with caution when analysing time series data.

### 8.2.1. Indigenous status

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples have been highly overrepresented among victims of offences against the person over the ten years to 2022–23 (ranging from 14.0% to 20.8%), while accounting for only 4.6% of the total population in Queensland.<sup>6</sup> Across the time series, the rate ratio of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander victims per non-Indigenous victim has increased from a range of 3.1–3.4 between 2013–14 and 2020–21, to 5.3 in 2021–22, when the police practice change was implemented, and 5.0 in 2022–23.

The number of victims whose Indigenous status was not recorded has increased in recent years, with 7,859 such victims (10.2% of total) recorded in 2022–23. This appears to be an effect of increased use of online reporting of offending to police, with Indigenous status of the victim not supplied, affecting in turn the ability to report accurately on victimisation by Indigenous status.

### 8.2.2. Age and sex

The age group with most victims recorded in 2022–23 was 30–39 years, for females and males alike (10,548 and 5,949 victims respectively), followed by 40–49 years (7,298 and 5,021 victims).

For both females and males, the 60 years and older age group had the fewest victims recorded in 2022–23, although this was the only age group where male victims (2,474) outnumbered females (2,064).

**Victim's age** is as at date offence was reported to or detected by police, not at date offence occurred.

Be aware that, in some instances, particularly *homicide* and *sexual offences*, the time difference may be considerable.

Victim tables have been subjected to confidentialisation where cell values range from 1 to 3. All such cells ( $\leq 3$ ) are assigned a nominal value of 2. Cells with a value of zero remain unaltered.

Totals for certain variables, therefore, may vary slightly across tables within the report. (See *Explanatory notes* for more detail.)

### 8.2.3. Victims by offence type, sex and Indigenous status

As in every year, *assault* offences accounted for the majority of recorded victims in 2022–23 (72.3%), and of those, most were victims of *common assault* (43.1%) and *serious assault* (causing injury) (42.7%).

The proportion of recorded *assault* victims varied according to the victim's sex and Indigenous status. In 2022–23, victims recorded as female represented a larger proportion of total assault victims (56.0%) than those recorded as male (43.8%). The majority (70.1%) of all recorded *assault* victims were non-Indigenous (39,036) with males and females being almost equally victimised (48.4% and 51.4% respectively). This is in contrast to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander victims of *assault* (28.5% were male and 71.5% were female).

For the first time in ten years, victims of *other offences against the person* was the second-largest cohort of all victims in 2022–23 (previously it was *sexual offences* victims). This was mainly driven by increased numbers of victims of *life endangering acts* and *stalking* offences, with those victim groups growing by 2,599 or 55.5% and 916 or 85.8% respectively. Two in three (67.7%) non-Indigenous victims of *other offences against the*

*person* were female, while this proportion increased to four-in-five (80.8%) for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander females. Females aged 30–39 were the most prevalent victim age group for both offence types.

Victims of *sexual offences* accounted for 11.4% of all victims in 2022–23, less than in any previous year since 2013–14, and were mostly female (85.0%), irrespective of Indigenous status (83.5% of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander and 85.4% of non-Indigenous victims). The most prevalent victim age group was females aged 0–14 years old (1,919).

*Robbery* victims accounted for 3.2% of all victims, and numbers overall were twice as high for males as females (1,644 and 821) in 2022–23. While non-Indigenous victims (1,221 males and 595 females) shared this distribution pattern, for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander victims of *robbery*, females (70) outnumbered males (50).

Victims of *homicide* (murder) and *other homicide* (i.e. attempted murder, driving causing death) together accounted for less than 1% of recorded victims (0.07% and 0.1% respectively) in 2022–23. Males are typically over-represented as victims of these offences, and accounted for two-in-three victims of *murder* (66.0%) and three-in-five victims of *other homicide* (60.3%).

There were three times as many *assault* victims (55,681) recorded in 2022–23 than in 2013–14 (18,346), and most of the increase (68.6%) was recorded in the most recent two years (2021–22 and 2022–23), since the police recording change was implemented in July 2021 (Table 61). Driving the upward trend in *assault* victims were *common assault* and *serious assault*, together accounting for at least four in five recorded *assault* victims in each reference year.

Within *life endangering acts*, two offences experienced steep increases in recorded victims over the time series, namely *strangulation in a domestic setting* (from 1 victim in 2013–14 to 2,851 victims in 2022–23) and *threats/harassment-cyber* (from 0 victims in 2013–14 to 1,992 victims in 2022–23).

Compared with 2013–14, the total number of *sexual offences* victims doubled in 2022–23 and, similar to *assault* victims, over half of the growth was recorded in the past two years (50.8%). On a disaggregated level, *rape and attempted rape* victim numbers more than doubled (+164.0% or +2,045) and there were also 2,342 (+74.8%) more *other sexual offence* victims in 2022–23 than at the beginning of the time series.

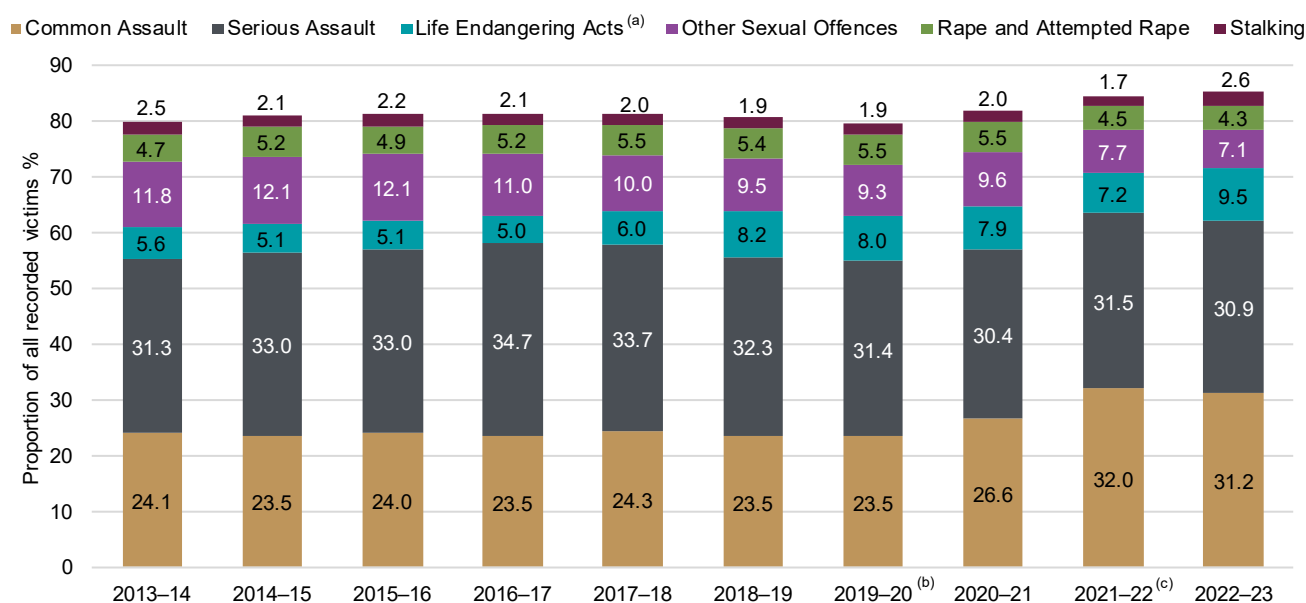

The changes in the proportions of victims of offences within the offence types of *assault*, *other offences against the person* and *sexual offences* over the ten-year time series is presented in Figure 31. The proportions of *assault* and *other offences against the person* victims peaked in 2021–22 at 74.7% and 13.4% of total victims respectively, while the proportion of *sexual offences* victims was highest in 2014–15 at 17.3% of the total.

The proportions of *grievous assault*, *serious assault* and *serious assault (other)* victims was slightly less in 2022–23 than in 2013–14, while the *common assault* victim proportion increased from 24.1% to 31.2% over the same period.

The proportions of victims of *life endangering acts* and *stalking* rose in 2022–23, to 9.5% and 2.6% of all victims respectively. Conversely, despite the number of *sexual offences* victims increasing to 8,764 in 2022–23, the year also marked time-series lows in victim proportions for both *rape and attempted rape* (4.3%) and *other sexual offences* (7.1%).

**Figure 31 Victims of selected offences against the person as % of total victims**



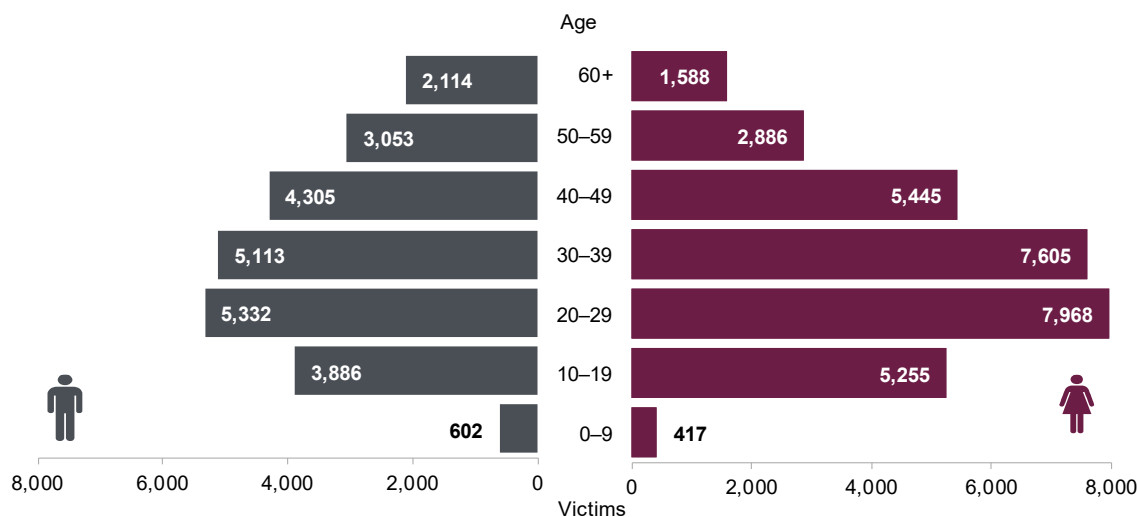

### 8.2.4. Age and sex, for selected offences

The age and sex profiles of recorded victims differ depending on the offence type, as illustrated in Figure 32, Figure 33 and Figure 34. In 2022-23, *assault* victims whose age and sex were recorded were more often female than male (56.1% vs 43.9%), although the age distribution patterns by sex were similar (Figure 32). The most prevalent *assault* victim age group was 20-29 years (7,968 female and 5,332 male victims), closely followed by those aged 30-39 years (7,605 female and 5,113 male victims). Overall, one-in-four *assault* victims was aged between 20 and 29 years when the offence was recorded. In the age groups 0-9 years, 50-59 years and 60 years and over, males were more likely than females to be the victim of an *assault* offence.

**Figure 32 Victims<sup>(a)</sup> of assault, 2022-23**

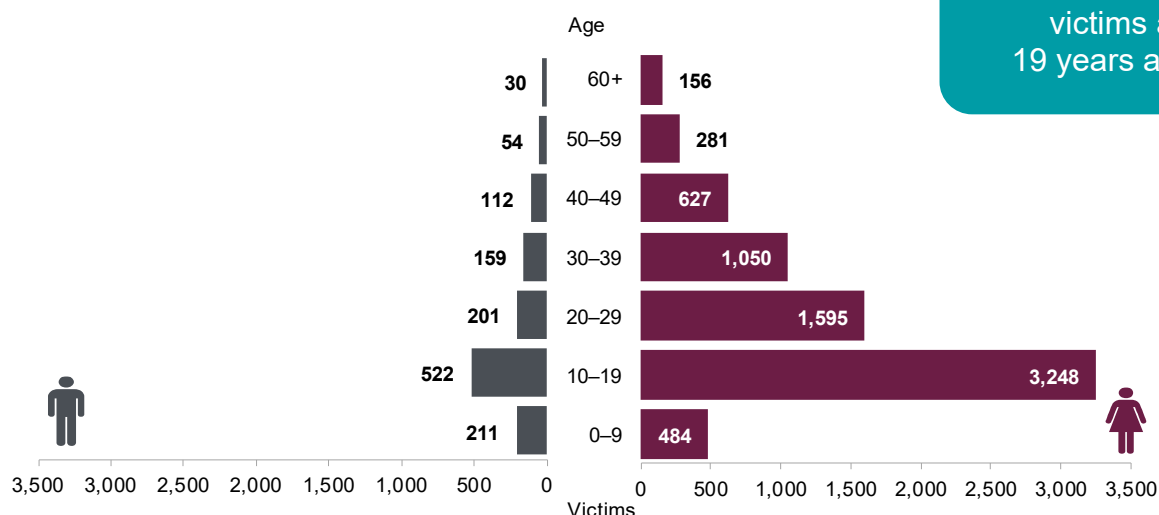
Victims of *assault* were concentrated between 20-39 years for both males and females

As in previous years, *sexual offences* victims with age and sex recorded in 2022–23 were predominantly young females. In fact, 42.7% were females aged 19 or younger. Across all age groups, females were between 2.3 to 7.9 times as likely as males to be recorded as a victim of a *sexual offence*. Irrespective of sex, most *sexual offences* victims were aged 10–19 years old when the offence was recorded.

**Figure 33 Victims<sup>(a)</sup> of sexual offences, 2022–23**

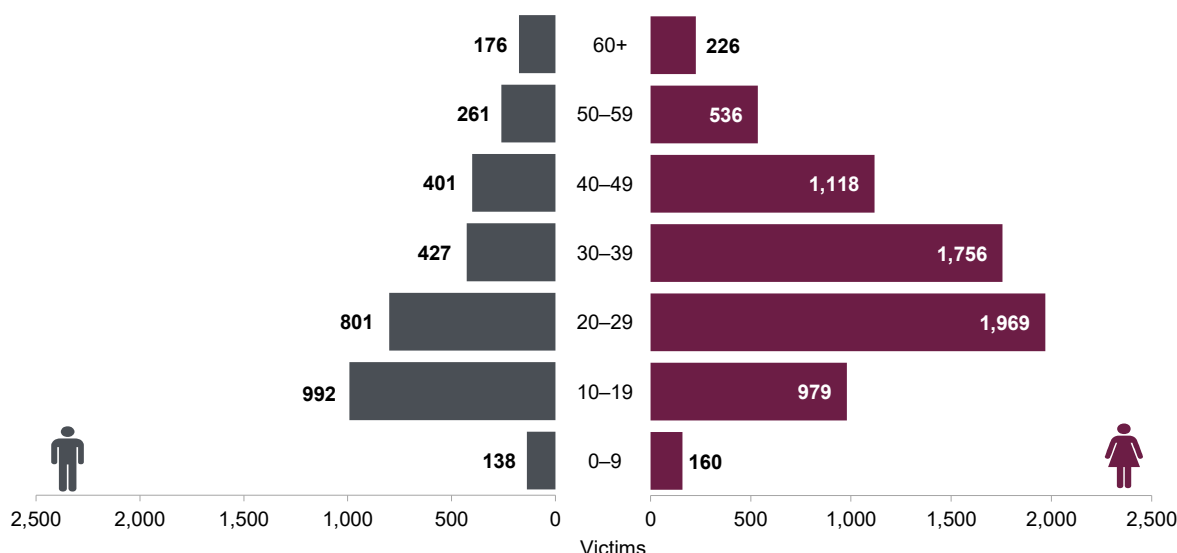

Similar to *sexual offences*, victims of *other offences against the person* were more often female than male across all age groups except for those aged 10–19 years, with male victims only slightly outnumbering female victims (992 compared with 979). *Other offences against the person* victims aged 30–39 years were over four times as likely to be female as male.

Notably, male victims of *other offences against the person* were younger than females. In the most prevalent victim age groups for this offence type, three in 10 male victims were aged 10–19 years (992 or 31.0%), while three in 10 female victims were aged 20–29 years (1,969 or 29.2%).

### 8.2.5. Recorded victimisation rates by sex and Indigenous status for selected offences

Crude victimisation rates for selected personal offences varied markedly according to the victim's sex and Indigenous status in 2022–23.<sup>7</sup> Figure 35 shows rates per 100,000 persons for selected personal offences, disaggregated by sex and Indigenous status of the victim. Rate ratios are used to compare the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander and non-Indigenous populations by sex.

Overall, victimisation rates were higher for female and male Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples than for their non-Indigenous counterparts for all selected offences. Of the four subgroups, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander females experienced the highest victimisation rates for all selected offences, except for *grievous assault*, while non-Indigenous males experienced the lowest rate of victimisation among all subgroups for all offences except for *grievous assault*.

For victims of *assault*, the largest victimisation rate was for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander females, at 6,415.5 victims per 100,000 persons, which is 8.3 times the rate for non-Indigenous females. Among the different *assault* types, the victimisation rates for *serious assault* and *common assault* were the highest for all subgroups, irrespective of sex or Indigenous status. However, victimisation rate differences between Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander and non-Indigenous victims were larger for females than for males. The rate ratios for females were the largest for all selected offences, showing a large discrepancy between Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander and non-Indigenous *assault* victims.

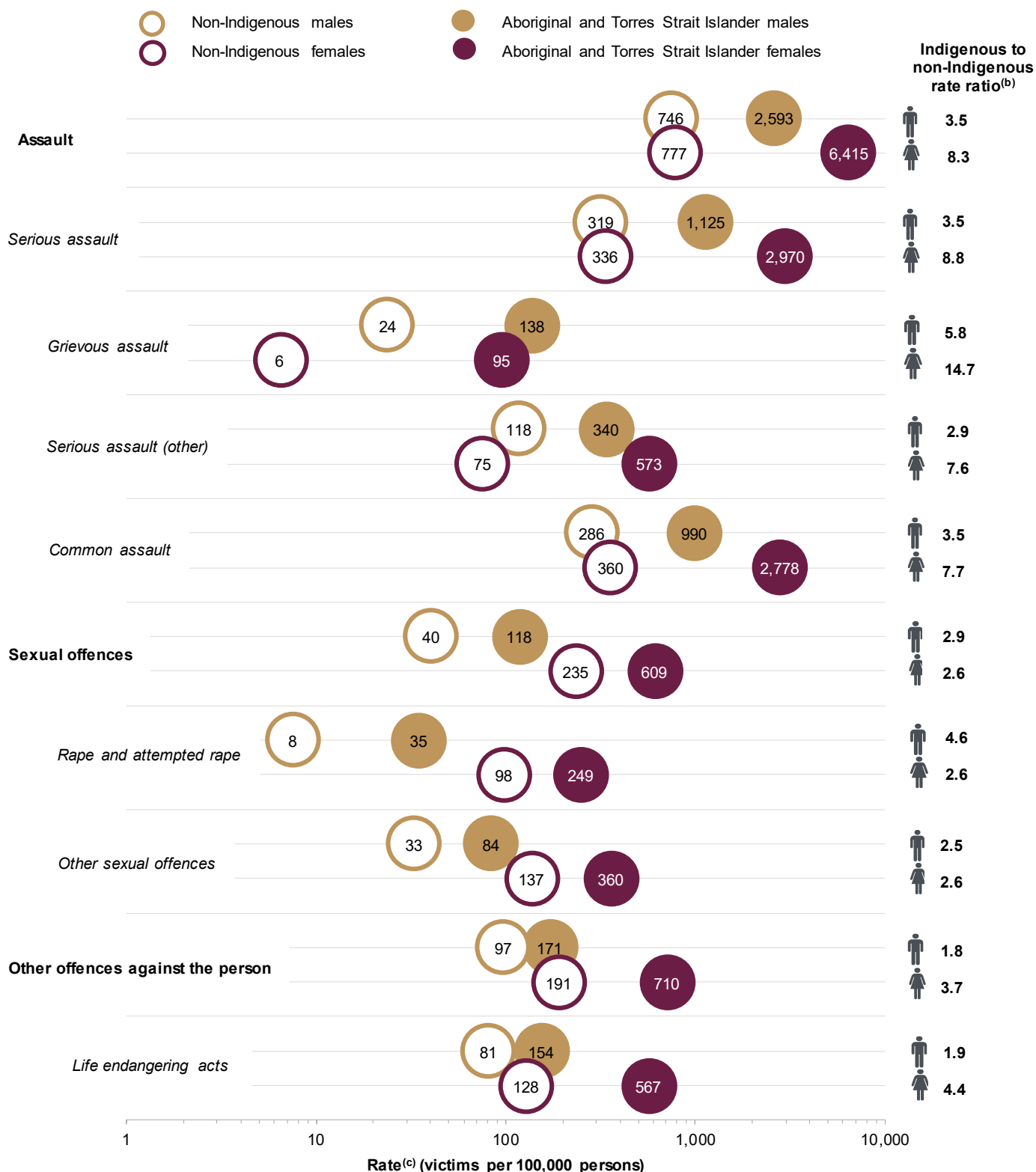
Rates for victims of *sexual offences* were higher for females than males, irrespective of Indigenous status. However, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander females were 2.6 times more likely to be victimised than non-Indigenous females. Only among *sexual offences* victims were rate ratios higher for males than females, indicating the gap between Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander and non-Indigenous victims was wider for males than females for offences of this nature. Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander females were 2.6 times more likely than non-Indigenous females to be a victim of *rape and attempted rape*, while for males the rate was increased to 4.6 times.

*Other offences against the person* include a range of different offences (such as *life endangering acts*, *stalking*, *kidnapping and abduction*, and *extortion*) and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander females were the subgroup with the highest victimisation rate, at 709.6 per 100,000 persons. This subgroup was 3.7 times more likely than non-Indigenous females to be recorded as a victim.

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples are disproportionately recorded as victims of personal offences compared with non-Indigenous people, irrespective of their gender or the type of offence.

### 8.2.6. Relationship of offender to victim

**Please note:** This section counts the number of (non-unique) victims, not offenders or relationships. An individual may be counted once or multiple times, if they have been victimised for more than one offence in a reference year. Victims of all offences against the person are included, irrespective of the cleared/solved status of the offence. Relationship is recorded at time offence was recorded, and relationship classifications used are derived from those used by the ABS in *Recorded crime – Victims, Australia*.

**Domestic and family violence–related victimisations** presented in this report relate only to offences against the person and do not take into account DFV–related property or other offences that occur. They represent those offences against the person where victims indicated to police they were in a domestic or family relationship with the offender.

Across all offences against the person in 2022–23 where the offender–victim relationship was recorded<sup>8</sup>, two-thirds of the victims knew their offender/s (48,439 or 67.5%) and half of the victims (35,703 or 49.7%) were in a domestic or family relationship with their offender/s.<sup>9</sup> The nature of the relationship between offender and victim varied based on the victim's Indigenous status, sex and the offence type (Figure 36).

