Main findings

Note: Commentary is based on year of birth registration and state of usual residence of the mother, regardless of where in Australia the birth occurred. Year of registration can be different to year of occurrence due to lags in the registration process. It should also be noted that date of registration is not uniform across states and territories. Both these factors should be kept in mind when analysing births data.

- In 2023, there were 58,458 births in Queensland, comprising 29,866 males (51.1%) and 28,592 females (48.9%). This was a decrease of 5.9% over the previous year (62,094 births) (Figure 1). In Australia, the number of births decreased 4.6% over the year, to 286,998 registered births in 2023.




Figure 2: Total fertility rate

- The total fertility rate¹ in Queensland decreased from 1.710 in 2022 to 1.544 in 2023. The rate remains higher than Australia's total fertility rate of 1.499 (Figure 2).





Figure 3: Age-specific fertility rates, Queensland, 2023

- In 2023, Queensland women aged 30–34 years had the highest fertility rate (100.6 births per 1,000 women). Fertility rates for Queensland Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander women peaked in the 25–29 years age group (137.4 births per 1,000 women) (Figure 3). Australian women aged 30–34 years had the highest fertility rate (105.2 births per 1,000 women).
- The median age of Queensland mothers increased from 29.9 years in 2013 to 31.1 years in 2023. Over the same period, the median age of Queensland fathers has increased from 32.1 years to 32.9 years. Both Queensland figures are lower than Australia's median age of mothers and fathers (31.9 years and 33.8 years respectively).
- The number of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander births in Queensland in 2023 was 7,284. This was a decrease of 2.7% from 2022. Australia recorded 24,737 registered Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander births in 2023. Of the total Queensland births, 12.5% were to an Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander parent, compared with 8.6% for Australia.

Figure 1: Registered births, Queensland²
