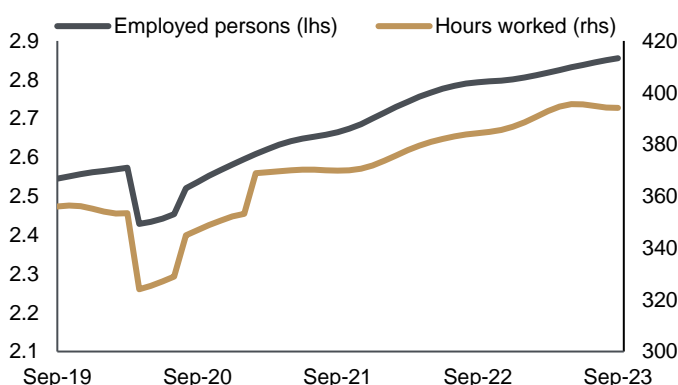

Main findings (trend)

Employment in Queensland rose by 5,400 persons (0.2%) in September 2023 to be 61,900 persons (2.2%) higher over the year. The rise in September was driven by an increase in both full-time and part-time employment (up 500 and 4,900 respectively).

The employment-to-population ratio was 63.7% in September 2023, unchanged from August but above its pre-COVID ratio of 62.0%. Hours worked fell 0.1% in September but was 11.5% above its level in March 2020 (Chart 1).

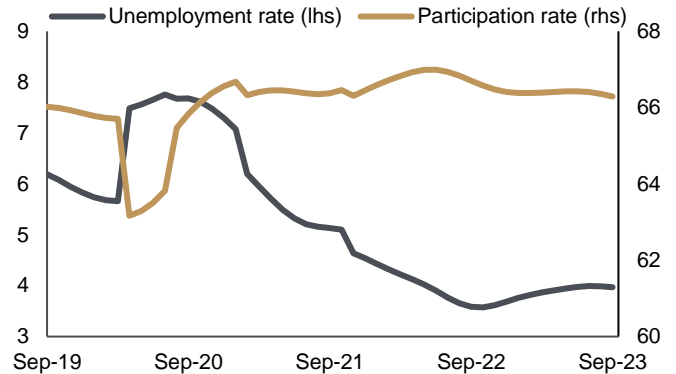
Chart 1: Employment and hours worked, Queensland

The unemployment rate was 4.0% in September, unchanged from a revised 4.0% in August 2023 and still well below the pre-COVID rate of 5.7% in March 2020 (Chart 2).

Meanwhile, Queensland's participation rate was 66.3% in September 2023, down from 66.4% in August 2023, and well above its pre-COVID rate of 65.7%.

Nationally, trend employment rose by 23,000 persons in September (0.2%, Table 2) to be 1,136,500 (8.8%) above its pre-COVID level of March 2020. In seasonally adjusted terms, employment nationally grew by 6,700 persons which was well below market expectations for 20,000 persons.

The ABS noted, "The fall in the unemployment rate in September mainly reflected a higher proportion of people moving from being unemployed to not in the labour force."

The national trend unemployment rate remained unchanged at 3.6% in September 2023 (Table 1). Hours worked decreased by 0.1% in the month but was 10% above its pre-COVID level in March 2020.