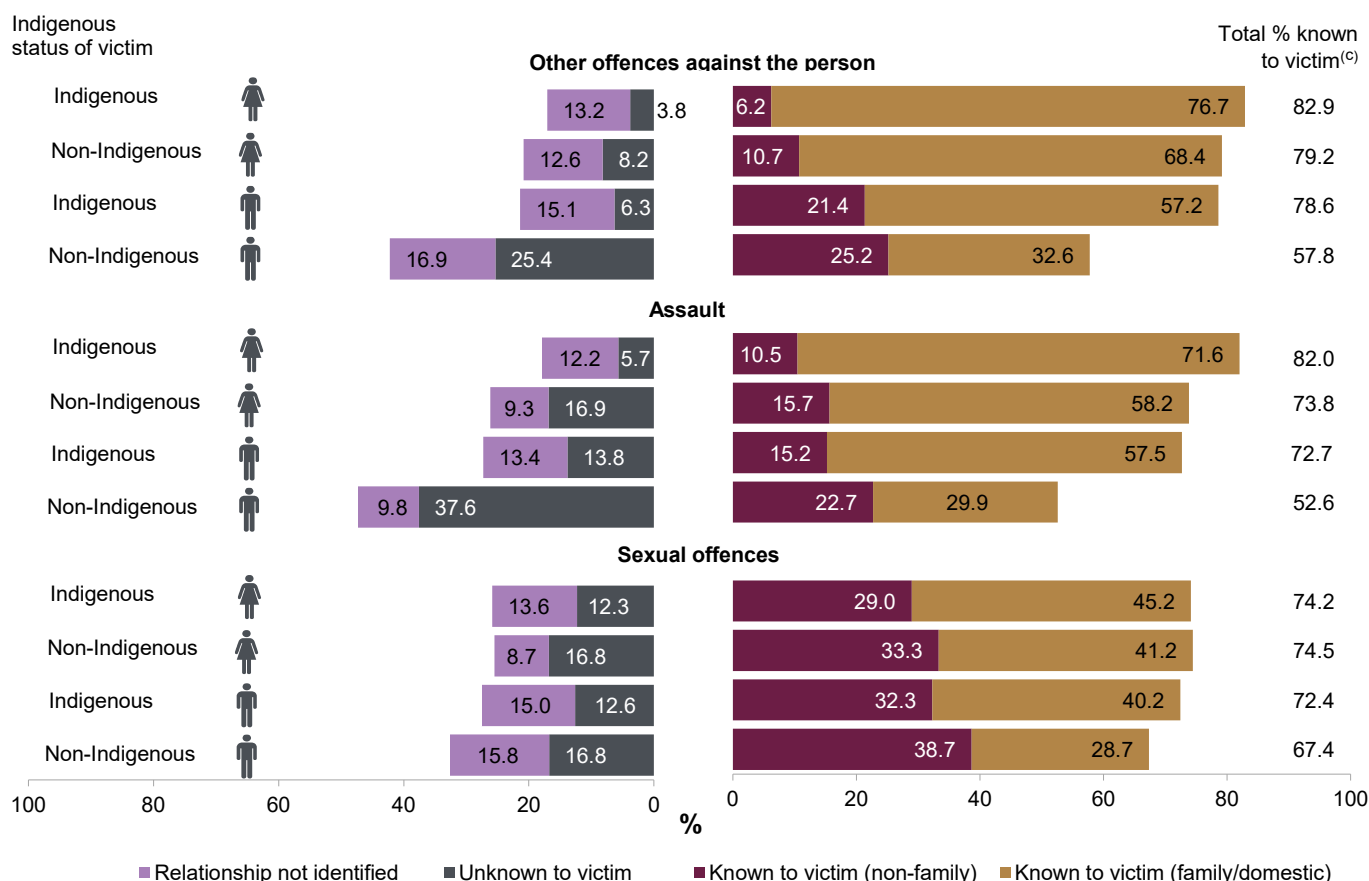
Among cases where the offender–victim relationship was recorded, half of the victims were in a domestic/family relationship with their offender.

In 2022–23, 60.4% of victims of *other offences against the person* were in a domestic or family relationship with their offender, however this proportion was higher for females, both Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander (76.7%) and non-Indigenous (68.4%). One in four non-Indigenous males did not know their offender.

Overall, half of all *assault* victims were in a domestic/family relationship with their offender (51.7%). This number increased when the victim identified as Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander (71.6% for females and 57.5% for males) or as a non-Indigenous female (58.2%). Over a third of non-Indigenous males were assaulted by a stranger (37.6%).

Three in four *sexual offences* victims knew their offender (73.7%), and this offence had the largest proportion of known non-family offenders for all subgroups. Non-Indigenous male victims were more often victimised by a non-family offender than someone in their domestic/family environment. The proportions of *sexual offences* with an offender unknown to the victim were similar for both Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander males (12.6%) and females (12.3%), and also for both non-Indigenous males and females (16.8%).

### 8.2.7. Recorded victimisation rate of DFV-related offences by Indigenous status

Data describing the relationship of offender to victim are used as a source for identifying DFV-related offences (Table 62). However, a proportion of victims of offences against the person (6.8% in 2022–23) have no information recorded about the relationship between the offender and victim. Because of this, and the counting rules used to record DFV-related offences against the person, data in this report may under-represent the number of these offences in Queensland. It must be remembered that, in this report, a victim's age is based on the date the offence was reported to or detected by police, rather than their age on the date the offence occurred, and some offences will have occurred in years prior to 2022–23.

Across all recorded offences against the person in 2022–23 where the offender–victim relationship was recorded and victim's sex and Indigenous status was known, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander victims were considerably more likely to be offended against by someone with whom they were in a domestic or family relationship (64.2% compared with 40.8% for non-Indigenous victims). For Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander victims, a current partner was the most prevalent personal offender (32.7%), while for non-Indigenous victims, a current partner was less likely to be the offender than a stranger (20.9% compared with 23.2%).

Figure 37 displays the differences in victimisation rates between Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander and non-Indigenous female and male victims of DFV-related personal offences in 2022–23. Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander males and females were more likely than non-Indigenous males and females to be victims of domestic and family violence, with victimisation rates among Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander females substantially higher than those for males.

For Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander females, victimisation rates increased steeply after 5–9 years of age (462 victims per 100,000 persons) before peaking at 11,121 victims per 100,000 persons at age 30–39 years. Rates declined after that for each age group, approximately halving with each age group after 40–49 years. The largest rate difference was between Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander and non-Indigenous females aged 50–59 years (rate ratio of 11.0).

Victimisation rates for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander males peaked at 40–49 years with 3,048 victims per 100,000 persons, the oldest peak age of the four subgroups. The largest differences in rates to non-Indigenous males was at ages 30–39 years and 40–49 years, with ratios of 9.0 and 9.3 respectively.

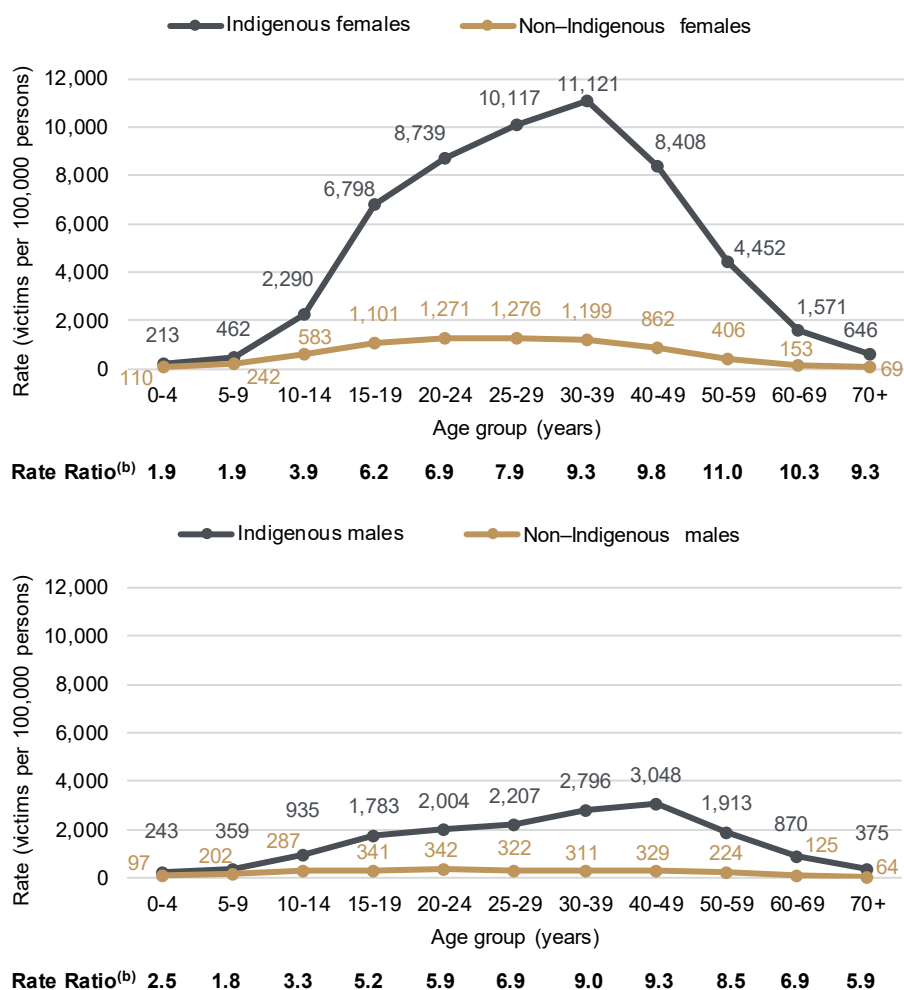
The age distribution among non-Indigenous males and females had less clear peaks, with the two largest rates for females at age 20–24 years and 25–29 years (1,271 and 1,276 per 100,000 persons respectively), and at age 15–19 years and 20–24 years for males (341 and 342 per 100,000 persons respectively).

DFV–victimisation rates among both Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander and non-Indigenous peoples were similar for males and females until the age of nine, and then rates start to diverge substantially between genders, with female victimisation rates increasing to more than double that of males aged 10–14 years, irrespective of Indigenous status.

For victims aged 10–14 years old, when compared with non-Indigenous females, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander females were at least 3.9 times as likely to be a victim of a DFV-related personal offence, and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander males were 3.3 times more often victimised than non-Indigenous males.

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander females aged 30–39 years were the cohort most likely to be offended against by someone in their family or domestic relationship.

### Glossary

**Age standardisation:** a statistical method used to enhance the comparability of event rates from different population or sub-population groups over time by making adjustments for the confounding effects of differences in age structure between the populations being compared—e.g. the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander and non-Indigenous populations.

**Cleared offences:** An offence is deemed to be cleared under, but not restricted to, one of the following circumstances:

- Police action\* has been taken against an offender.
- The offender has died or been admitted to a psychiatric facility before police have proceeded with a charge.
- The offender has diplomatic immunity.
- The offender is serving a sentence and no useful purpose would be served by prosecution.
- The offender is a child and no further action will be taken in accordance with *Youth Justice Act 1992*.
- There is a bar to prosecution (e.g. defences and exculpations under the *Criminal Code Act 1899*, or other Queensland statutes).
- The offender is being dealt with by another agency apart from QPS (e.g. RSPCA or other Queensland Government department).
- There is sufficient evidence to determine that the offender committed the offence but will not be charged as it is not in the public interest.
- There is sufficient evidence to determine the offender committed the offence but none of the offences can be sufficiently particularised to commence a prosecution.
- The victim is too young to proceed without sufficient corroboration to support their testimony.
- There is sufficient evidence to determine that the offender committed the offence but will not be charged as the offence was committed against a child who has been interviewed but did not sufficiently disclose the abuse and without other evidence the case cannot proceed.

- The victim or essential witness has died prior to the offender being charged.
- The victim formally withdraws the complaint and no longer wishes to continue with the complaint.

Note that the recovery of stolen or otherwise unlawfully obtained property does not in itself clear or solve an offence.

**\*Police action type:** Police may proceed against an offender in any of the following ways:

**Arrest:** The taking into custody of an offender to compel that person's appearance before a court.

**Summons:** A direction or command issued by a magistrate or justice of the peace to an offender to appear before a court with reference to a matter described therein, at a given time and place.

**Notice to appear:** A notice issued and personally served by a police officer upon an offender whom he/she reasonably suspects has committed / is committing an offence, to appear before a court, with reference to a matter described therein, at a stated time and place.

**Warrant:** An authority under the hand of a judge or justice of the peace to arrest an offender in order that the person may be dealt with according to the law.

**Caution:** An official caution administered to a child under the provisions of the Youth Justice Act and includes the cautioning of persons over 65 years of age and intellectually disabled persons for minor criminal offences in accordance with official QPS policy. The term does not apply to any informal process where a child is spoken to by an officer where the officer is exercising discretion in relation to the child's particular behaviour or actions.

**Community conference:** The referral of a child under the provisions of the Youth Justice Act to community conference by a police officer before the start of a proceeding for an offence, or by court after a finding of guilty is made against a child for the offence.

**Other:** The offender is known and sufficient evidence has been obtained but there is a bar to prosecution or other official process.

**Confidentialisation:** a change made to small-value cells ( $\leq 3$ ) in aggregated person-related data (see Notes).

**Crime location:** Refers to the initial site where a criminal incident occurred, determined based on primary use or function. Surrounding land, yard or parking area connected to a building or other structure are assigned to the same category of use. If a location serves more than one function, they are classified per the primary function.

**Administration or Professional** includes business, government.

**Dwelling** includes boarding house, motel, unit, other dwelling.

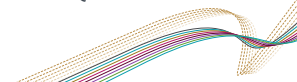
**Educational** includes school, university, TAFE, library.

**Health** includes hospital, hospital grounds, medical.

**Justice** includes court, police station, correctional centre.

**Open space** includes beach, boat ramp, bushland, crown land, river, waterway.

**Other n.e.c.** includes construction site, mail, military area, rest area.



**Recreational** includes adult entertainment, brothel, caravan park, cinema, night club, gaming.

**Retail** includes chemist, food shop, garage, hotel, licensed premises, restaurant, Post Office, shopping centre.

**Transport** includes airport, carpark, railway, terminal, wharf, train, in transit.

**Offence:** Any act or omission by a person or persons for which a penalty could be imposed by the Australian legal system.

Offences are presented under three broad categories: offences against the person, against property, and other offences. They are further disaggregated and grouped by offence type.

**Miscellaneous offences** include defamation, libel and privacy offences, public health and safety offences, commercial/industry/financial regulation offences; and may include other offences as specified, where small values do not warrant separate presentation.

**Offender:** A person aged 10 years or over who, through the clearance of an offence, is alleged to be responsible for committing that offence.

**Child offender:** In this report, an alleged offender aged 10 to 17 years on the date police action commenced against them.

**Population subgroup:** In this report, this term is used where rates are calculated for each age group by Indigenous status and/or sex. It refers to the portion of the population to which a statistic pertains, e.g. non-Indigenous females aged 10–17 years.

**Victim:** For most offences against the person, 'the victim' is an individual person. In some cases, such as robbery and extortion, the victim may be an individual person or an organisation. Only person victims have been included in this report.

## Notes

The information displayed in this report may vary from data published elsewhere by QGSO and others, due to differences in the dates data were extracted and frequency of revision, or in counting rules or statistical standards applied. Readers are urged to exercise caution when making comparison between publications.

Data in this report have not been tested to determine whether changes over time are statistically significant.

**Source – QPRIME:** All crime statistics presented in this report are derived from unpublished data recorded in official crime reports in QPRIME, supplied by QPS and collated by QGSO.

### Age:

**Victim age** data presented in this report refer to the victim's age on the date the offence was reported/detected, rather than their age on the date the offence occurred. Particular care should be exercised when interpreting age data for sexual assault victims.

**Offender age** data presented in this report refer to the offender's age on the date the offence was cleared/actioned by police, rather than their age on the date the offence occurred or the offence was reported/detected.

### Confidentialisation:

Confidentialising data involves removing or altering information or collapsing detail (through application of statistical disclosure controls) to mitigate the risk that a person may be identified in the data (either directly or indirectly).

Victim and alleged offender tables contain person-based variables and include demographic information. Therefore, such tables in this report are subject to confidentialisation to ensure the anonymity of individuals is protected where numbers are small and there is a reasonable likelihood that a person may be identified from the data published. This process is applied to aggregated data only prior to release.

QGSO has confidentialised cells in offender and victim-related tables with values ranging from 1 to 3. This is denoted in the tables by the number '≤ 3' appearing in cells with small values. Cells with a value of zero remain unaltered.

For the purpose of calculating row and column totals, each cell with a value of 1 to 3 is assigned a value of 2, regardless of the true value of that cell. This methodology allows for totals to be calculated in tables with small value cells, but this does mean that totals for certain variables may not be the same across tables within the report.

**Counting methodology:** This report uses counting rules originally developed by the ABS and used by Queensland Police for the publication of crime statistics relating to recorded offences against the person, victims and offenders. The following counting rules have been applied in this publication.

**Offences:** For offences against the person, for each victim within a distinct criminal incident (occurrence), the most serious offence (MSO) per offence type is counted. A single criminal incident may therefore result in several offences being recorded.

Sexual offences, which includes 'Rape and attempted rape' and 'Other sexual offences', is the **exception to the national counting rule**. The counting rule applied in respect of this group of offences is that, for each victim, the MSO per offence type is counted on the basis of time and place.

For offences against property and other offences, no national counting rules exist and, for such offences, each distinct criminal act per criminal incident is counted.

**Offenders:** Count of one for each unique recorded offence type cleared or solved through police action against an individual offender within a single incident, for a specified geographic area and period. An individual offender is counted multiple times during the reference period, if they were proceeded against for multiple offence types within the same incident or multiple times within the reference period.

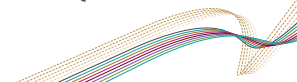
**Unique offenders:** An individual offender is counted only once during the reference period, irrespective of the number of offences committed within the same incident or the number of times they were dealt with by police.

**Victims:** For each recorded victim within a distinct criminal incident, the MSO per offence type is counted. Where the same individual is subjected to multiple offences belonging to different offence types within a single incident, then, in accordance with the MSO counting rule, that victim is counted multiple times (once for each MSO per offence type). Only victims of offences against the person are presented in this report.

**Unique victims:** An individual victim is counted once only in the reference period, regardless of how many times they have been recorded as a victim of an offence (against the person).

### Geography:

In the **main report**, all data are presented at state (Queensland) level. Number and rate of offences are also presented in tables for Queensland's 19 statistical areas level 4 (SA4) under the ASGS.



## Queensland Government Statistician's Office

These tables include some offences where the SA4 in which the offence occurred cannot be identified. This may occur for one of two reasons:

The offence was detected as part of a covert operation, and the location of the offence has not been recorded, to maintain security; or the accuracy of the address has not been determined at the time that the data were extracted for inclusion in this publication. That is, the address was not verified.

In these cases, the offences have been included in the Queensland total only. Therefore, SA4 statistics may not always sum to Queensland totals.

In the **Appendix**, all data are presented by Queensland Police Service administrative regions (seven police regions and 15 police districts).

In cases where the police region in which the offence occurred cannot be identified (for reasons outlined above), the offences have been included in the Queensland total only. Therefore, police region statistics may not always sum to Queensland totals.

**Indigenous status:** based on self-identification by the individual who comes into contact with police as one of the following four standard options:

Neither Aboriginal nor Torres Strait Islander (non-Indigenous); Aboriginal; Torres Strait Islander; Both Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander.

In this publication, the term 'Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander' is used to refer to any person who identifies as Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander.

Indigenous status of victim/offender has not been identified in a relatively small number of offences, and these are quantified in the table footnotes where applicable.

**Offence classification:** Offence codes and groupings presented in this publication are those used by QPS and are based on the Australian National Classification of Offences (ANCO, 1985).

**Rates:** Rates enable comparison of crime to be made over time and between geographical areas, since the size of the population is taken into account in the calculation. However, comparisons of crime rates should be interpreted with caution due to the many factors which differ from region to region, including: the composition of its population (age, sex, ethnicity and employment); climate and geographical features; the economic structure (including local industry and the level and distribution of income).

It should be noted also that transient population groups such as tourists are not factored into the ERP. This would have particular impact on high tourism areas where crime rates may be overestimated.

Rates are calculated per 100,000 persons, using the mid-point estimated resident population (ERP) of the specified region, using the June data published by the ABS (most recently available data at time of production).

**Offence rate** is calculated as:

$$\frac{\text{number of offences}}{\text{mid-point ERP}} * 100,000$$

The mid-point ERP is used to provide a more accurate estimate of the population in a financial year. It is the average of both calendar years in the reference financial year. For example, for the 2022–23 financial year, the mid-point ERP is calculated by dividing by two the sum of the ERP as at 30 June 2022 and the ERP as at 30 June 2023.

**Unique offender rate:** Expressed as the number of unique offenders per 100,000 of the estimated resident population (ERP) aged 10 years and over.

**Unique victim rate:** Expressed as the number of unique victims per 100,000 of the total estimated resident population (ERP).

**Reference date:** The reference date for recorded offences and victims is the date an offence is reported to or detected by police. For cleared offences, the reference date is the date the offence was cleared by police. For offender statistics, the reference date is the date an action is commenced.

**Reference year:** Years quoted in this report are financial year (i.e. from 1 July to 30 June). Statistics produced on the basis of date recorded may be affected over time by lags in completing and/or processing some crime reports. Where offences recorded in the reference year are not processed for inclusion until the following year, revised data will be presented in subsequent publications. As such, time series data published in this publication may vary from data published previously by Queensland Police Service.

Time series data are presented for ten financial years, from 1 July 2013 to 30 June 2023.

### Variables not stated

In 2022–23 there were:

- 7,859 recorded victims for whom Indigenous status was not stated, 141 recorded victims for whom sex was not stated, and 50 recorded victims for whom age was not stated (note, some records had more than one variable not stated)
- 7,239 unique victims for whom Indigenous status was not stated, 123 unique victims for whom sex was not stated, and 49 unique victims for whom age was not stated (note, some records had more than one variable not stated).
- 1,189 recorded offenders whose Indigenous status was not stated and 300 recorded offenders whose sex was not stated (note, some records had more than one variable not stated)
- 957 unique offenders whose Indigenous status was not stated and 177 unique offenders whose sex was not stated (note, some records had more than one variable not stated).

All data comparisons presented by Indigenous status exclude records where Indigenous status was not stated.

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# 1.0 Introduction

The *Appendix: Crime report, Queensland Police Service administrative regions, 2022–23* comprises a series of tables and graphs, and supplements the *Crime report, Queensland 2022–23*. Statistics relating to recorded and cleared offences, victims of offences against the person and offenders in all offence categories are featured and are presented by police administrative regions (Figure A1).

Statistics in this supplementary report are also presented as both counts and rates. Using counts to gauge the level of crime is problematic, as areas with larger populations will presumably have higher numbers of offences than areas with smaller populations. Calculation of rates per 100,000 population allows direct comparisons of recorded crime to be made across different geographical areas and across time, since the size of the population is taken into account in the calculation.

