

Main findings (trend)

Employment in Queensland rose by 11,300 persons (0.4%) in May 2023 to be 70,800 persons (2.6%) higher over the year. The rise in May was driven by an increase in both full-time and part-time employment (up 8,500 and 2,900 respectively).

The employment-to-population ratio was 63.9% in May 2023, up from 63.8% in April and well above its pre-COVID ratio of 62.0%. Hours worked rose 0.5% in May and was 12.4% above its level in March 2020 (**Chart 1**).


Chart 1: Employment and hours worked, Queensland



The unemployment rate was 3.9% in May, unchanged from April 2023 and still well below the pre-COVID rate of 5.6% in March 2020 (Chart 2).

Meanwhile, Queensland's participation rate was 66.5% in May, up from 66.4% in April, and well above its pre-COVID rate of 65.7%.

Nationally, trend employment rose by 39,800 persons in May (0.3%, **Table 2**) to be 1,024,500 (7.9%) above its pre-COVID level of March 2020. In <u>seasonally adjusted</u> terms, employment grew by 75,900 persons which greatly exceeded market expectations.

The national unemployment rate fell to 3.5% in May (**Table 1**). Hours worked increased by 0.4% in the month to be 9.9% above its pre-COVID level in March 2020.

The ABS noted the strength in hours worked relative to employment growth since late 2022 'shows the demand for labour in a tight market is being met, to some extent, by people working more hours.'
