Main findings

- Brisbane's headline consumer price index (CPI) remained unchanged in February 2026, resulting in an annual inflation of 3.7%. In annual terms Brisbane recorded the fourth-largest inflation figure of all capital cities in Australia (Table 1).
- Compared with the weighted average of the eight capital cities for the year ending February 2026, Brisbane recorded stronger contributions from the CPI groups of 'Furnishings, household equipment and services', 'Transport', and 'Alcohol and tobacco' (Figure 1).
- For Brisbane, the 'Housing' group made the largest contribution to inflation over the year to February 2026 (1.51 percentage points). Within this group, the 'Electricity' subgroup increased 43.2% over the year.
- For Brisbane, there were no groups that recorded a deduction from inflation over the year to February 2026.





Figure 2 CPI change, Australia, year ending^(d)

- Australia's trimmed mean inflation, which excludes more volatile items, increased 0.2% in February 2026 with an annual inflation rate of 3.3% (Figure 2).

Figure 1 CPI contributions, by group, February 2026