Data which form the basis of this report are derived from official crime reports recorded in Queensland Police Records and Information Management Exchange (QPRIME). Only offences with a status of solved, withdrawn, lapsed or unsolved are counted in this report. Cancelled, not substantiated, and unfounded crime reports have been excluded.

The information presented in this report may vary from data published elsewhere by QGSO and others, due to differences in the dates data were extracted and frequency of revision, or in counting rules or statistical standards applied. Readers are therefore urged to exercise caution when making comparison between publications.

The statistics presented in this report should also be read in conjunction with the Explanatory notes and glossary in the main report, where counting methodologies and other supporting information are provided to aid in the interpretation of rates and numbers presented.

Only offences with a status of *solved, unsolved, withdrawn* or *lapsed* are counted in this report.

*Cancelled and unfounded* (not substantiated) crime reports have been excluded.

## 2.0 Statistical impacts of legislative and policy changes

### 2.1. Youth offending

Queensland Police commenced a number of initiatives over the course of 2022–23 to support community safety, focusing on preventing, disrupting and investigating youth crime through community engagement and extreme high visibility patrols in intelligence-driven hotspot locations.<sup>10</sup>

To further disrupt youth offending, specialist youth crime rapid response squads were established and deployed to various locations across Queensland to target high risk youth offenders throughout the state, aiming to support local police with detectives and Youth Justice workers to strengthen police capabilities.

Queensland Police also introduced a youth mentoring program that utilises a range of tools to support young people aged 14–17 years to make better life choices. Current program locations include Logan, Gold Coast, Ipswich, South Brisbane, Moreton Bay, Sunshine Coast, Cairns, Townsville, Mackay and Rockhampton, and their respective surrounding areas.

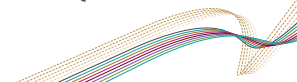
Given the heightened police presence, higher than usual recorded numbers of youth offenders and offences typically committed by those age groups may not necessarily be indicative of an increased number of youths committing crime but rather a result of increased detection. Also, given that some of these initiatives commenced in the second half of 2022–23, their impact may not yet be apparent in the 2022–23 reporting period.

See sections 7.6 Child offenders and 7.1 Unique offenders for more information on youth offending.

### 2.2. Change to police recording of DFV offences in Queensland

From 1 July 2021, a change in recording practices was implemented by the Queensland Police Service, requiring police officers to record within QPRIME all criminal offences associated with domestic and family violence (DFV) incidents that come to their attention. Consequently, 2021–22 presents as a break in the time series for DFV-related variables that are based on recorded offences data.

Analyses have been conducted on selected recorded offences data and, while the analysis below indicates a substantial increase in recorded DFV-related offences in the reporting periods since the practice change was implemented, it is difficult to quantify how much of the observed increase in these and other DFV-related offences can be attributed to this change alone.

Other factors are also likely to have contributed to the observed increase, such as: increased public awareness of DFV, including through reports such as *Hear her voice*; improved mechanisms for reporting DFV; media coverage; cultural changes; population growth; natural variation; and the delivery of the Queensland Government's *Domestic and family violence prevention strategy, 2016–2026*.

Domestic and family violence is complex and DFV-related offences can take many forms and cover a broad range of offences. Recorded offences presented in this report, including those related to DFV, represent only those which have come to the attention of police.

**Please note:** The increases evident in recorded offences and victims statistics are not apparent to the same extent in offender statistics. Where a victim declines to support prosecution, the offence(s) recorded are withdrawn and police take no action against the alleged offender. In such cases, therefore, the offender is not counted.

## 2.3. Legislative changes

### 2.3.1. Weapon detection

In 2021, legislation was introduced for police to trial the use of hand-held metal detectors ('wandering') without a warrant to detect unlawfully possessed knives in two safe night precincts (SNPs) on the Gold Coast. The trial led to an increased detection and seizure of weapons during May 2021 and November 2022, including machetes, screwdrivers, flick knives, knuckledusters, tasers and a replica gun.

The passing of the *Police Powers and Responsibilities (Jack's Law) Amendment Act 2022* extended and expanded the trial to all 15 safe night precincts and all public transport vehicles and hubs across Queensland. Wandering operations commenced in late 2022–23 in selected locations including Fortitude Valley and Townsville, aiming to reduce knife crime and create safer public spaces.<sup>11</sup>

Given the timing of the commencement of these operations, a subsequent rise in recorded weapon-related offences is not yet apparent for the 2022–23 reporting period.

### 2.3.2. Drug diversion

In 2023, the *Police Powers and Responsibilities and Other Legislation Amendment Act (No. 2) 2023* expanded police drug diversion powers under the *Drugs Misuse Act 1986* to include minor possession of all illicit drugs, and implemented a tiered police approach to the possession of minor illicit drugs. Police officers are now able to issue a warning (for a first offence), refer to a mandatory drug diversion assessment program (for second and third offences) and issue a notice to appear in court (for fourth offence).

Given that this change took place at the end of 2022–23, no impact is yet apparent for the 2022–23 reporting period.

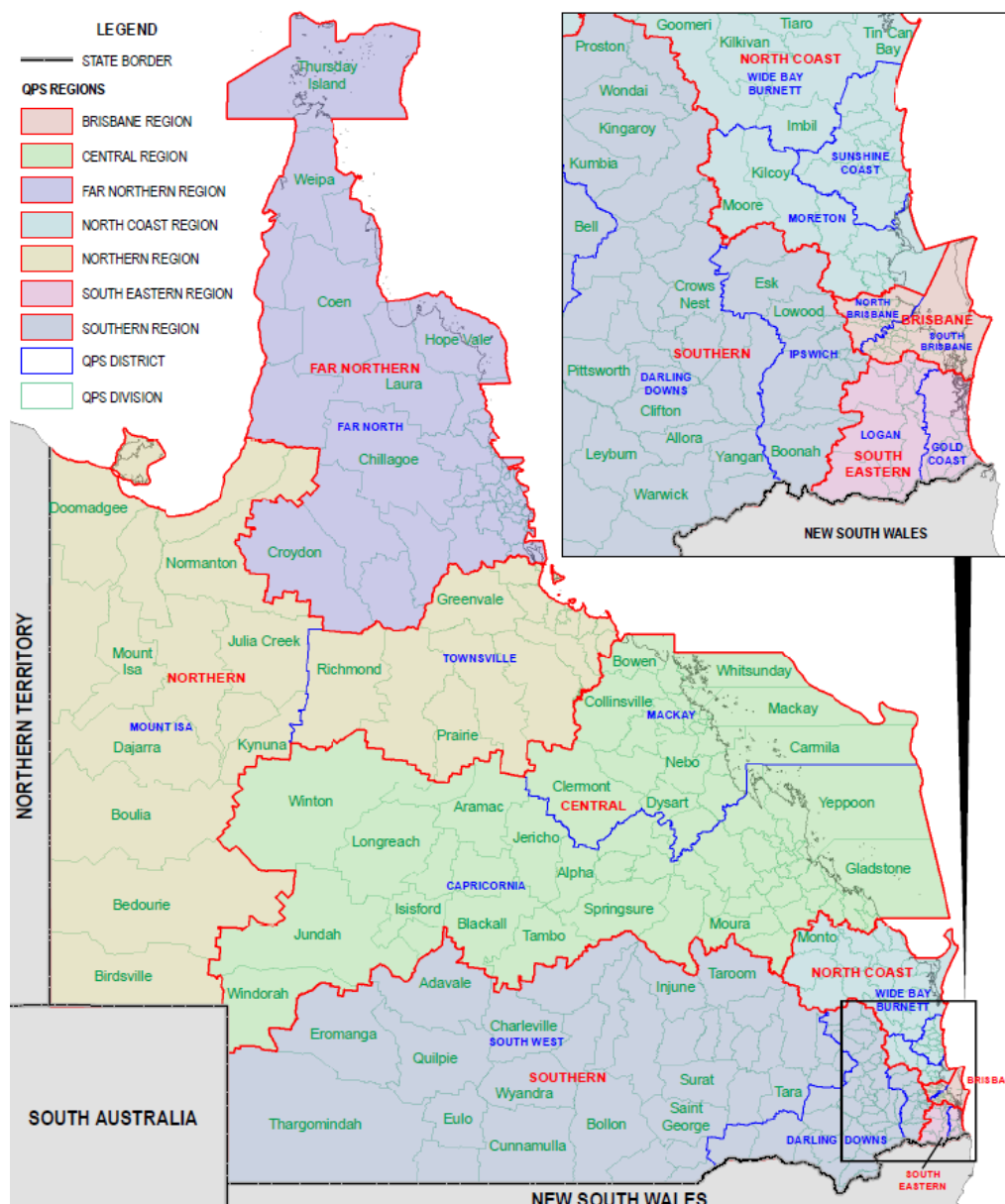

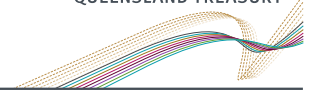

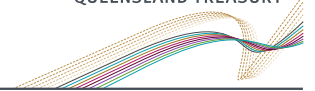

## 4.0 Regional comparisons

The graphs in this section display changes in the rates of selected recorded offences per 100,000 estimated resident population (ERP), from 2021–22 to 2022–23, for Queensland and the seven Queensland Police Service regions: Brisbane, Central, Far Northern, North Coast, Northern, South Eastern and Southern.

Expressing offences in terms of rate per 100,000 persons enables the recorded crime level of a region to be compared with itself over time and with that of other regions.

Population growth can lead to a rise in numbers of offences, and therefore simple counts cannot and should not be used to gauge the true level of crime in a region. However, it is important to note that transient population groups such as tourists are not factored into the ERP. This would have particular impact on high tourism areas where crime rates may be overestimated.

### Please note the following with regard to this section:

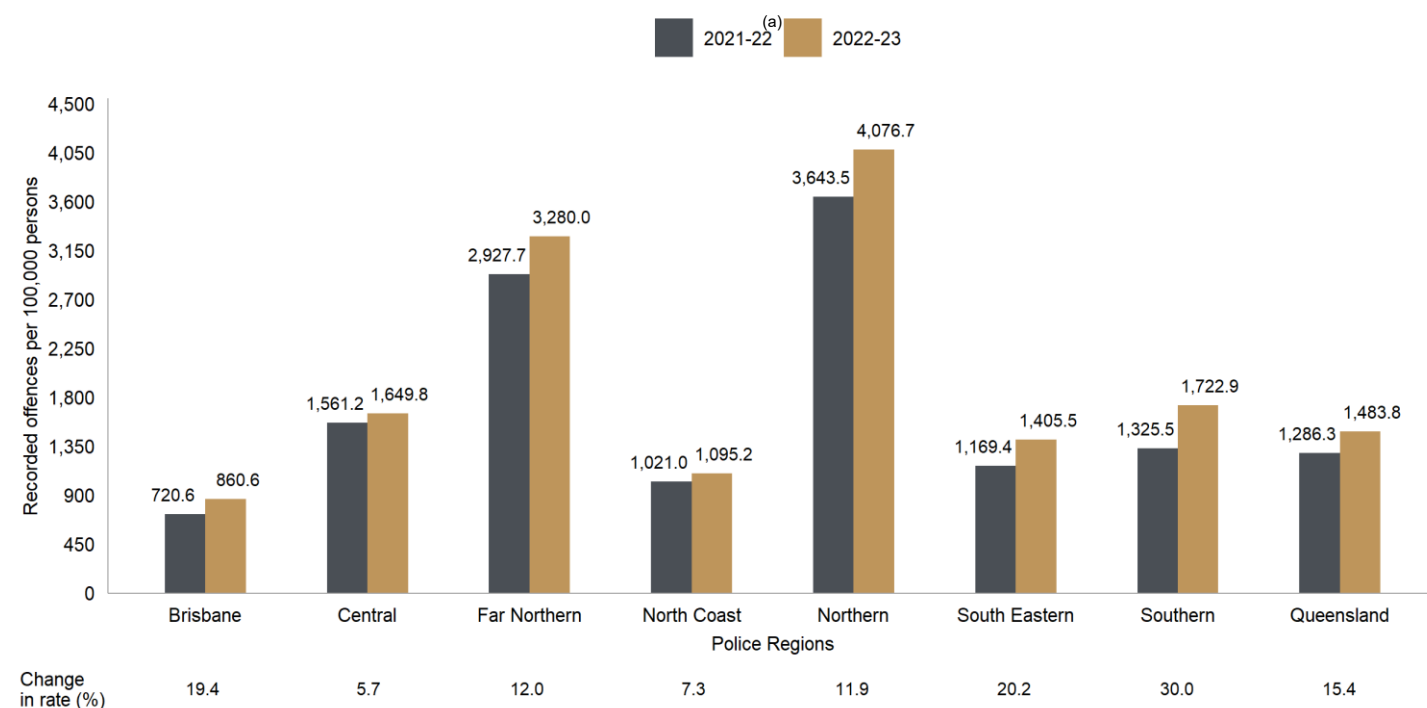

- Although offence rate has been rounded to one decimal place, the actual rate was used to calculate the absolute rate change between the two periods.
- Any of the tables in this section may include some offences where the region in which the offence occurred cannot be identified. Such offences have been included in the Queensland totals only, and therefore region statistics may not always sum to Queensland totals.

Offence data by region are expressed as rate per 100,000 estimated resident population. Transient population groups such as tourists are not factored into the ERP.

When comparing rates, please be aware that scales used vary between figures.

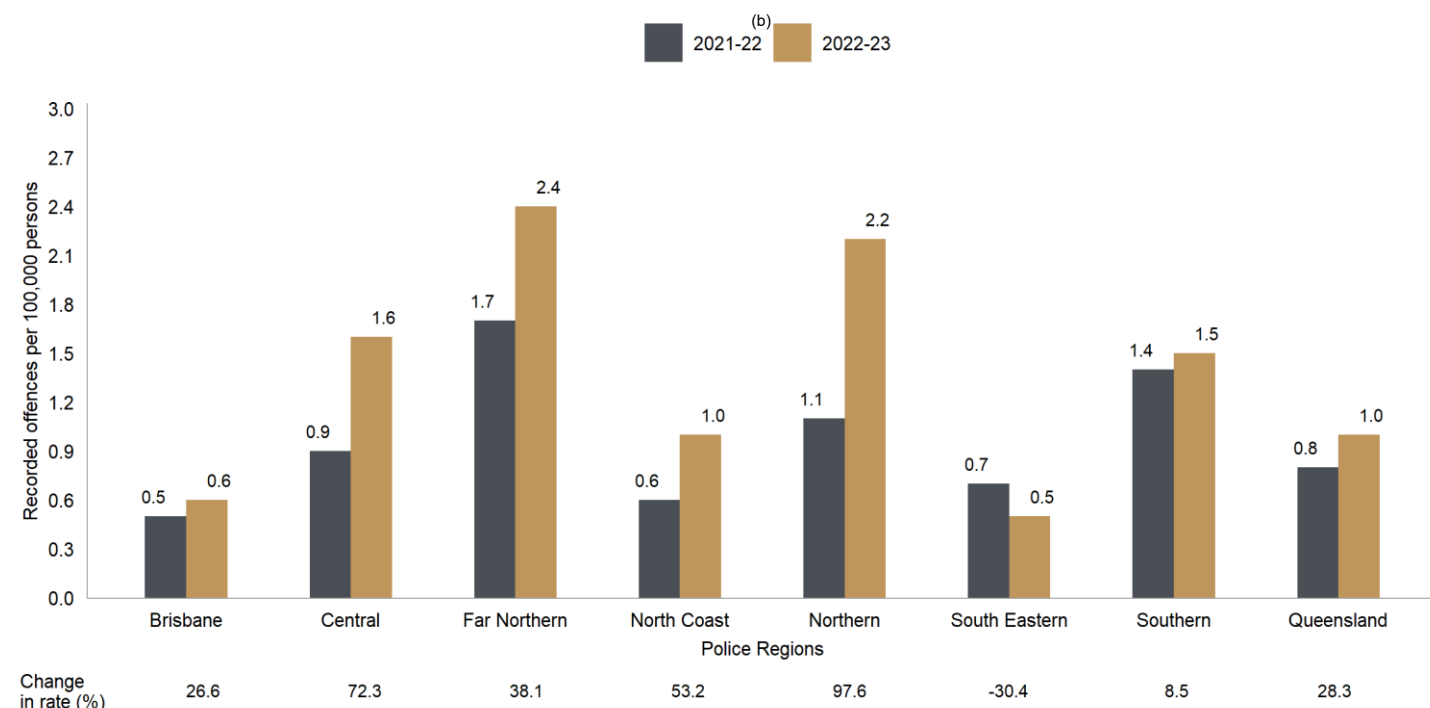
Figure A2 Offences against the person – all offences, by police region

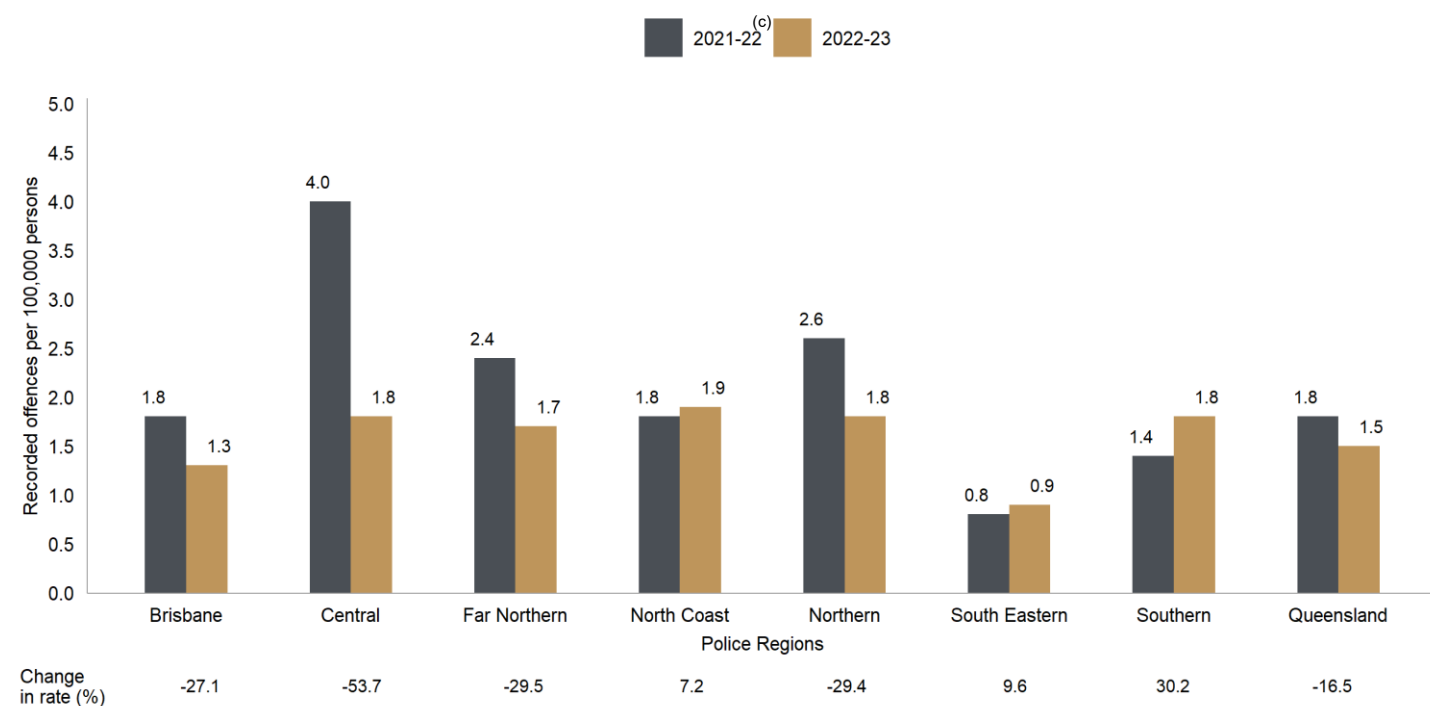
**Figure A3 Homicide (Murder)<sup>(a)</sup>, by police region**

