Main findings

Note: Commentary on spending estimates are based on seasonally adjusted nominal values unless otherwise stated.

- In seasonally adjusted terms, Queensland's household spending increased 0.5% in June 2025. Australia's household spending increased 0.5% over the month.
- The seasonally adjusted value of Queensland's household spending increased 6.4% over the year, from \$15,064.0 million in June 2024 to \$16,031.0 million in June 2025. Australia's household spending increased 4.8% over the year.
- In seasonally adjusted terms, Queensland recorded the third-largest growth in household spending over the year to June 2025 of all states and territories (6.4%). Northern Territory and Western Australia recorded the largest growth (7.2%) (Figure 1).

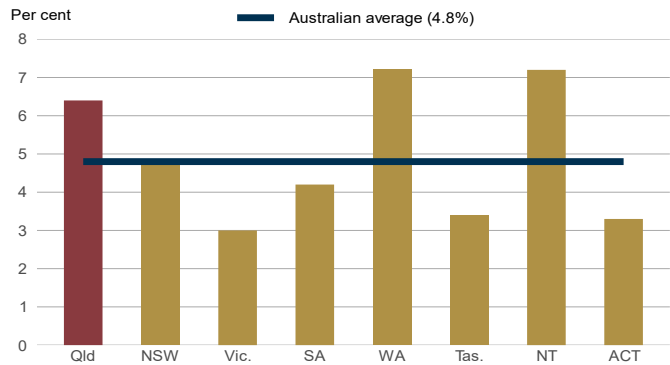


Figure 2 Annual change in discretionary and essential household spending, Queensland

- Seasonally adjusted household spending in Queensland on discretionary items in June 2025 increased 6.4% over the year. Household spending on essential (non-discretionary items) increased 6.4% over the same period (Figure 2).

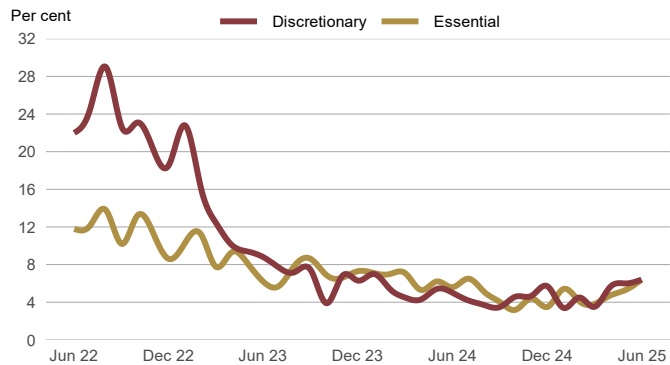
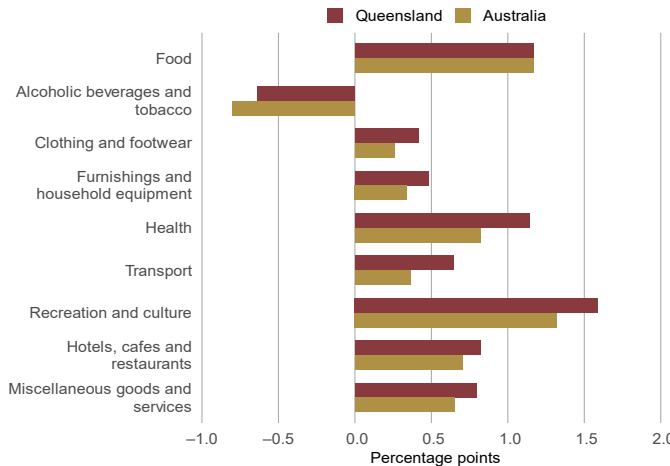


Figure 3 Annual household spending contribution to growth by category, June 2025

- In seasonally adjusted terms, 'Recreation and culture' recorded the largest contribution to household spending growth in Queensland over the year to June 2025 (1.59 percentage points). 'Recreation and culture' recorded the largest contribution to household spending growth in Australia over the year (1.32 percentage points) (Figure 3).
- In seasonally adjusted, volume terms, household spending in Queensland increased 4.2% over the year to June 2025. Australia increased 2.4% over the same period.

Figure 1 Annual change in household spending, June 2025
