

### Commentary

- The Brisbane, Gold Coast, Moreton Bay and Sunshine Coast local government areas have the largest populations in both Queensland and Australia (Table 1). Seven of the top ten local government areas by population size in Queensland at 30 June 2010 were located in South East Queensland (SEQ). Only Townsville City, Cairns Regional Council and Toowoomba Regional Council (ranked 6th, 7th and 9th respectively) were located outside SEQ.
- Of the local government areas in Queensland, the largest population increases over the year to 30 June 2010 occurred in Brisbane City (14,841 persons), followed by Gold Coast City (12,943) and Moreton Bay Regional Council (11,125). Population increases moderated between 2008–09 and 2009–10 in each of the local government areas which recorded the ten largest population increases in the 12-month period to 30 June 2010 (Table 2).
- Somerset Regional Council (4.2%) recorded the fastest growth rate in Queensland in the 12 months ending 30 June 2010, followed by Ipswich City (Table 3). Of the ten fastest growing local government areas, only Torres Strait Island Regional Council experienced higher population growth in the 12-month period ending 30 June 2010 compared with the previous 12-month period. Population growth was lower in the other local government areas.
- Population growth in the Brisbane capital city statistical division moderated in the 12-month period to 30 June 2010 compared with the previous 12-month period (from 2.7% to 1.9%). This trend was evident in a number of Australian state capital cities with the exception of Adelaide and Greater Hobart (Table 4).