**Figure A4 Other homicide offences<sup>(a)(b)</sup>, by police region**

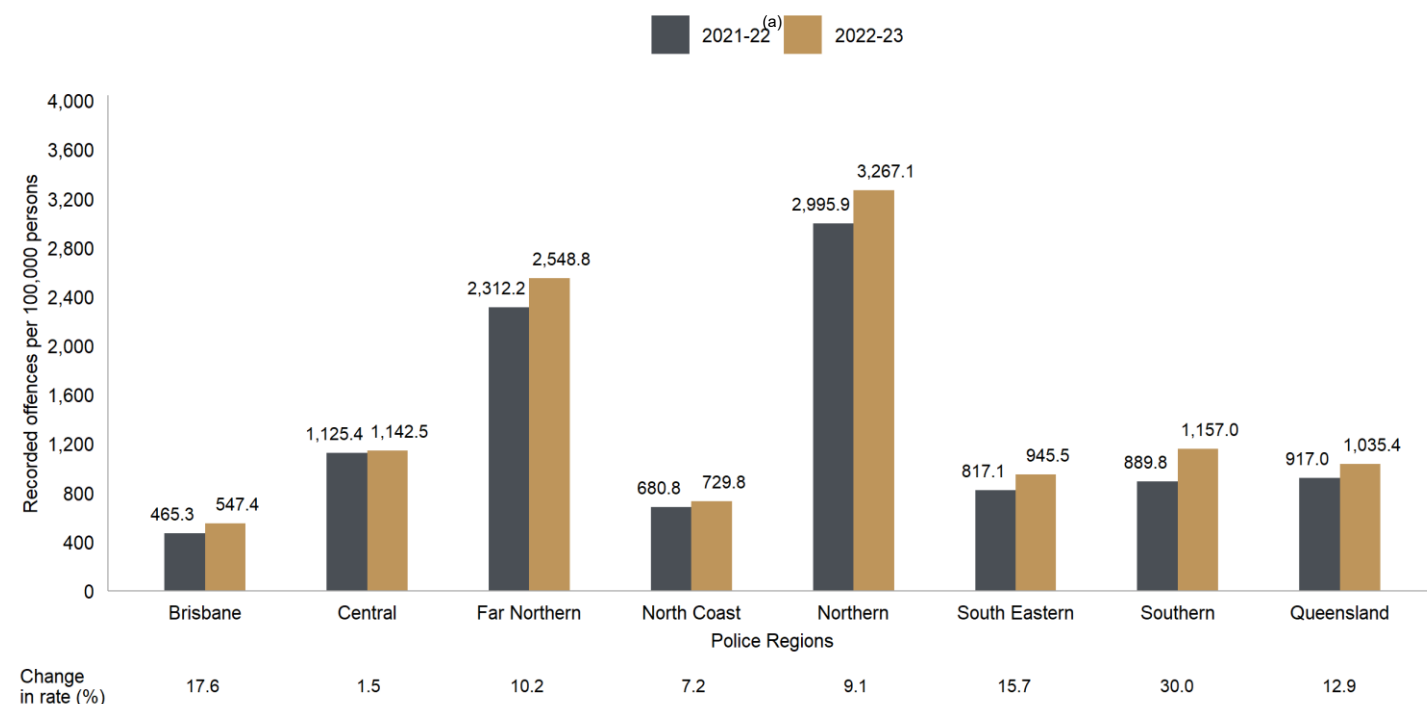

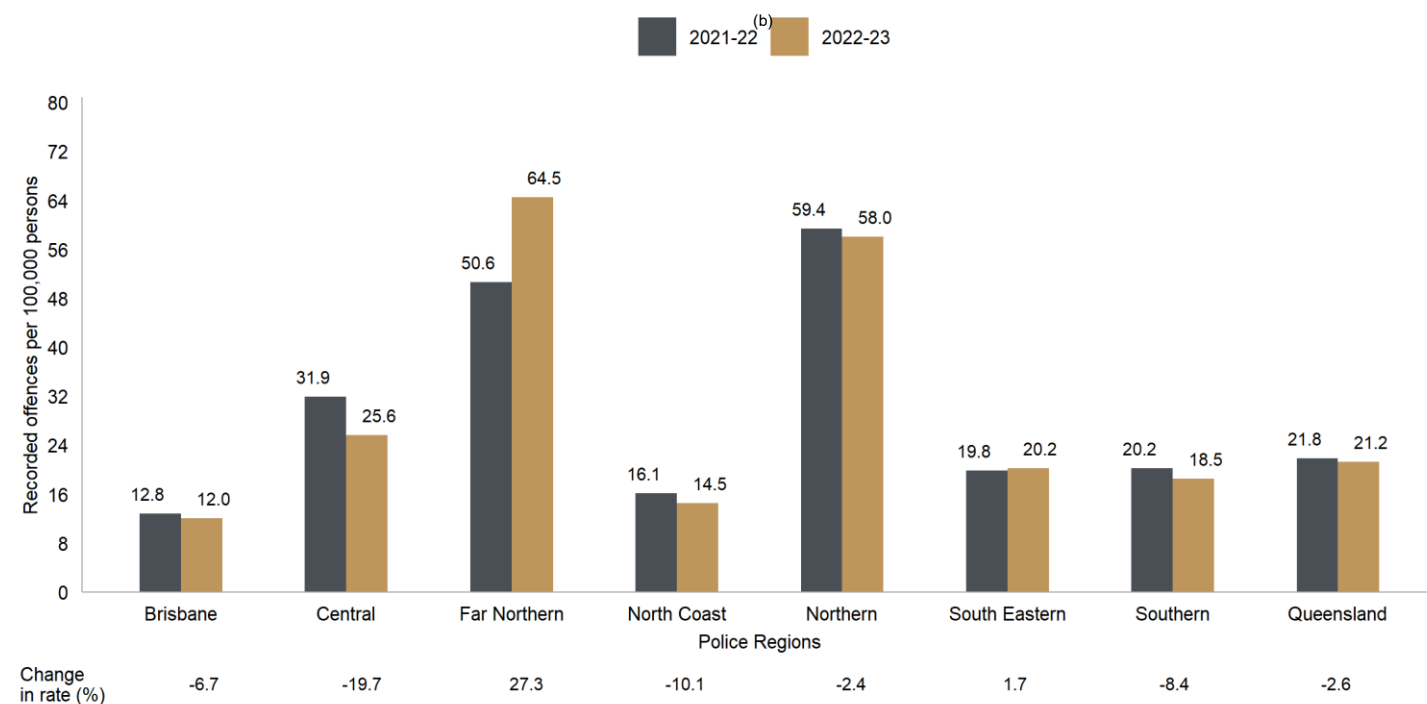

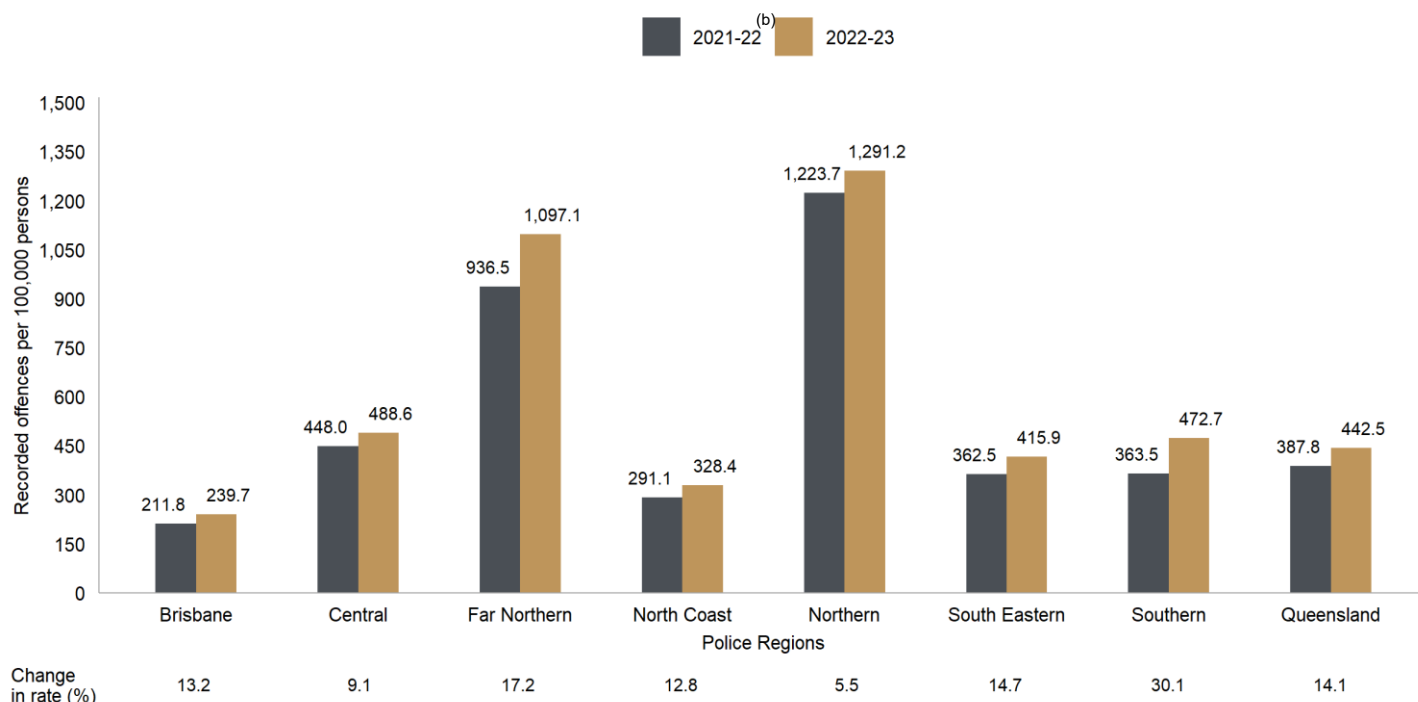
**Figure A6 Grievous assault<sup>(a)</sup>, by police region**

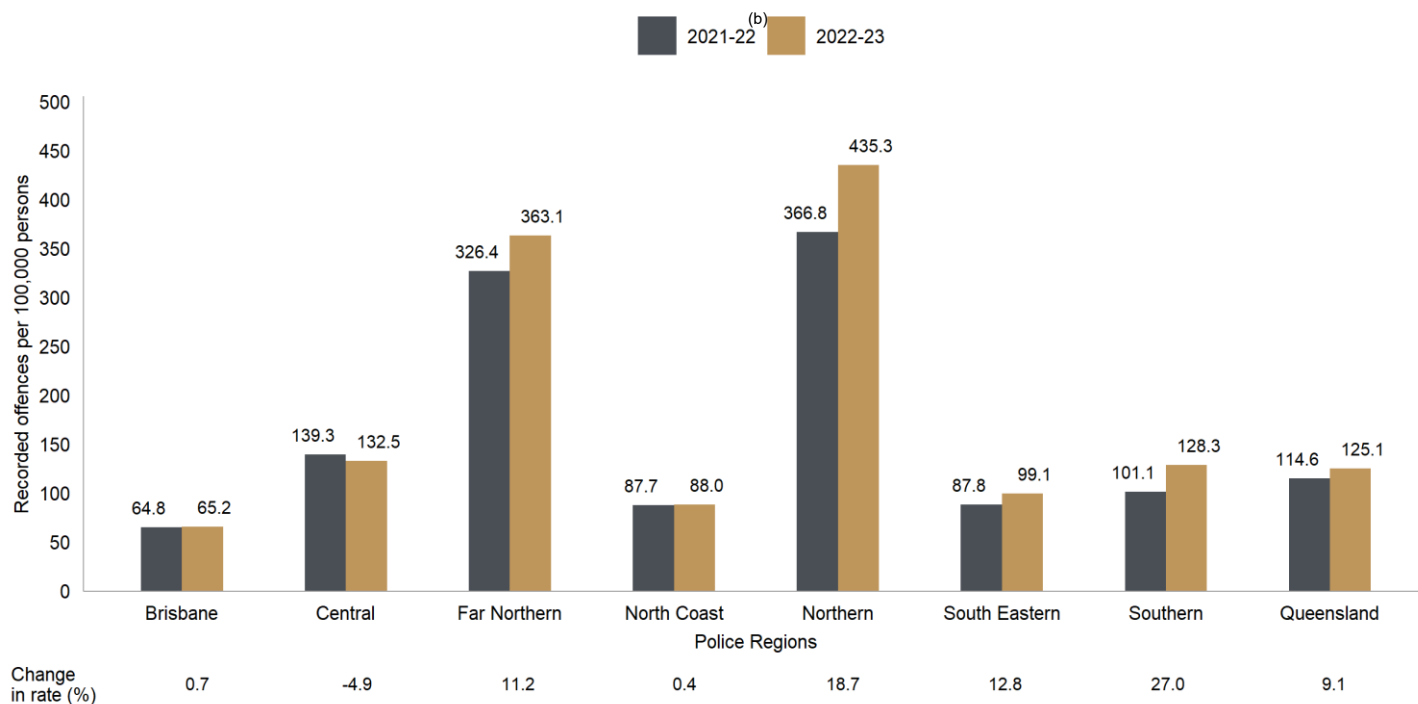
**Figure A7 Serious assault<sup>(a)</sup>, by police region**

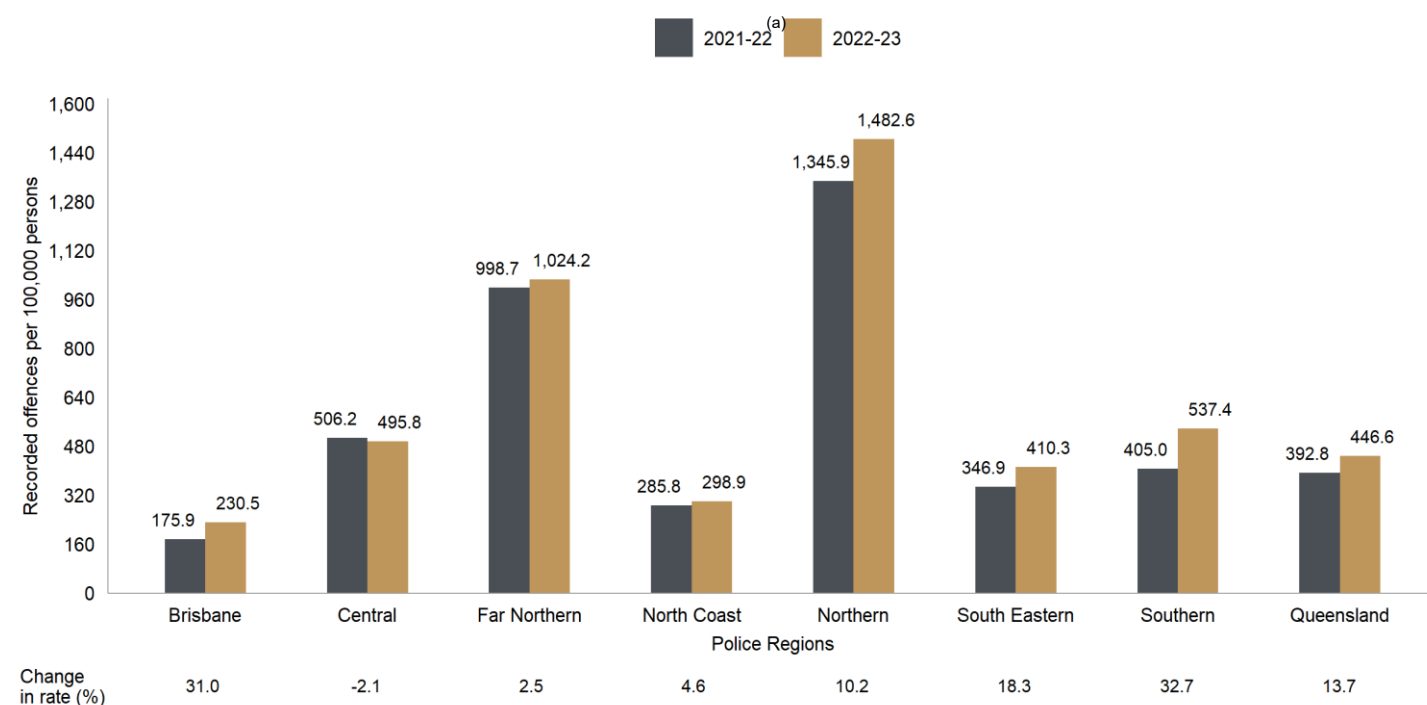
**Figure A8 Serious assault (other)<sup>(a)</sup>, by police region**

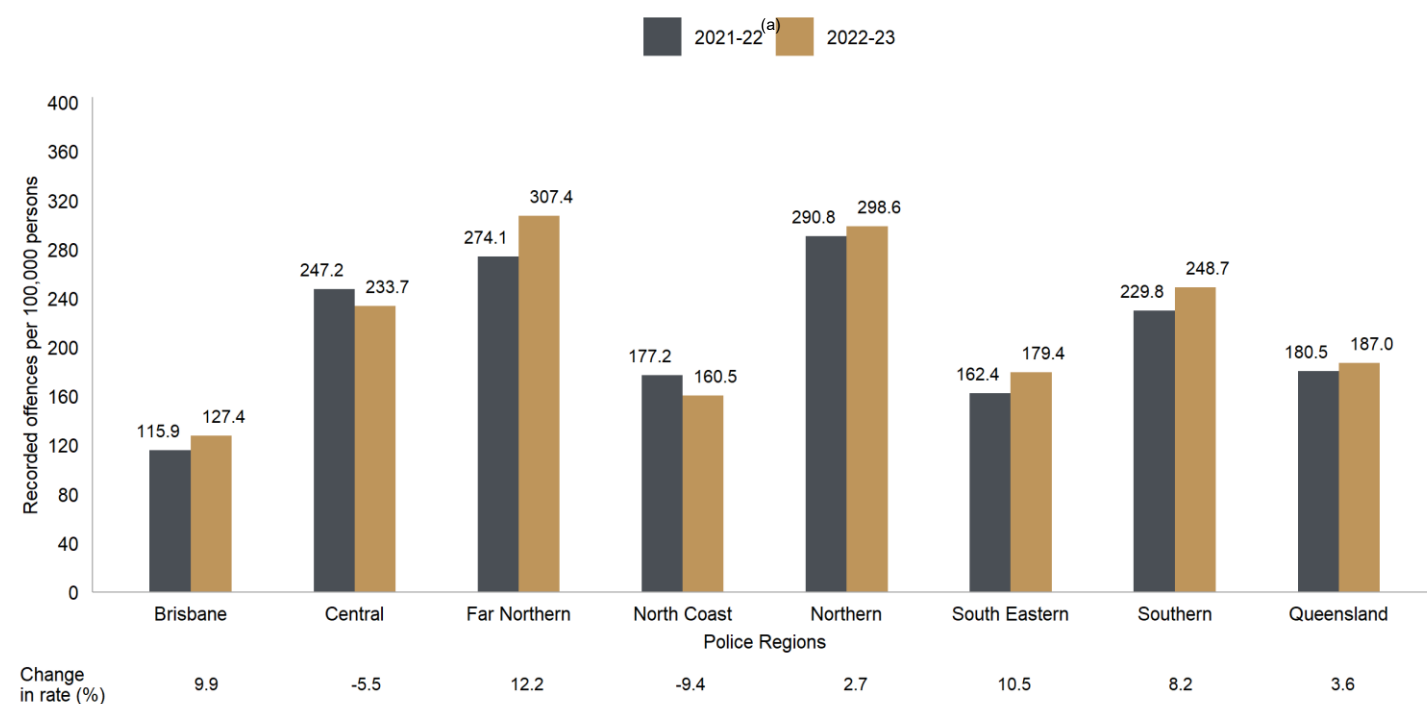

**Figure A9 Common assault, by police region**



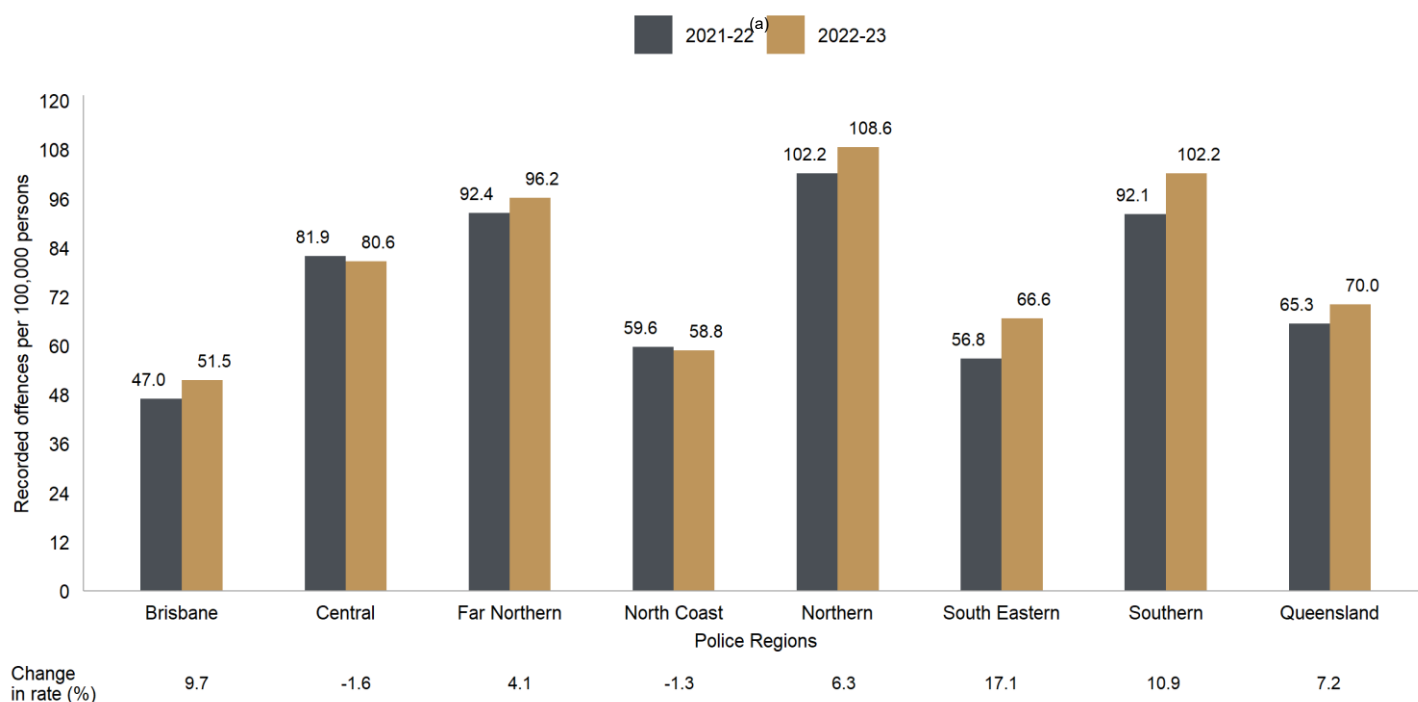

**Figure A10 Sexual offences – all, by police region**



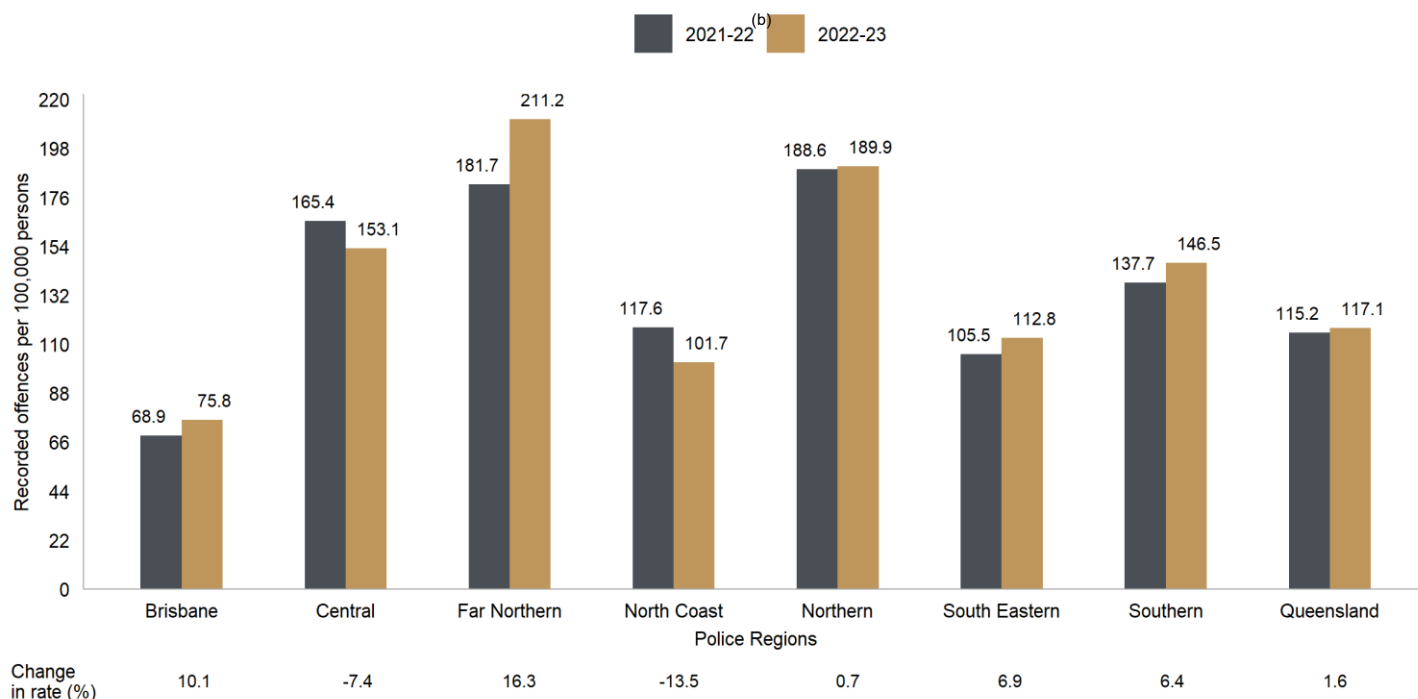

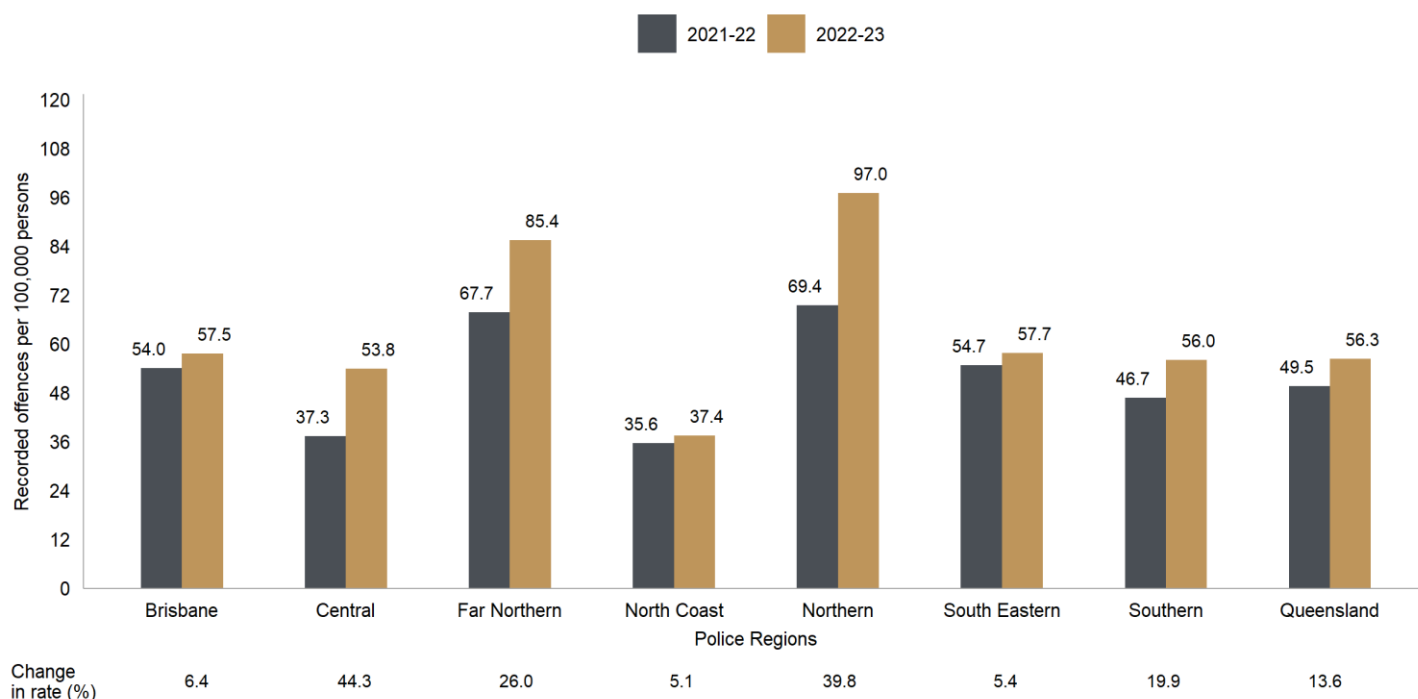
**Figure A12 Other sexual offences<sup>(a)</sup>, by police region**



