## **RETAIL TRADE: DECEMBER 2011**

#### **Main Features**

#### Commentary

Note: Commentary on monthly figures is based on nominal values throughout and, as such, movements are affected by price and quantity changes.

- The trend estimate of Queensland's retail turnover decreased 0.1% in December 2011. Australia's trend turnover increased by 0.2% during the month (Figure 1).
- The trend value of Queensland's retail turnover decreased from \$4,251.7 million in November 2011 to \$4,248.6 million in December 2011.
- The decrease in Queensland's nominal retail turnover in December 2011 mainly reflected lower spending in Cafes, restaurants and takeaway food services, as well as Other retailing. This lower spending was partially offset by higher spending on Food retailing and Clothing, footwear and personal accessory retailing.




Figure 2: Annual change in retail turnover, December 2011

- The trend value of Queensland's retail turnover increased by 2.9% over the previous 12 months, from \$4,128.4 million in December 2010 (Figure 2).
- Queensland recorded the third-highest annual growth in retail trade of all states and territories (2.9%).
  Western Australia had the highest increase (9.5%).





Figure 3: Monthly retail turnover contribution to growth by industry group, December 2011

- Cafes, restaurants and takeaway food services recorded the largest detraction from retail turnover growth in Queensland in December 2011 (0.21 percentage point). Food retailing recorded the largest contribution to retail turnover in Queensland in the month (0.14 percentage point) (Figure 3).
- In real terms (which measures the volume of retail turnover, removing the effect of price movements), trend retail trade in Queensland increased 0.1% in December quarter 2011. Over the year to December quarter 2011, real retail turnover rose 1.1%.

Figure 1: Monthly change in retail turnover
