


# Queensland regions compared, Census 2016

The Statistical Area Level 4 (SA4) regions are the largest sub-state regions in the main structure of the Australian Statistical Geography Standard (ASGS) released by the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS). SA4s generally have a population over 100,000 persons.

#### **Key points:**

- Gold Coast had the largest population in Queensland (569,997 persons).
- While Queensland Outback had the smallest overall population (79,700 persons) it had the largest number of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples (26,560 persons).
- Brisbane South had the largest percentage of persons who were born overseas (36.9%).
- Brisbane Inner City had the highest median weekly personal income (\$938).

### **Population**

At the time of the 2016 Census, there were 4,703,193 usual residents in Queensland (Table 1).

Gold Coast had the largest population in Queensland (569,997 persons), followed by Sunshine Coast (346,522 persons).

Brisbane Inner City had the highest population density, with 3,061.0 persons per km<sup>2</sup>, while Queensland - Outback had the lowest (0.1 person per km<sup>2</sup>).

Wide Bay had the highest median age (46 years), while Brisbane Inner City and Queensland - Outback had the lowest (33 years).

### Indigenous status

At the time of the 2016 Census, there were 186,482 persons in Queensland who identified themselves as being Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander (Table 2). This represented 4.0% of the total population and was an increase of 30,656 people (or 19.7%) compared with the 2011 Census.

Queensland - Outback had the largest number of persons who identified as being Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander (26,560 persons), representing 33.3% of the region's total population. This was the highest percentage amongst the Queensland SA4s, followed by Cairns (10.0%) and Townsville (7.9%).

Brisbane - West had the lowest number of persons who identified as being Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander (1,694 persons), representing 0.9% of the region's total population.

#### **Born overseas**

At the time of the 2016 Census, there were 1,015,875 persons in Queensland who stated they were born overseas (Table 3). This represented 21.6% of the total population.

Gold Coast had the largest number of persons born overseas (160,312 persons or 28.1%), while Brisbane - South had the largest percentage of persons born overseas (36.9%). Darling Downs - Maranoa had the lowest percentage (8.1%).

All five Brisbane SA4s recorded percentages of more than 20% for persons born overseas.

## **Voluntary work**

In the 12 months prior to the 2016 Census, 18.8% of persons aged 15 years and over in Queensland stated that they had spent time undertaking unpaid voluntary work through an organisation or group (Table 4).

Darling Downs - Maranoa had the highest percentage of persons who undertook voluntary work (25.3%) followed by Brisbane – West (25.1%). Logan - Beaudesert had the lowest percentage (14.9%), followed by the Gold Coast (15.1%).

#### Income

At the time of the 2016 Census, Brisbane Inner City had the highest median weekly personal income (\$938), while Wide Bay had the lowest (\$478) (Table 5).

Brisbane Inner City had the highest median weekly family income (\$2,495), while Wide Bay had the lowest (\$1,133).

Brisbane - West had the highest median weekly household income (\$1,971), while Wide Bay had the lowest (\$935).

## Mortgage and rent

At the time of the 2016 Census, Brisbane Inner City had the highest median weekly mortgage repayment (\$550), while Darling Downs - Maranoa and Wide Bay had the lowest (\$325) (Table 6).

Brisbane Inner City had the highest median weekly rent (\$415), while Queensland - Outback had the lowest (\$140).

# **Household composition**

At the time of the 2016 Census, 71.8% of households in Queensland were classified as family households (Table 7). Moreton Bay - South had the highest percentage of family households (81.1%), while Brisbane Inner City had the highest percentage of non-family households (41.9%).

## **Family composition**

At the time of the 2016 Census, couple family with children was the most dominant family type for Queensland (42.5%), followed by couple family with no children (39.4%) (Table 8).

Brisbane - West had the highest percentage of couple families with children (50.3%), while Wide Bay had the lowest (32.8%).

Wide Bay had the highest percentage of couple families with no children (48.6%), while Logan - Beaudesert had the lowest (32.7%).

Logan - Beaudesert and Ipswich had the highest percentage of one parent families (20.0%), while Brisbane Inner City had the lowest (11.3%).