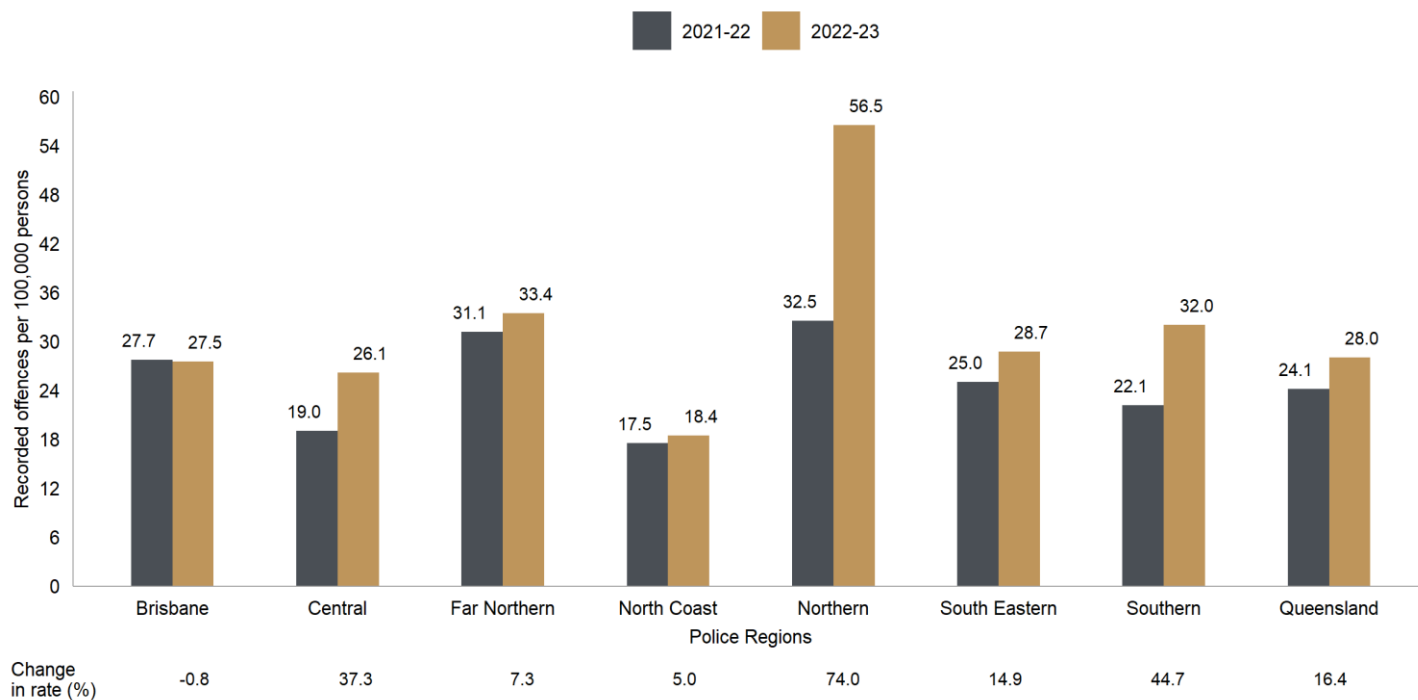

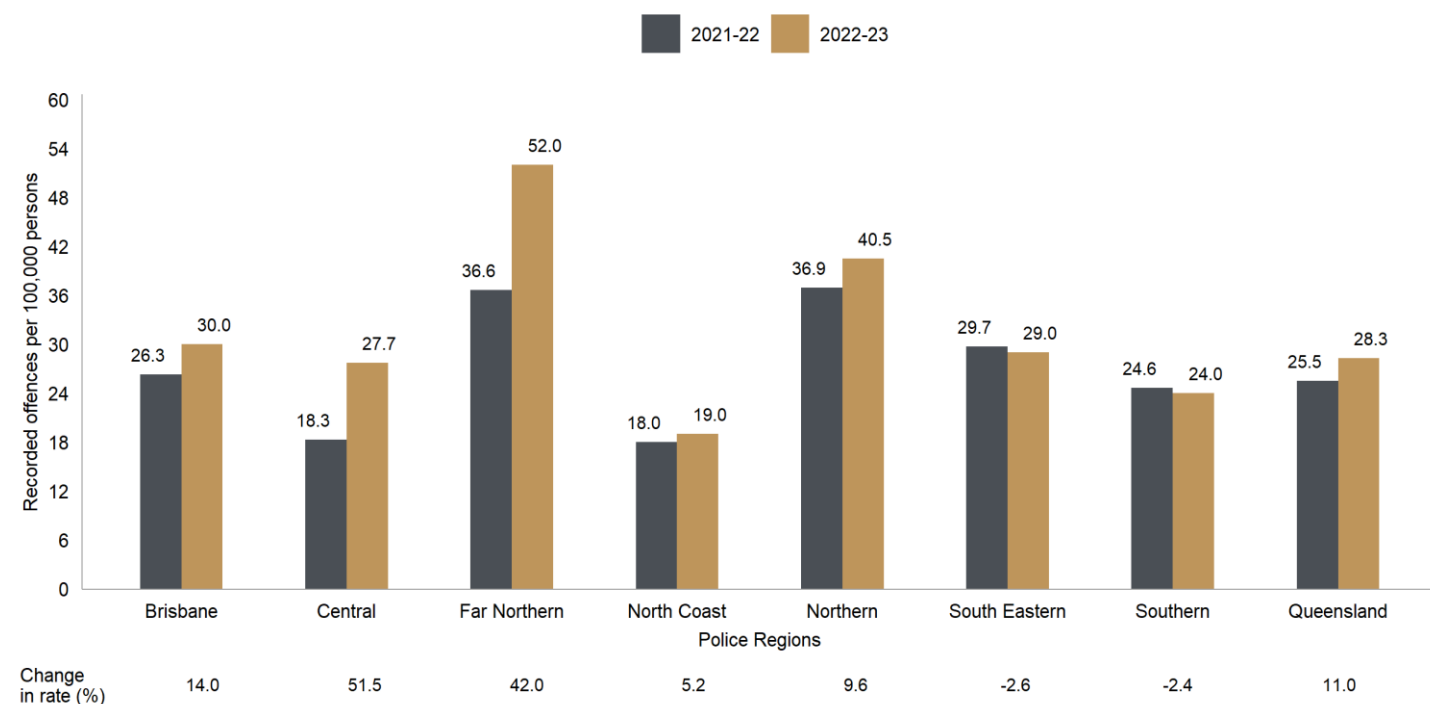
**Figure A13 Robbery – all, by police region**



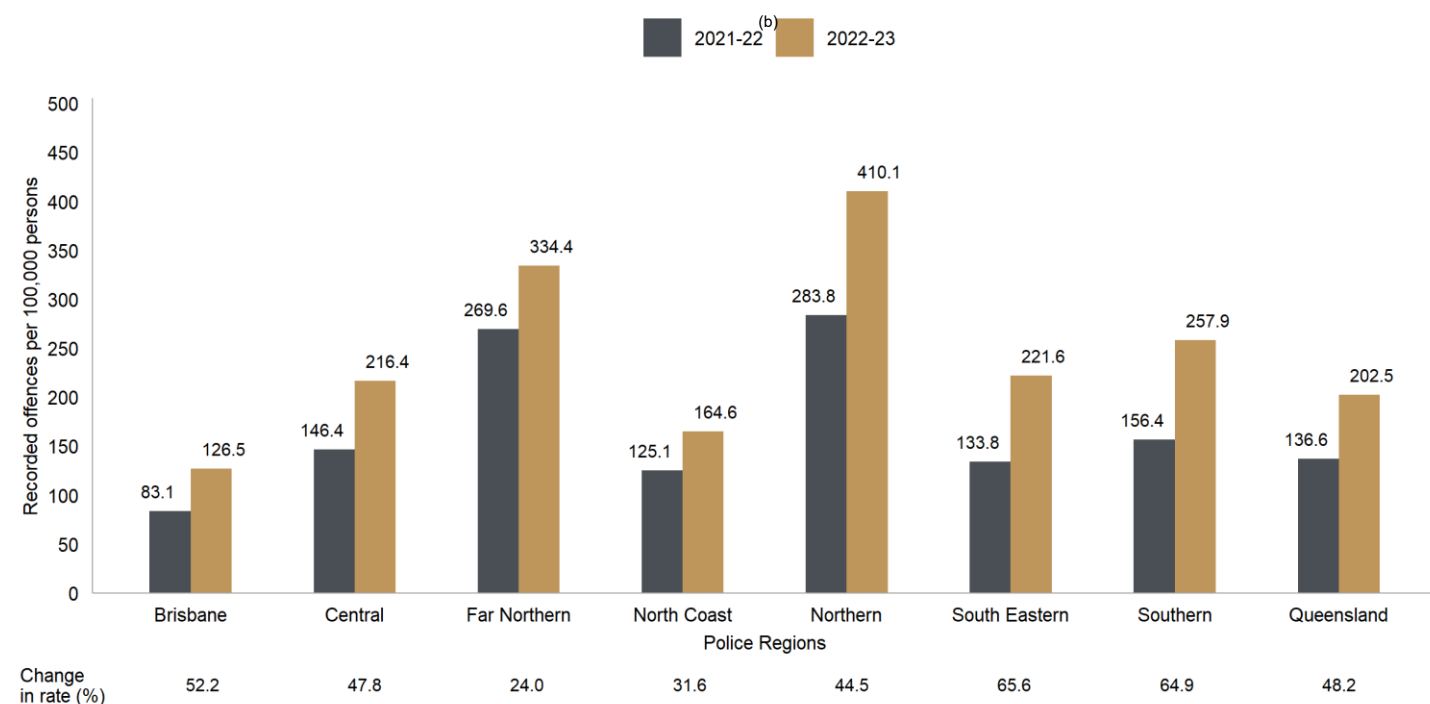
**Figure A14 Armed robbery, by police region**

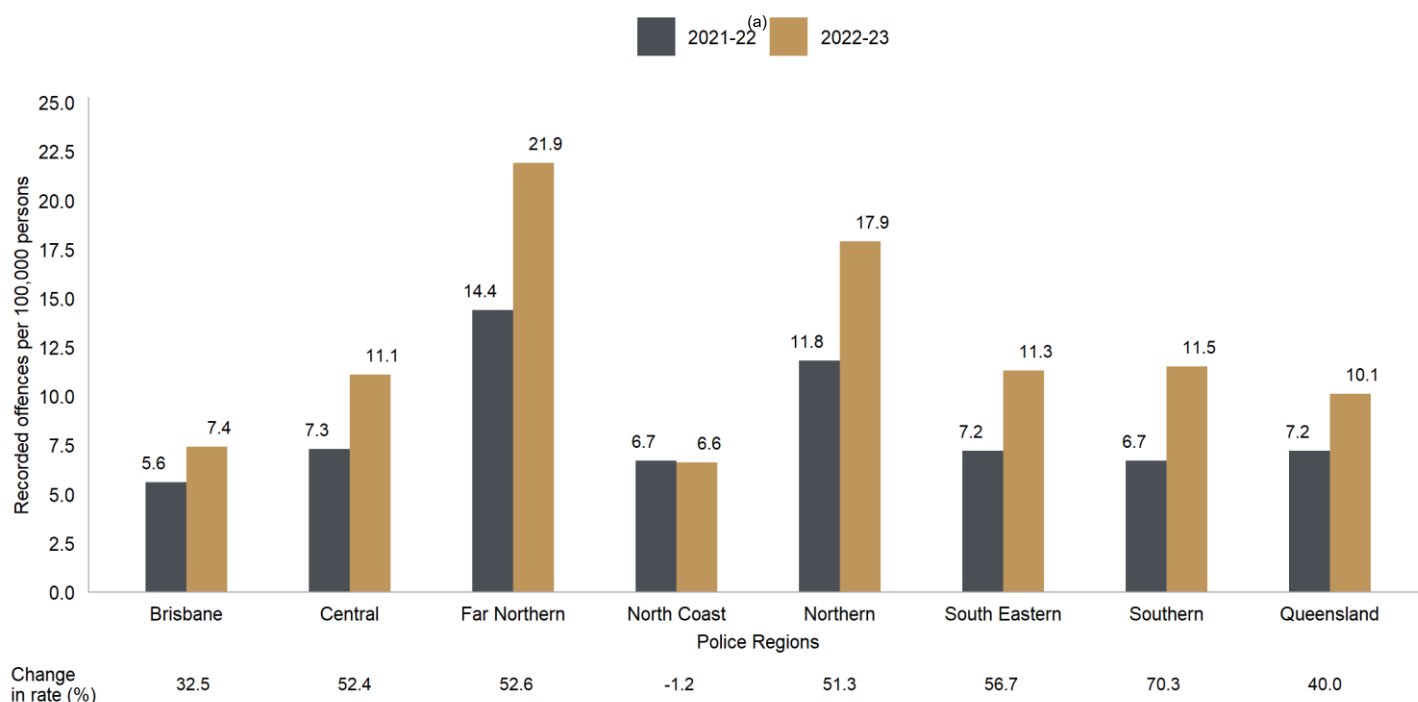
**Figure A16 Other offences against the person – all<sup>(a)</sup>, by police region**

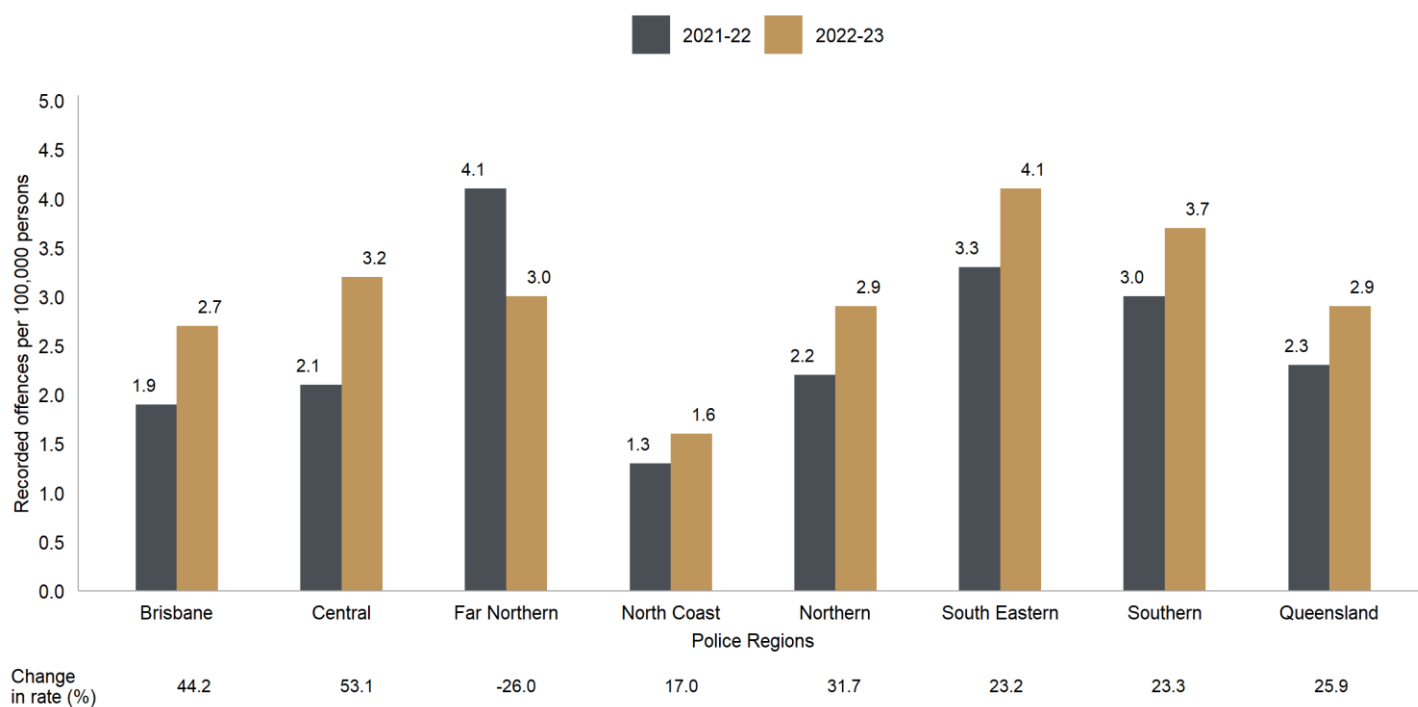

**Figure A17 Kidnapping, abduction etc., by police region**



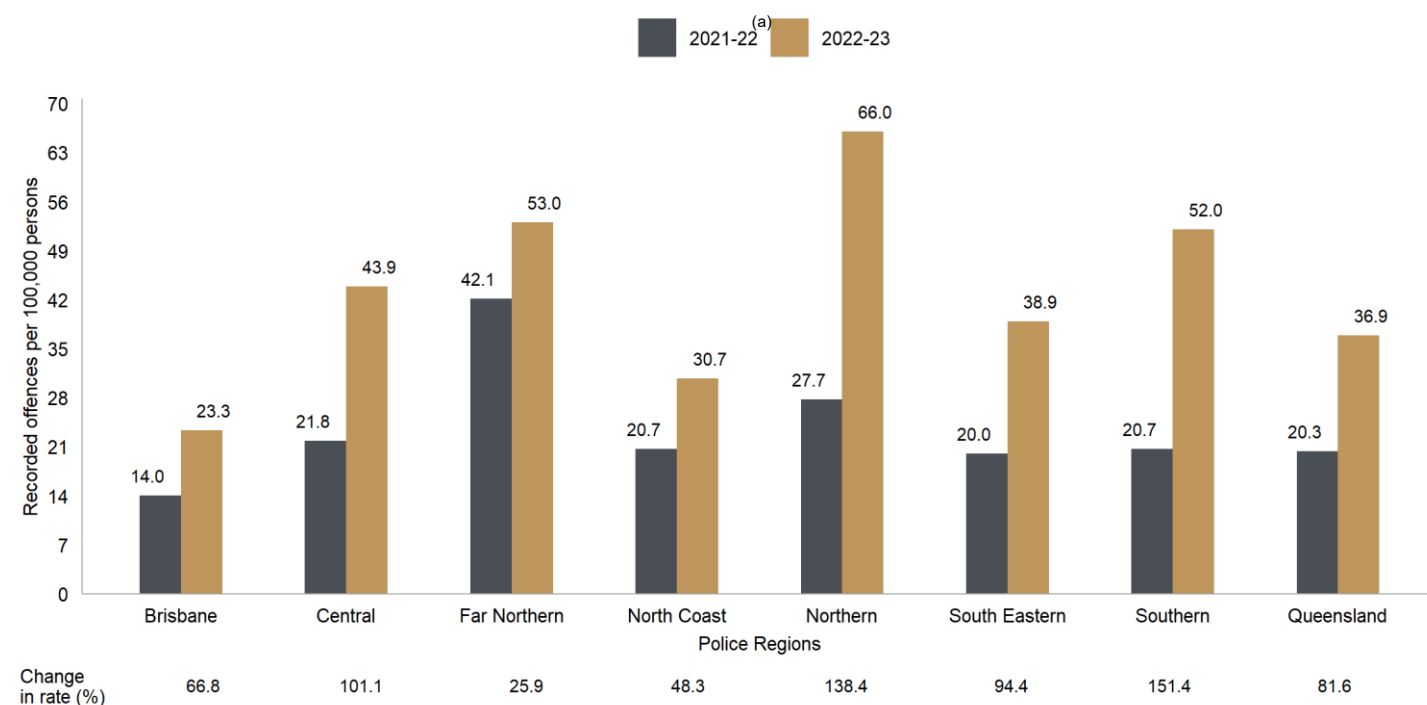

**Figure A18 Extortion, by police region**



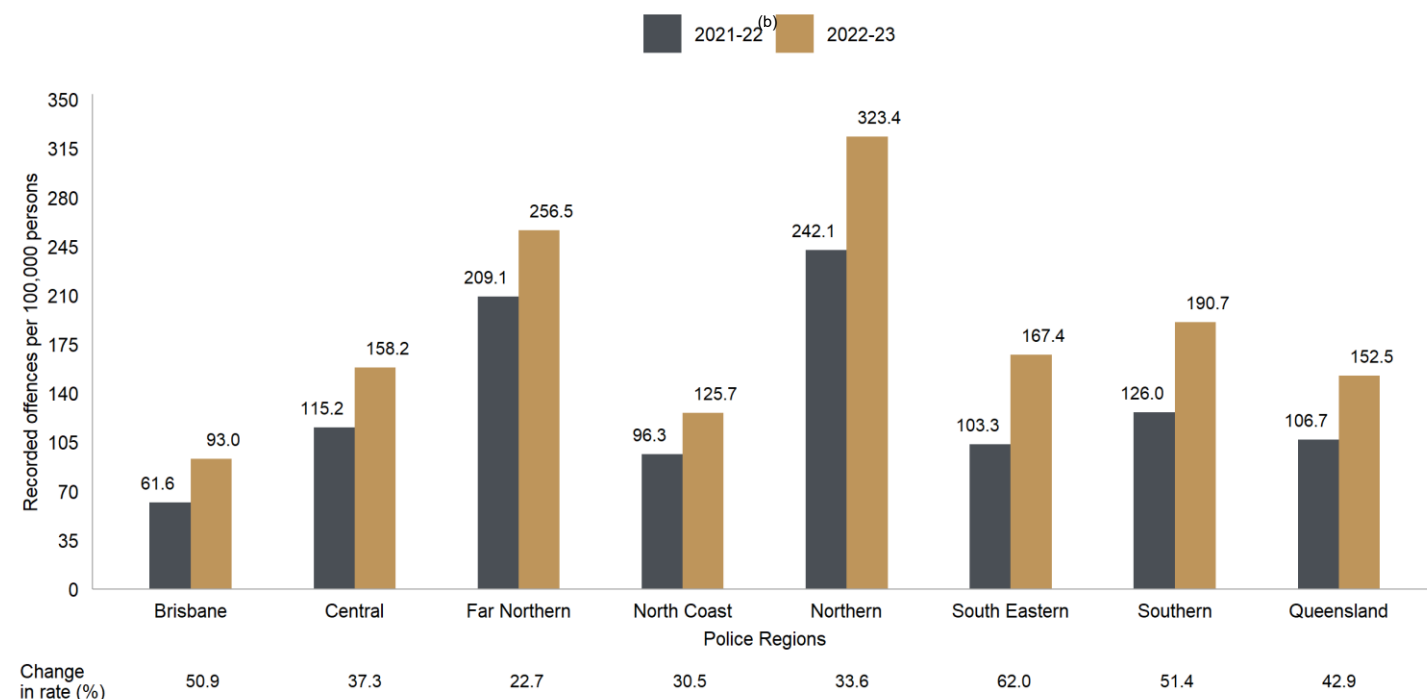


**Figure A19 Stalking, by police region**

**Figure A20 Life endangering acts<sup>(a)</sup>, by police region**

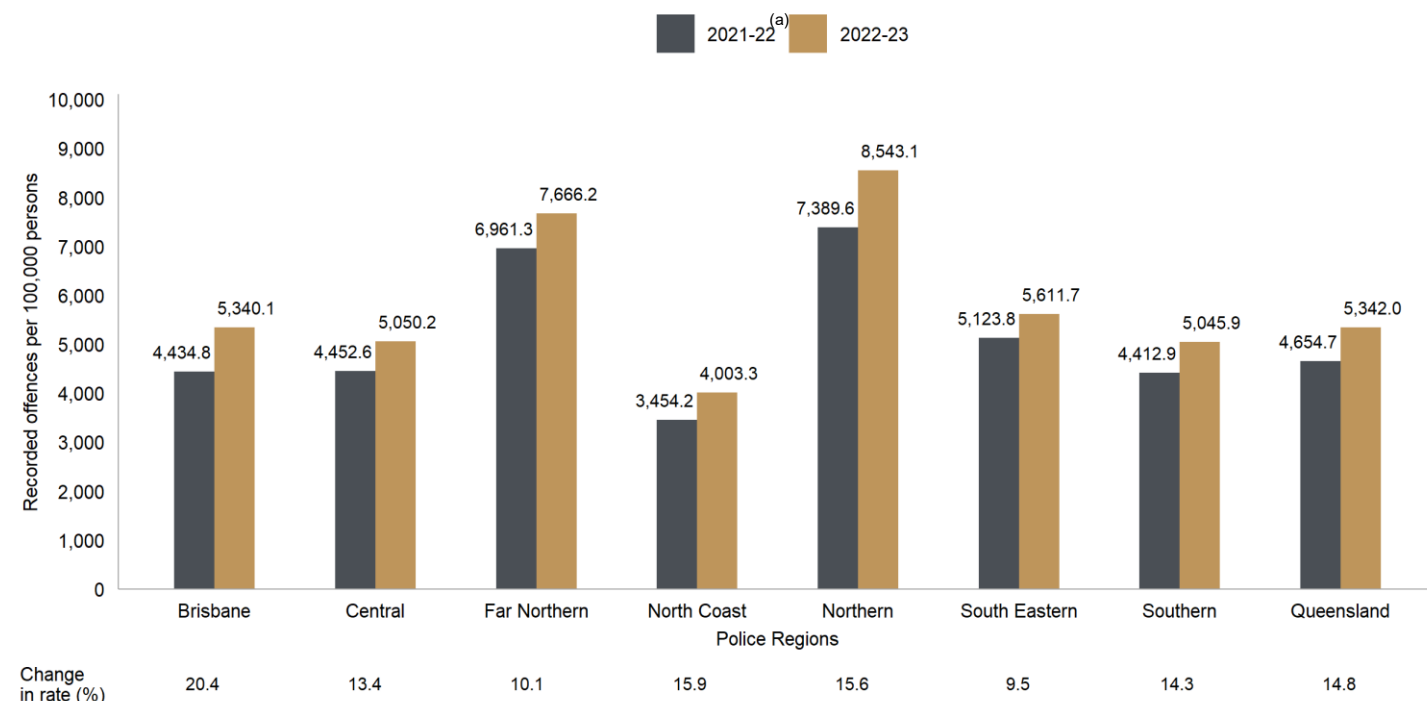

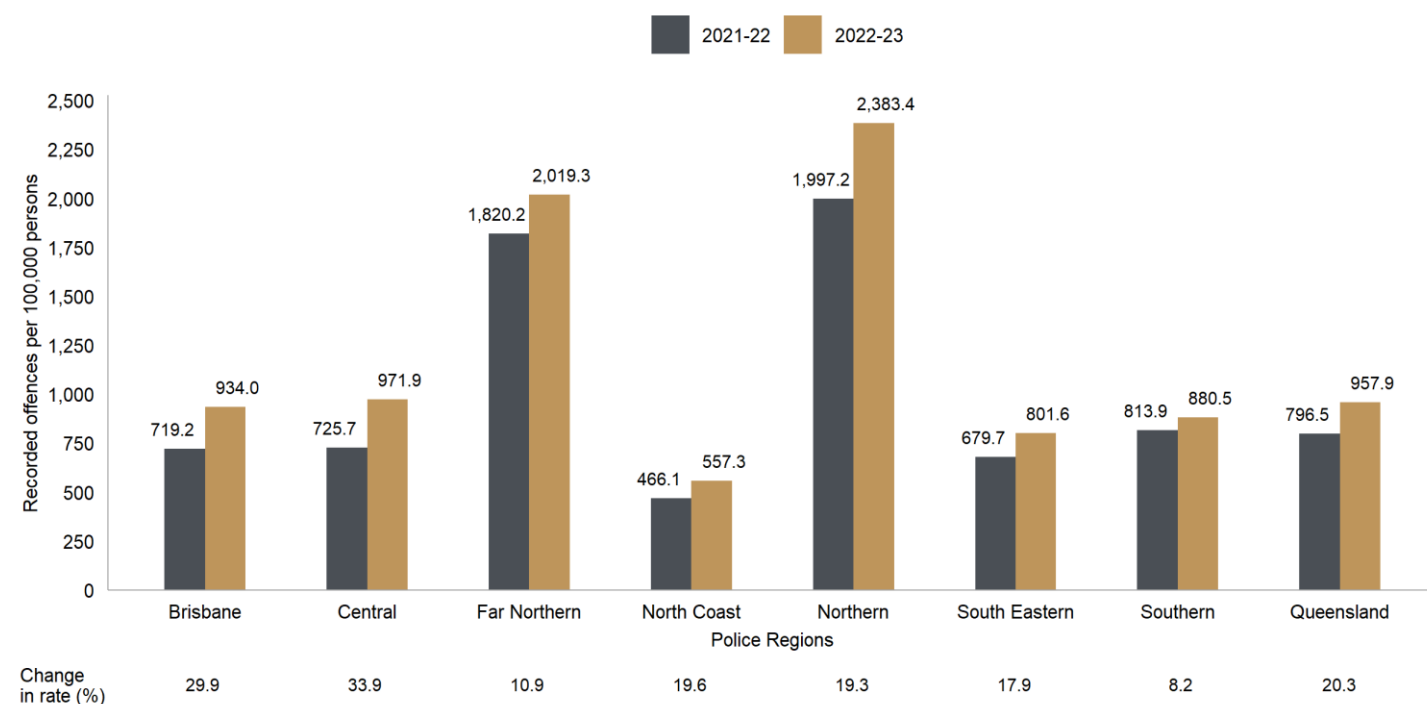

**Figure A21 Offences against property – all offences, by police region**

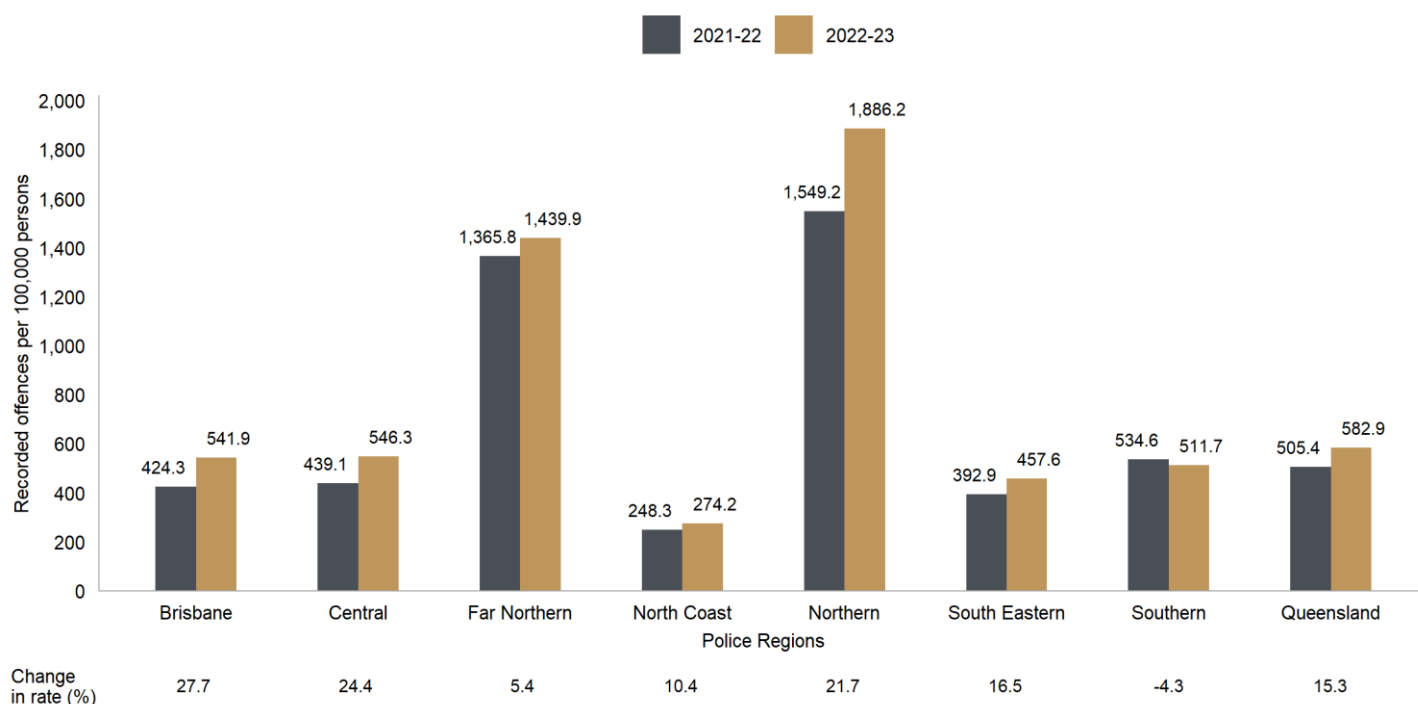

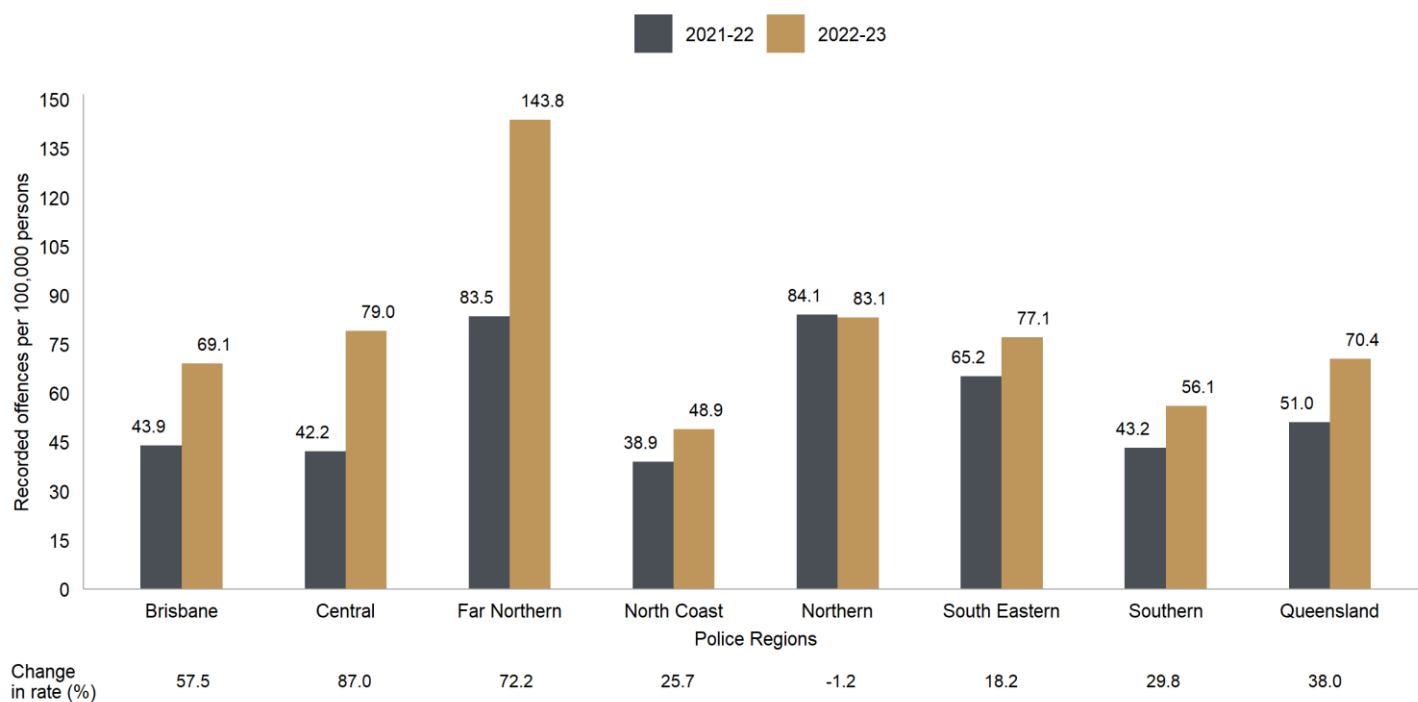
**Figure A22 Unlawful entry – all, by police region**



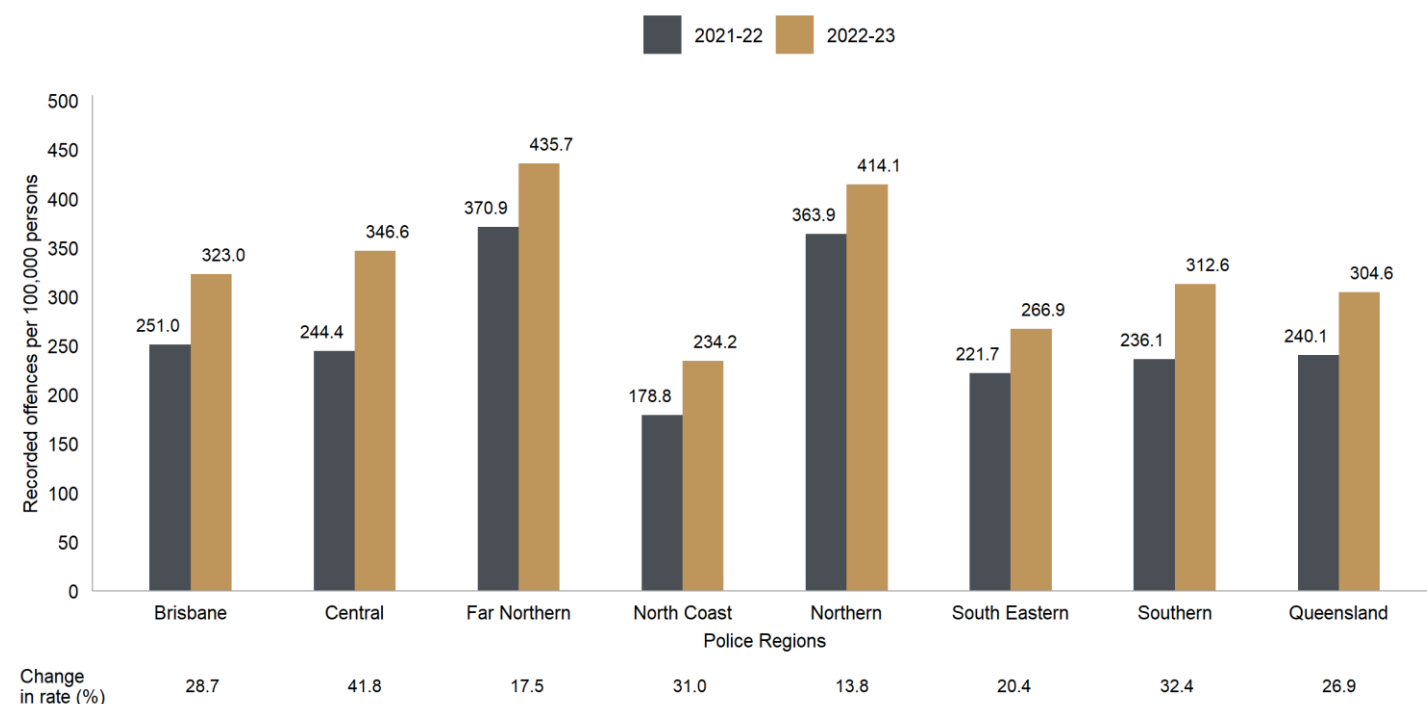
**Figure A23 Unlawful entry with intent – dwelling, by police region**



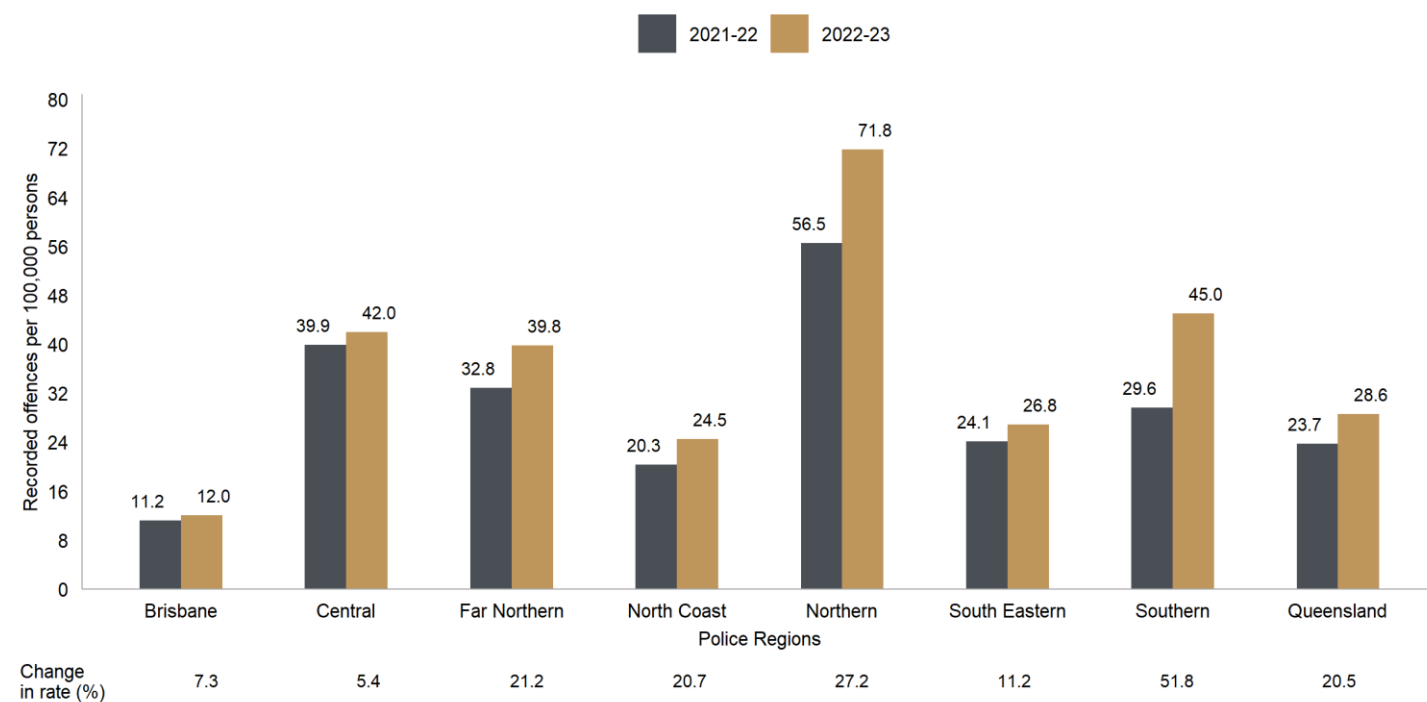
**Figure A24 Unlawful entry with intent – shop, by police region**



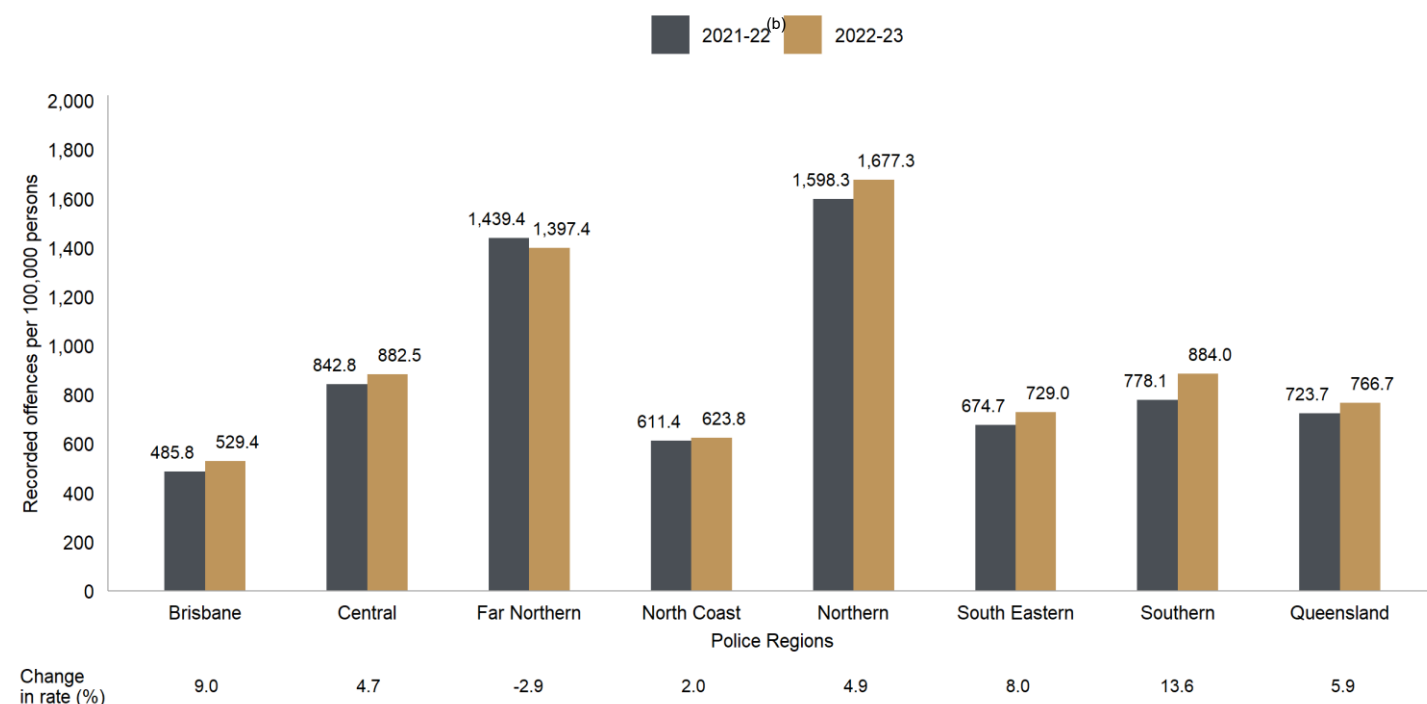
**Figure A25 Unlawful entry with intent – other, by police region**

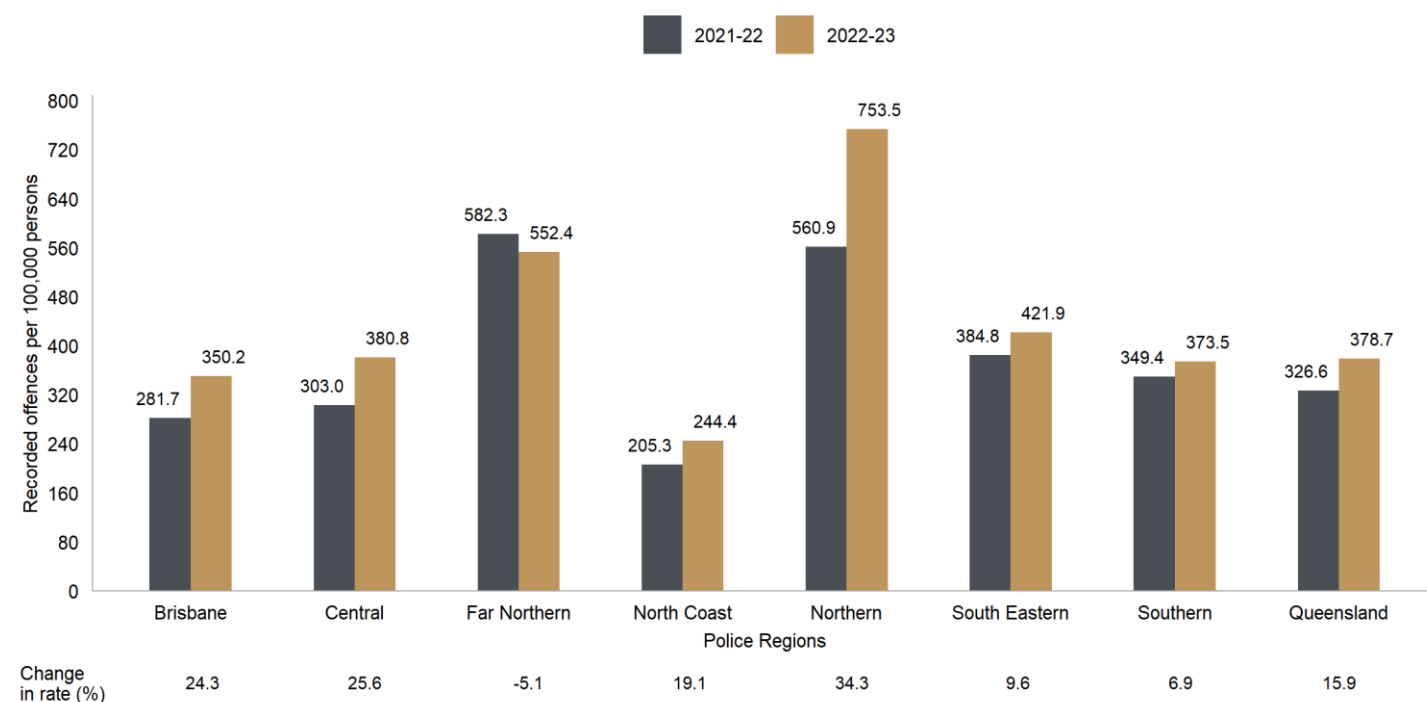
**Figure A27 Other property damage<sup>(a)</sup>, by police region**



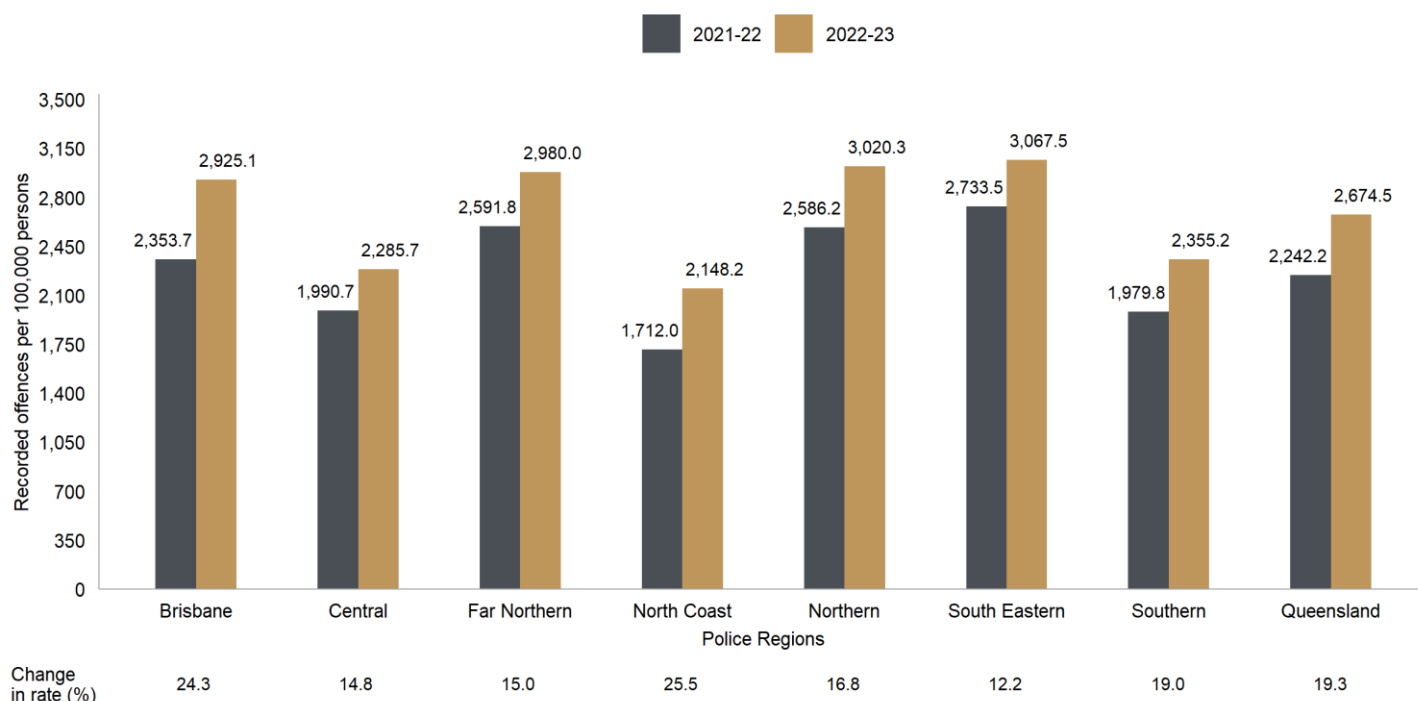

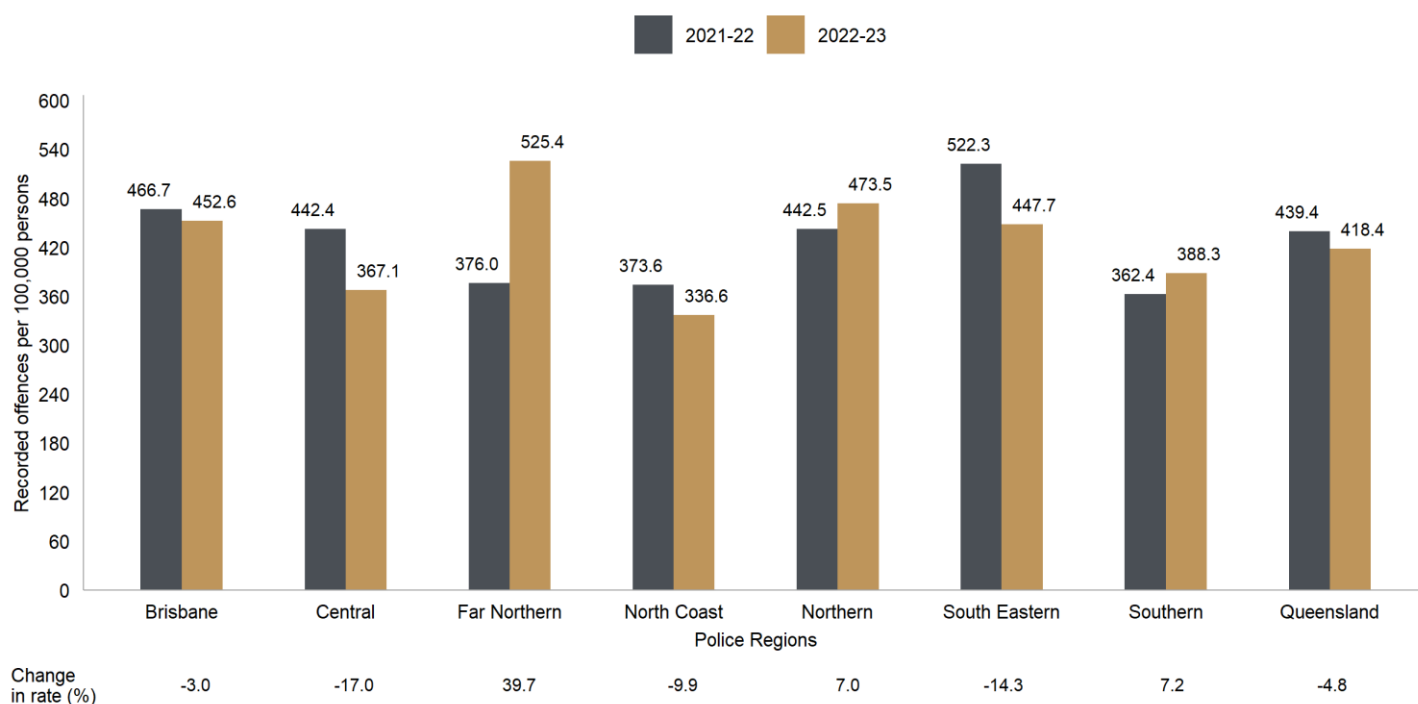
**Figure A28 Unlawful use of motor vehicle, by police region**



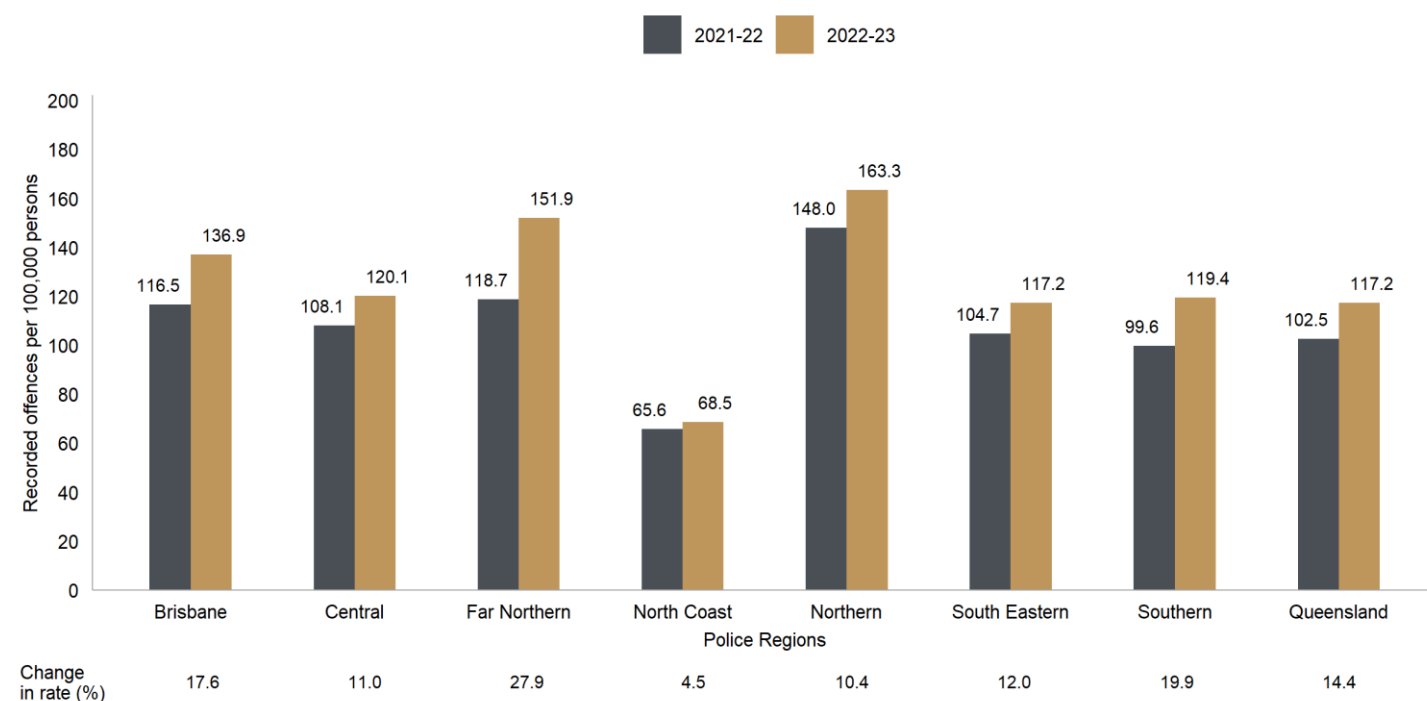
**Figure A29 Other theft (excl. unlawful entry), by police region**

Figure A32 Other offences – all offences, by police region

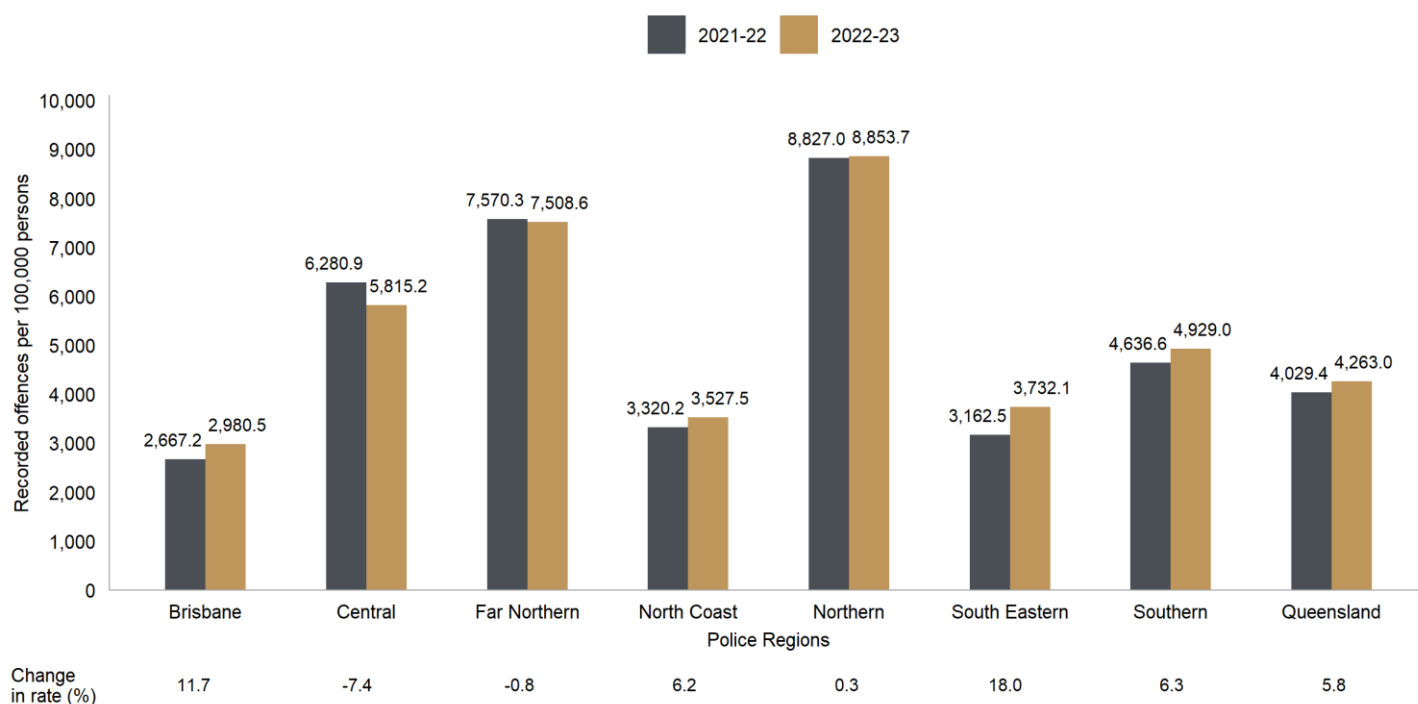
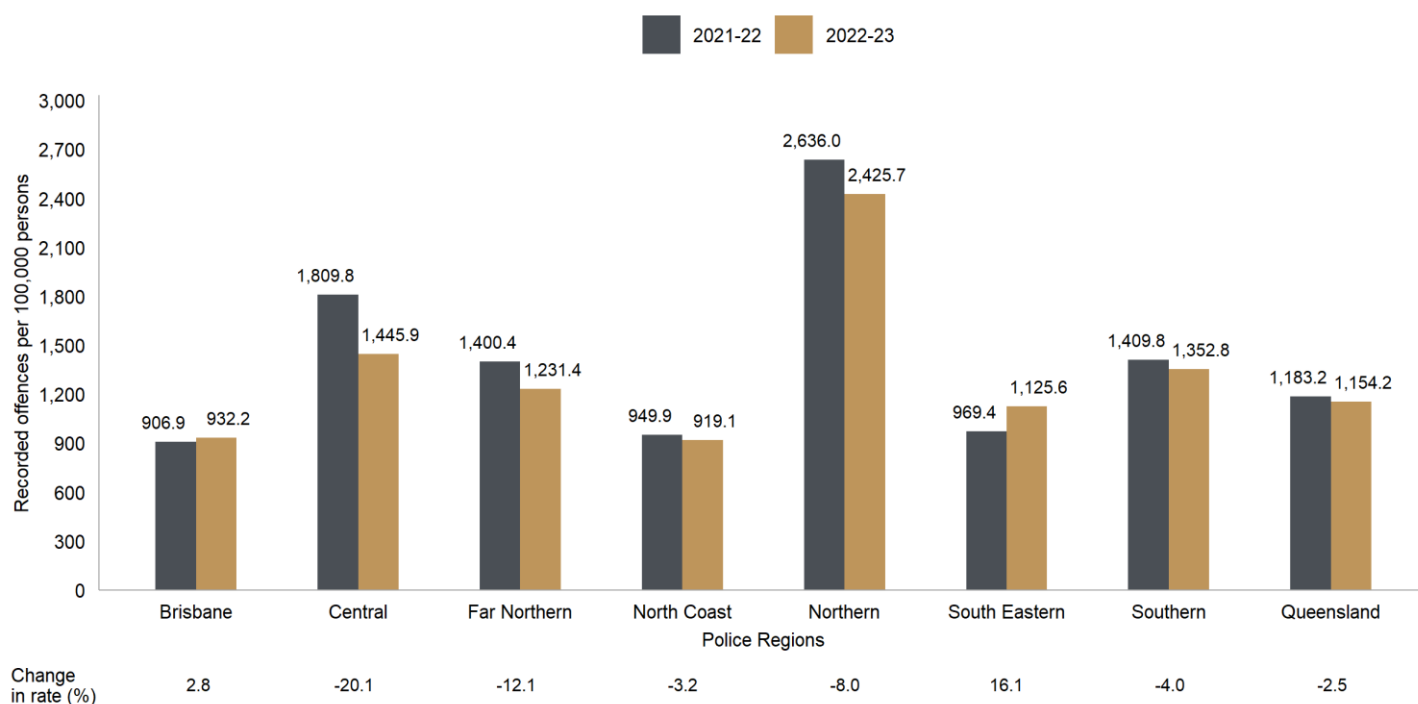
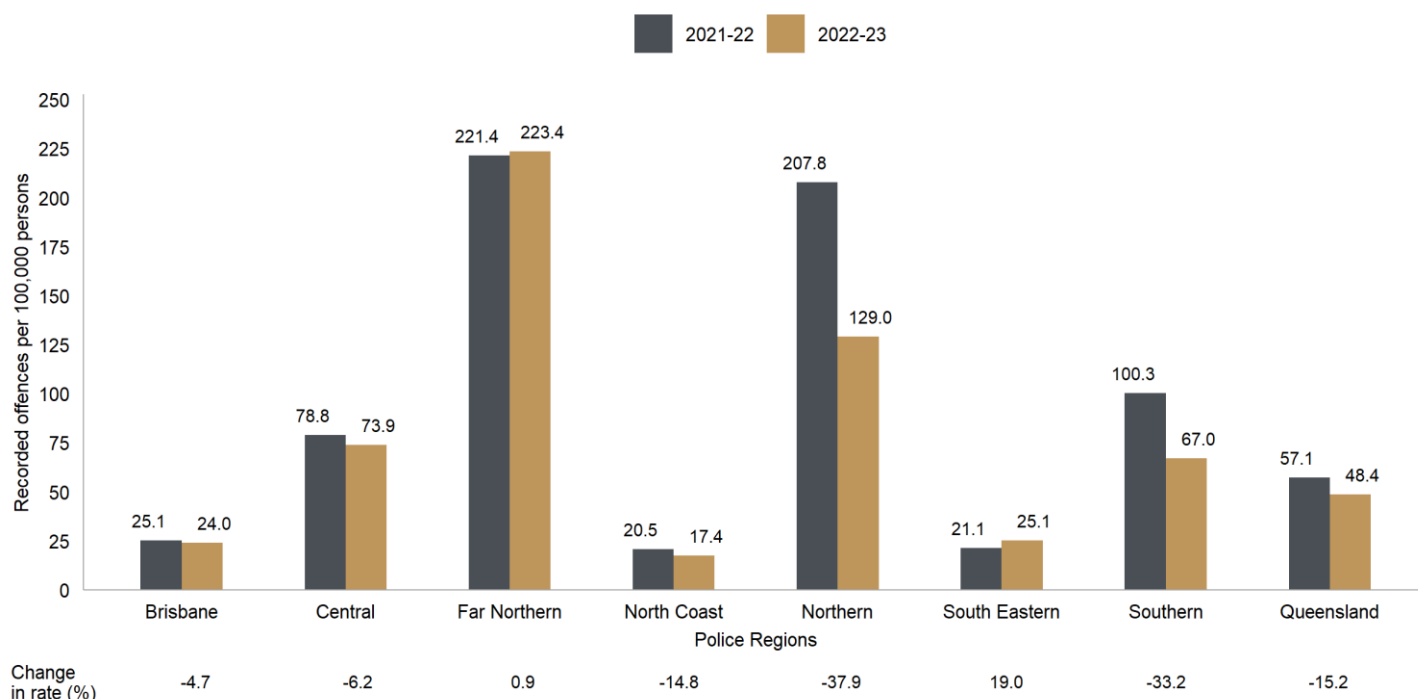


Figure A33 Drug offences, by police region

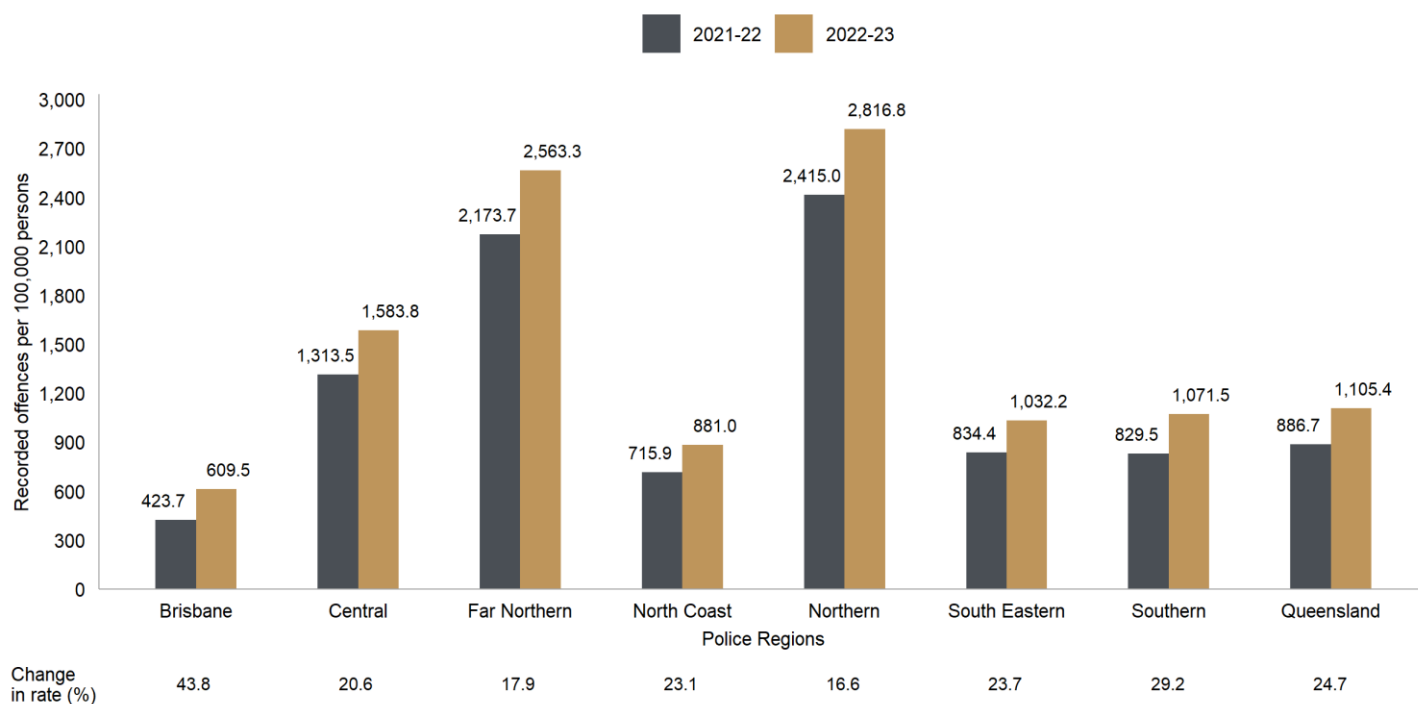




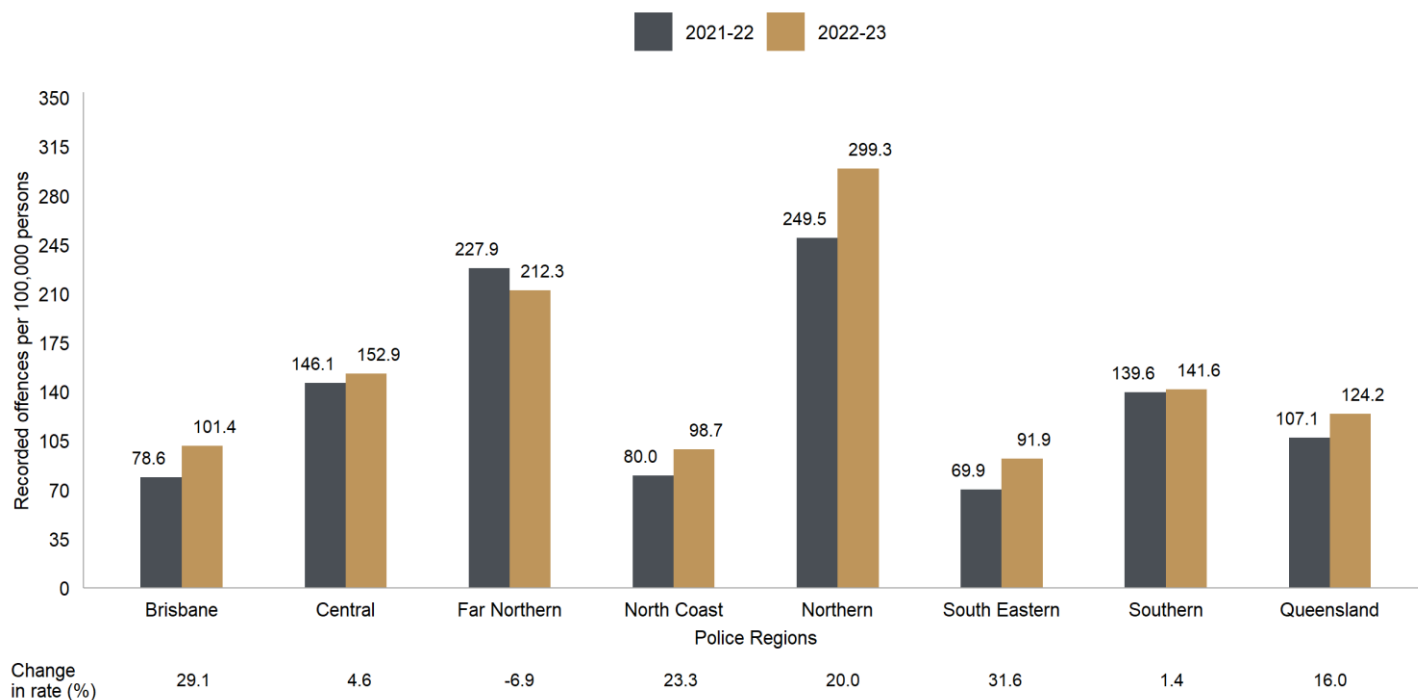
**Figure A34 Liquor offences (excl. drunkenness), by police region**



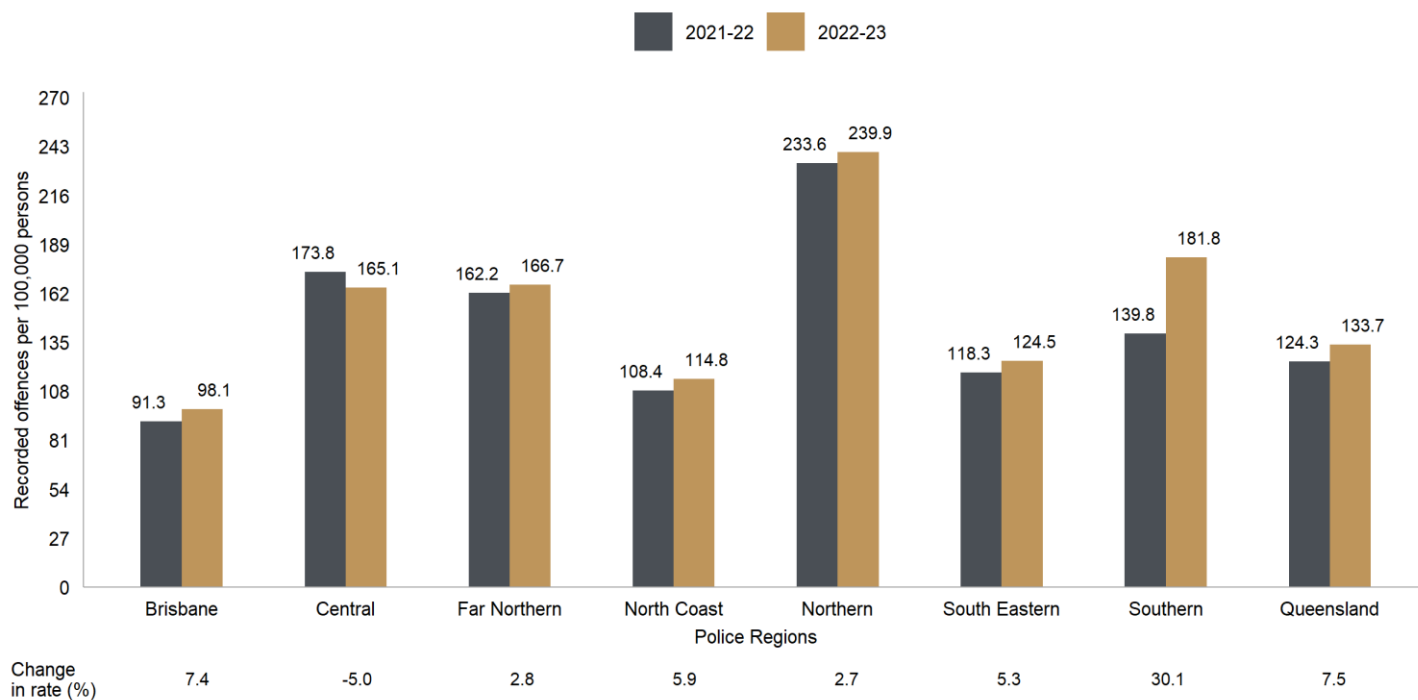
**Figure A35 Breach of domestic violence protection order, by police region**



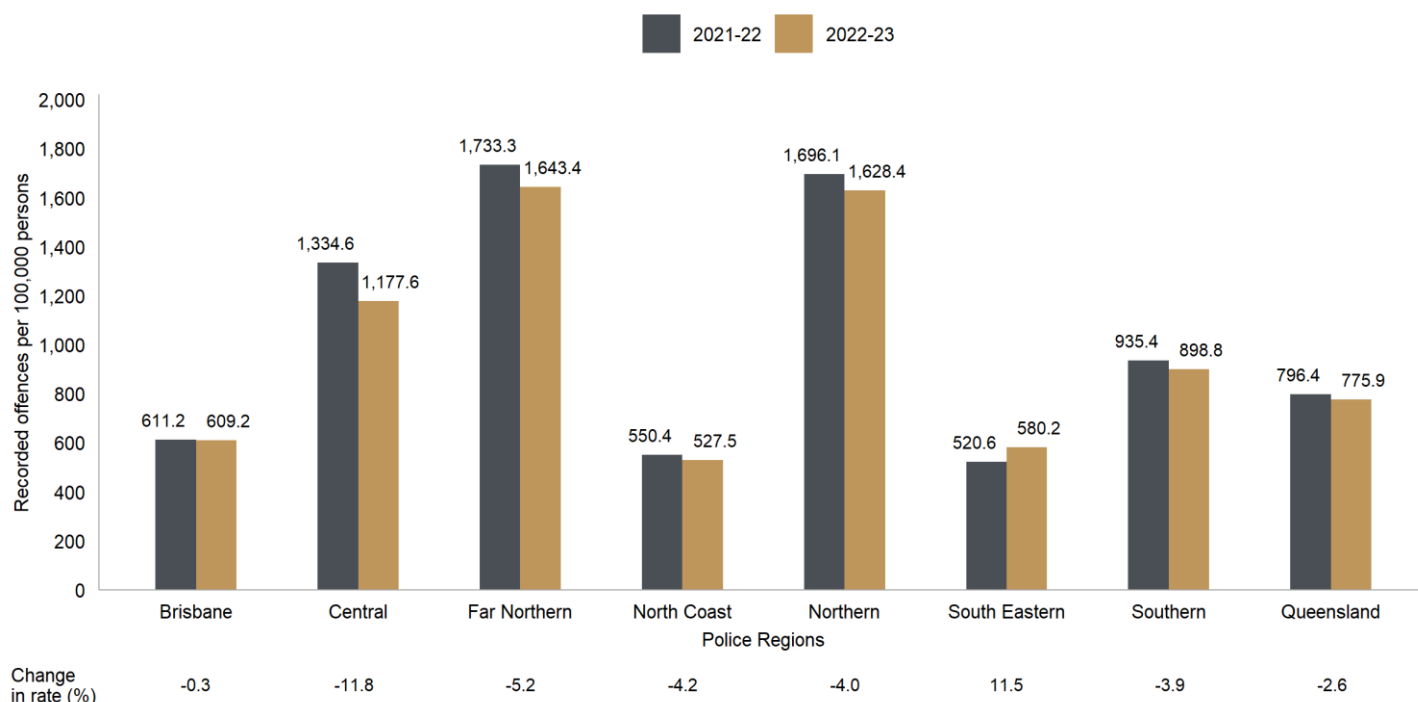
**Figure A36 Trespassing and vagrancy, by police region**



**Figure A37 Weapons Act offences, by police region**

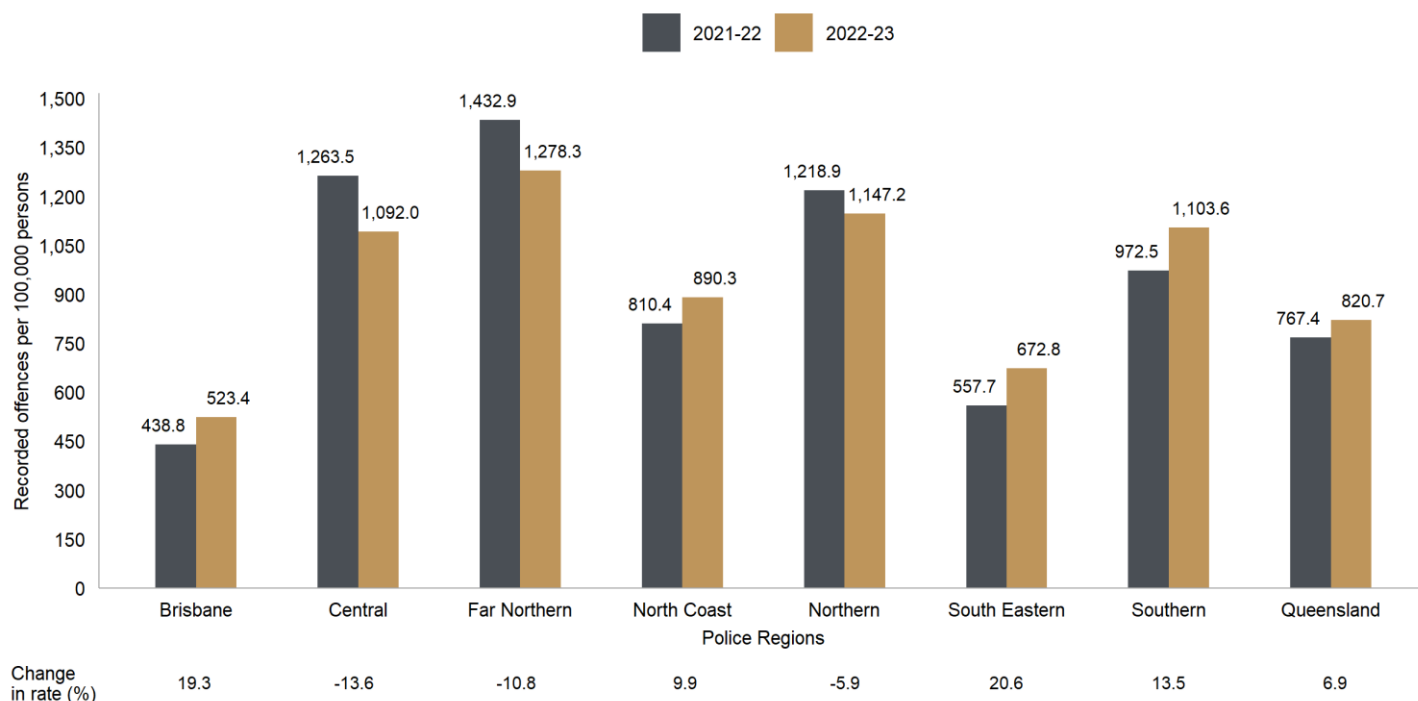


**Figure A38 Good order offences<sup>(a)</sup>, by police region**

## 5.0 Offenders by age and sex, by police region

This section presents statistics about offenders proceeded against by police, by Queensland Police Region.

An offender is any person aged 10 years or over who, through the clearance of an offence, is deemed to be responsible for committing that offence.

Offender statistics in this report represent a count of one offender aged 10 years or older for each reported offence type cleared or solved through police action against an offender within a single incident, and do not represent a count of unique offenders (persons) unless so stated, nor do they equate to the number of offences cleared by police. An individual is counted multiple times if they were proceeded against for multiple offence types within the same incident, or multiple times within the reference period.

**Please note:** There has been a change in police practice since July 2021, with police now required to report all criminal offences associated with a domestic and family violence (DFV) investigation. A large proportion of these are withdrawn due to victims electing not to proceed. This has led to a greater increase in DFV-related recorded victims, and recorded and cleared offences, and a smaller increase in offenders.

The reference date used to generate statistics for the year under review is the date an action commenced against an offender, regardless of when the offence occurred. As such, offenders proceeded against in the reference year, for matters recorded in the same or in previous years, will be included in this report.

Figures in the following tables **do not represent a count of unique offenders**, as an individual may be recorded as an offender once or multiple times in the reporting period.

Offender's age is reported as at date police action was commenced against them, not at date offence occurred. Be aware that, in some instances, the time difference may be considerable.

To protect the anonymity of individuals, offender tables have been subjected to confidentialisation where cell values range from 1 to 3. All such cells ( $\leq 3$ ) are assigned a nominal value of 2. Cells with a value of zero remain unaltered. Totals for certain variables, therefore, may vary slightly across tables within the report. (See *Explanatory notes* for more detail.)

## 6.0 Victims of offences against the person, by police region

This section presents statistics about victims of offences against the person, by Queensland Police Region.

In this report, victim statistics relate only to victims of offences against the person, reported to or detected by police within the reporting period. For most offences against the person, 'the victim' is an individual person. Offences where the victim was an organisation have not been included in this report.

The statistics are compiled on the basis of one victim per counted offence type within a single incident, and do not represent a count of unique victims. A person may be counted multiple times if they were the victim of multiple offences being to different offence types within a single incident or recorded multiple times during the reference period. They would be counted once for each most serious offence per offence type.

The reference date for the year under review is the date an offence was reported to/detected by police, regardless of when the offence occurred. In some instances, particularly with homicide and sexual offences, there may be a large time difference between when the offence occurred and the report/detection date.

Victim's age is reported as at date offence was reported to / detected by police, not at date offence occurred. Be aware that, in some instances, the time difference may be considerable.

Figures in the following tables do not represent a count of unique victims, as an individual may be recorded as a victim once or multiple times in the reporting period.

To protect the anonymity of individuals, victim tables have been subjected to confidentialisation where cell values range from 1 to 3. All such cells ( $\leq 3$ ) are assigned a nominal value of 2. Cells with a value of zero remain unaltered. Totals for certain variables, therefore, may vary slightly across tables within the report. (See *Explanatory notes* for more detail.)

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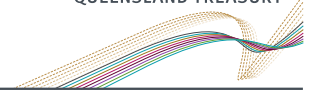

## 6.2. Relationship of offender to victim

**Please note:** There has been a change in police practice with police now required to report all criminal offences associated with a DFV investigation. A substantial proportion of these are withdrawn due to victims electing not to proceed. This has led to a greater increase in recorded victims, and recorded and cleared offences, and a smaller increase in offenders. The tables in this section count the number of victims (not individuals), rather than offenders or relationships.

Victims of all offences against the person are included, regardless of the cleared/solved status of the offence. Relationship is recorded at time offence was reported, and relationship classifications used are derived from those used by the ABS in *Recorded crime – Victims, Australia*.
